Today's Program



CHUCK introduced ELKIE WILLS from the Humane Society. She brought some brochures, magazines, and a video to explain who they are and what they do. The Humane Society now has campuses in San Diego, Escondido, and Oceanside. There are 320 staff members, 5000 volunteers, and 9-12 veterinarians. Animal rescuers help the most confused animals to settle down. 84% of the rescued animals are released to good homes instead of being euthanized.

P.A.W.S. helps people with HIV and AIDS take care of their pets, especially with food. Approximately 500 people are homebound with pets.

Project Wildlife assists with injured wild animals to aid in their eventual release back into the wild.

Community Engagement goes into the schools and scout groups to educate students about the Humane Society and their animals.

ELKIE asked if we had any questions:

DAVE HALL asked if there were volunteer opportunities.

There is training so volunteers can help with foster care, dog walking, etc.

BOB PICKREL asked about the monetary support for their organization.

ELKIE said that they have a \$25 million budget with approximately \$16 million coming from bequests from wills and estates.

JIM SCHRODER asked about adoption fees.

These are prorated according to senior status and the status of the animal.

CHUCK WARD asked about the locations in Oceanside.

The Humane Society is in the process of leasing larger buildings by the airport.

RON MARBEN said that he had stopped by the shelter in Oceanside and there were very few cats.

ELKIE said that they have been able to find foster families for most of the cats, but the kittens too young to leave their facility are still around, and they are kept in a different building until they are properly weaned.

JIM SCHRODER asked what can be done for insistently barking dogs in neighborhoods.

Code Enforcement is an option.

CHUCK then gave ELKIE a beautiful pot from TERI Inc. with lovely succulents from ANCHISA MARBEN. A donation was made to TERI, Inc. in ELKIE's honor.
