VETERANS DAY PROGRAM FROM ONE OF OUR OWN

Before segueing into the Veteran stuff, our Program Chair JANET BLEDSOE LACY gave a brief history of women in Rotary. Then she got ready to call up our speaker – a man who truly needs no introduction to this club. "BOB PICKREL is one of my favorite Rotarians!" JANET said. He is "always smiling" and she believes that he may be the oldest veteran in our club.



BOB spoke first about the ambitious project which the Oceanside Rotary Club Foundation had spearheaded about 20 years ago – raising at total of \$150,000 from various donors and sources to fund the kitchen at the Veterans Association of North County building on Mission. In particular, BOB noted, PP GRAHAM FRASER and RUDY VAN HUNNICK "both had their hearts in this project." And that is one of the ways that our Rotary is always active in supporting veterans and the community.

The main topic BOB wanted to cover was his experiences in Korea. But he apologized in advance: "If I forget some things, it has been a couple of years since then."

His family moved to California in 1948. Eventually he attended Pasadena City College where two important things happened: 1) The school at the time was "loaded with WWII vets, and they knew how to study", which helped BOB to become a better learner by following their lead; and 2) He met DARLENE, whom he planned to marry in June of 1951.



After graduation, BOB went to work for Bank of America (his career for 41 years!), but just 6 months after he started there, he received his draft notice. His first experience in the military was showing up at a large hall for an orientation, where all 100 new draftees were ordered to strip down to their skivvies right then and there. "It was the first step in the military reducing our 'I/Me' mentality" to instead form the men into a team.

Basic training was followed by a transfer to Camp Roberts where they "did nothing but marching in close order drills on the parade field for months." Their 1st Sgt. was quite a fit fellow. "He could walk the legs off of a duck!" and he really whipped his troops into good physical condition, which came in quite handy when they were eventually on grueling missions out in the warzone.

During a very short window of opportunity during this time, BOB and DARLENE moved up their plans and found the time for a wedding and one night honeymoon in April of 1951.

His unit was finally assigned to a ship to take them overseas. There were 3000 men onboard, berthed in bunks stacked 5 high, and with such crowded conditions, he recalls "We were always in line for food." They weathered a brutal storm off the Aleutians, truly battening down the hatches, but finally landed in Yokohama where they moved over to a smaller ship to take them to Inchon Harbor on the west side of Korea, about 20 miles outside of Seoul.

Forty of his group were selected for medical training, "So I became a doctor." Well, not quite a "doctor," because his training lasted all of 15 days, basically learning the basics of First Aid, getting the wounded stabilized for transfer to more advanced facilities in the rear. They were able to get the men bandaged up and to a M.A.S.H. unit quickly, and this dramatically reduced the normal death rate in the field.

His assignment was to a "spearhead group" of the 5th Regimental Combat Team, and he received a bit more training to become an aide to four squads, but he also carried a rifle. BOB recalls that the medics did not wear any medical insignia so they wouldn't stand out as targets. Thankfully, BOB spared us any gory, graphic descriptions of what he saw and lived through, but he did sum it up by somberly stating, "War is horrible. We all know it." And "It always seems to be getting worse, with more civilians involved."

At this point, President SHOR called out that there were just five minutes left. BOB's retort: "Well, you took all of my time!" (Cue the crowd's laughter.)

He went on to describe how the hilly terrain of Korea added to the difficulty of advancing the troops forward. There was a lot of "hold and wait." One of the major campaigns that he was attached to went from the 1st of October through the end of November. Then they stayed on the "winter line", deep in North Korean territory, in the bitter cold from the end of November to mid-February. Wearing parkas was a problem, BOB described, because it would make you sweat too much. It was better to dress in layers, and he often would have a waterproof field jacket over 2 or 3 sweaters over the one T-shirt that "wouldn't come off for 6 to 8 weeks." Showers were a rare and bone-chilling thing. BOB told us that he couldn't even think about zipping himself to be covered in his sleeping bag (which was shared in shifts), because it would stink too much. On the brighter side, he said that he didn't mind C-rations and actually found the corned beef hash to be rather good – hot or cold, and he loved the sausage, except for when it was cold and had a white layer of grease covering it. (*There's the gory and gruesome stuff!*)

"I could talk for another hour," BOB said, and we would have been riveted listening for longer. But the clock was ticking, so he wrapped up by telling us that he came off the line in February of 1952, with a National Guard unit relieving them. He spent some time at a camp with Chinese prisoners and eventually headed back to the States in June of 1952, working in a hospital until his discharge in November of that year. In his closing words, some of us got a lump in our throats as he described how moving it was for him to see the Golden Gate Bridge when he returned to the U.S.A. This moved his audience to give BOB a standing ovation in gratitude for his presentation and for his service to the country.

A HAPPY DOLLAR MESSAGE THAT DIDN'T MAKE THE CUT

Since near the end of our club business our President was already cutting into our speaker's time, she cut off Happy Dollars before VICKIE PROSSER had the chance to pay her tribute. So, she sent it in to Shorelines. Here it is, in her own words:

"First of all, I want to recognize the fact that we are celebrating Veteran's Day today, but it is also the 248th birthday of the United States Marine Corps! I am happy to share the following...

My father retired as a Marine Captain after serving in World War II as a Marine Raider and in the Chosin Reservoir during Korean War. He retired after serving more than 20 years.

My father-in-law was a Pearl Harbor survivor in World War II, a Korean War veteran (also serving in the Chosin Reservoir) and he served in the Vietnam war. He retired as a Master Gunnery Sergeant after 30+ years in the Marine Corps.

My husband served 22+ years and retired as a Marine Lieutenant Colonel. He is also a Vietnam vet.

I also want to honor and recognize the spouses and families of our vets who have supported our servicemen during very difficult times. My dad did not get to see me until I was 13 months old. My mother-in-law was raising eight children when Lloyd's dad went to Vietnam for 13 months. Lloyd and I have been separated three times during our 56 years of marriage - each time for over a year during his unaccompanied overseas tours.

It takes a team, and I am proud to be part of that team. God bless the USA!

- 23 A camel caravan. It stopped traffic for 20 minutes.

- 26 Fresh bread just out of the oven for sale. It sold fast, too.
- 27 We stopped at mosque and I had to put this wrap on. My knees were showing. I thought I had pulled my shorts I was wearing down low enough, but not enough to satisfy everyone.
- 28 El Djem 3rd largest Roman Amphitheater in the world. It is stacked stone blocks too. No nails or anything holding it together. Amazing. From the 2nd and 3rd Century.
- 29 The arches are impressive to walk through



- 30 Photo of yours truly and the work of the amphitheater
- 31 Stop at Hammamet on the Mediterranean. A seaside resort town.
- 32 Hotel at Sidi Bou Said. View from the hotel is awesome overlooking the Mediterranean
- 33 View from the lower garden looking out at the sea
- 34 Final stop was at the North Africa American Cemetery and Memorial at Carthage outside of Tunis. It is the only American burial in North Africa with campaigns from 1942 and 1943 against Rommel.
- 35 Here is a full wall of the battles and time in history when it all took place. We have the local person in charge explaining the history of the battles.



36 - The wall of those Missing in Service on land and sea has 3,724 names listed. I found the name of our family name Schroeder listed in those missing.

37 - There are 2,777 headstones of those interred including a Medal of Honor recipient. Three of our travelers in our group were US veterans and a flower bouquet was presented, by the three of them, in honor of those that gave their lives so that we may enjoy many of our freedoms today. A question was asked why bury them here and not in the US? Many chose to remain with their fellow soldiers if something happened to them. I was very moved by our visit here. This was definitely an interesting trip to visit Algeria and Tunisia. We saw no other Americans, that we know of, during our 3 weeks in both countries.
