


March 26, 2021

In our pre-meeting chat time, we got some candid insights from our visiting District Governor STEVE WEITZEN, who appears to be on track for spending his entire year of leadership in the pandemic times of Zoom meetings and enforced social distancing. "We came into the year knowing what we were facing," he told us, "and we set up our schedule the best we could," given the circumstances. Taking a moment to see the bright side, he noted, "It sure has saved a lot of wear and tear on my car!" and "I don't miss the rubber chicken lunches and dinners." Still, when we get back to a reasonable semblance of "normal" (whenever and whatever that might be), he hopes to be able to come out to visit the district's clubs live and in person to thank us all for keeping the faith in Rotary during these tough times.

At 12:31 pm, our Co-President DALE MAAS was eager to get the meeting underway, since this was set to be a "very special day." Having our District Governor with us to share his time and his thoughts "makes our normally awesome meeting even better!" To accommodate our busy

The special version sung to our D.G. today focused on STEVE's leadership through Rotary and was accompanied by a series of photos showing our leader serving his club and our district over the years.

Our D.G. and his assistant both seemed to enjoy this tribute very much, with one of them even declaring that it was "better than the original!" And our Co-Prez DALE was quick to note that one of the photos which TOM had displayed of D.G. STEVE showing off his dance moves was taken at the PETS conference which he and MELISSA had attended.

DALE then segued into his official introduction, but was able to trim it a bit, since TOM had inserted several bits of the guest's bio directly into the song. STEVE is a native San Diegan and does in fact live in La Jolla with his wife, AVA. He has been a licensed attorney since 1987 and opened his law practice in 1990. Currently he is a solo practitioner focusing on civil litigation.

STEVE served as president of the Del Mar – Solana Beach club in 2013-14, as an Assistant Governor of District 5340 from 2015-18, and as Chief Assistant Governor from 2019-20. He is a Paul Harris Society member and has been a speaker at PETS, District Trainings, and the District Conference. And today we had the honor of hearing him speak to the Oceanside Rotary. DALE tacked on to this more standard biographical information one additional line: "Plus he is an awesome human being and awesome Rotarian!"

STEVE, being one who apparently is happy to share the spotlight, opened his remarks by introducing his primary Rotary aide this year – SUSIE CALLAHAN from the Rancho Santa Fe club – the Chief amongst the 16



Assistant Governors who will be helping to manage the District through this Rotary year. STEVE also congratulated all of us for our service to our community through Rotary and made special note of our Rotarians at Workday plans for our food distribution event. Plus, he was proud to let us know that our very own MELISSA RODRIGUEZ will be stepping up to serve as an Assistant Governor for our area as she "begins her journey on the road to district leadership."

STEVE said that the question he has been asked the most this year is: "When will we be able to meet in person again?" and he has to admit that the answer is: Nobody knows. It all depends on the recommendations and restrictions from the state and the county. In the meantime, "our year is just Zooming along!" (Get it? ... Hee hee hee)

There are 60 clubs in District 5340, which spans from Tijuana to Oceanside and all the way east to the Arizona border. There are also 10 Rotaract clubs (7 affiliated with area colleges, and 3 community based). As District Governor, he has the honor and the duty to visit all of these clubs over the course of his year as Head Honcho.



STEVE told the tale of how he first was introduced to Rotary. He had struck up a conversation with a woman at a local business networking meeting and she invited him to check out her Rotary club later that week. He thought to himself, "That's all I need ... Another breakfast meeting!", but he showed up at that first meeting "just to get her off of my case." Not seeing her there, he figured it would be safe to duck out, but he ended up chatting with two other fellows who invited him to come on into the breakfast. As it turns out, STEVE found that he enjoyed that meeting and then took the members up on their invitation to attend their demotion party where he and his wife had a great time and it "felt like being with old friends." Fast forward to the present and he can report that he has come to every Friday morning meeting since, but he still has never again seen that original woman who had invited him to Rotary that first time, nor did his description of her sound familiar to anyone he asked. In his mind, he must have been touched by his own personal "Rotary Angel." The take home message he wants us to remember from his tale is that we should "continue to be the warm, welcoming club that you are to everyone who shows up at your meetings, because you never know which guest might end up being the next club president or even District Governor!"

So, the next question after "Why did you JOIN Rotary?" is "Why do you STAY IN Rotary?" With 1.2 million members in 35,000 clubs worldwide, there are lots of answers to that question. But quite commonly the reason ends up being the feeling that, by taking part in Rotary, you are given the chance to change the world through service. He certainly found that to be true in his experience participating in his club's International Service project in El Salvador where they met a girl with a tumor. The Rotarians swiftly pulled the funds together to get the girl to a clinic to have the tumor removed. It made a deep impression on him how Rotarians will so quickly step up to take action and "we help people we do not even know." STEVE invited us to consider, "What is YOUR why?", and he specifically encouraged us to consider becoming actively involved in an international project, suggesting that our club could partner with another club, or we could call him, and he could guide us to a project that could inspire us. "As you change the lives of others, you will be changed, too!"

One cause which STEVE is very passionate about is working toward reducing the scourge of Human Trafficking, which takes three main forms – Organ trafficking, Slave Labor trafficking, and Sex trafficking.

Organ trafficking includes the buying and selling of human body parts, such as corneas, livers, lungs, hearts, and the number one organ: kidneys. Over 10,000 kidneys are trafficked each year, as poor and disadvantaged individuals will sell these organs because they are so desperate for money. "People were not created to live like this," STEVE believes.

Slave trafficking – It is estimated that 40 million men, women, and children are exploited and pressed into service working in restaurants, hotels, homes, crop fields, etc. for substandard wages in abysmally poor working conditions.

Sex trafficking is particularly depressing, especially since the average age of entry into this tawdry enterprise is just 16 years old, with many victims starting out even younger than that. Much of the recruiting of this sex trade is done via the internet, with the perpetrators offering compliments, and promises of love and of work to vulnerable and impressionable youths. The average life expectancy of a sex trafficked worker is just 7.5 years. Generating over \$800 million per year of business, sex trafficking is a close second to the illegal drug trade. And just like with drugs, there is a strong gang component in sex trafficking, with 110 different gangs identified as being involved in this low risk / high yield criminal enterprise.

To provide help on these issues, Rotary is partnering with law enforcement efforts, collaborating with other governmental and community organizations, and has established an Anti-Trafficking Committee as part of Rotary's Pathways to Peace avenue of service. The District has been approved for a Global Grant of \$70,000 to help build awareness of this problem through signage at local transit terminals and trainings provided to teachers, so that more individuals can learn to recognize the warning signs of trafficking in process. There are three training videos that you can watch on the District 5340 website. (https://rotary5340.org/sitepage/watch-our-past-video-workshops) Each of these videos is about an hour long and can give you ideas on how you can become involved and help.

Besides the chance to become actively involved in helping the community through important projects like that, there are other valuable aspects of being a member of Rotary. Volunteerism has been proven to keep people more socially connected, and service to others can be an "antidote to loneliness." It reminds us that we have value in our world, plus it can slow the cognitive declines associated with aging. But perhaps Aristotle summed it up best when he gave his definition of the "Essence of Life: To serve others and to do good."

D.G. STEVE then had just a few moments for questions, since he had to leave for a court hearing shortly. ("My wife insists that I have to keep working for a living," he joked.) JIM SCHRODER asked for more information on the average age of sex trafficking victims. That average is just 16 years old, and the victims are groomed by older exploiters. This deplorable sex trafficking "wreaks havoc on them and on their families." And RENEE RICHARDSON WENDEE assured our District



Governor that our club's official gift to him to show our appreciation for his presentation would be coming to him the next day. Co-President DALE sincerely thanked D.G. STEVE for such a fine presentation which

"reminds us of what we are all doing as an organization." DALE remembered back to the trainings he and MELISSA received at PETS and at District events where they had been inspired to use their year in leadership to strive to make a difference, just like STEVE had espoused in his presentation. And our Co-Presidents let us know how much they appreciate all of the members of our club who are joining with them on this path to service through Rotary.

At this point of the meeting, we flipped back to the items that are normally at the top of our agenda, although as DALE noted, after that insightful program on the value of being a Rotarian, there was no need to hear an additional Rotary Moment.

The Hall's are wearing multiple hats this spring. First up with a reminder was DAVE HALL, who is spearheading our Rotarians at Work Day planning. This annual event will be on Saturday, April 24 starting at 11:30

am. We will gather together (appropriately masked and distanced) at the courtyard of Breakwater Community Church (506 S. Nevada Street, Oceanside - Special thanks to Pastor ROGER VANDERWERKEN for allowing us to use this space!) Bring along perishable foods (fruit and vegetables) and/or staples (rice, beans, bread, etc.) to donate to Lived Experiences, or bring cash or a



check to donate to the purchase of food instead. Lived Experiences is a local nonprofit that (amongst other important programs) has a food pantry to support neighborhood working families in need to help address their food insecurity, and they will have a refrigerator truck on site to collect and then transport these

donated food stuffs. More special thanks to BILL DERN who made arrangements with Yasukochi Family Farms to volunteer to donate some of their fabulous food boxes. (As you may recall, early in our Random

You can choose to spend the R.A.W. afternoon together with your friends from Rotary for a box lunch social (\$25 - RSVP to RENEE by April 19th with your choice of meal – Reuben or Tuna Wrap / Cole slaw or chips, plus beverage and dessert, all catered by the Oceanside Kitchen Collaborative charity) which will include entry into the first cash prize bingo game. (Bring your own bingo marker.
