

November 13, 2020

For the third straight Oceanside Rotary Zoom session, our meeting was officially started off at exactly 12:31 pm, this time by MELISSA RODRIGUEZ. (Gotta give both of our Co-Presidents points for consistency! ... And gotta wonder what they both are up to on Fridays that makes them run exactly one minute late, time and time again???)

The first order of business was hearing a **ROTARY MOMENT**. This week it was



provided by PAM MYERS who noted that there are a lot of diverse opinions around our country nowadays. This seemed like a good excuse to recite some of the official mottos of a handful of our states. (A bit of a glitchy internet connection made for some verbal and video holes in her

VERMONT: "Freedom and Unity" (One of the most popular flavors from Ben & Jerry's, a famous Vermont business)

pandemic, and then offered up our Oceanside Rotary standard in the style of a



<u>A GREAT WAY TO CELEBRATE "ROTARY INTERNATIONAL</u> FOUNDATION MONTH"



MELISSA asked our Songster of the Day TOM BRAULT if, after such a creative



that she already did indeed make the suggested \$110 annual contribution to this worthy cause, to help support the fine work that it does.

OUR PROGRAM

JANET BLEDSOE LACY, as our Program Chair, introduced JAMIE BECK, the President and Managing Attorney of Free to Thrive, a San Diego based non-profit. Today the focus of her presentation would be the impact of COVID on human trafficking victims and survivors. She

started by saying that she has enjoyed "being with such a fun-loving and casual group." Then she provided her definition of human trafficking: The exploitation of another person for commercial sex or labor through force or coercion. This is not to be confused with human smuggling (transporting persons across borders), which is a different crime. 80% of the sex exploitation victims are born in the U.S., but the human trafficking victims exploited for their labor are more likely to be undocumented persons from outside our country.

Free to Thrive provides legal services and connections to other supports to trafficking victims. Prior to COVID, they operated a mobile legal clinic that provided services around the county, but since the pandemic, they pivoted quickly to virtual online services. COVID has led to increased vulnerabilities due to job loss, economic hardship, homelessness, and abuse in homes, as well as an increase in grooming and online recruitment of children. Often the traffickers will make connection to kids through online games. This is why it is important to talk with our kids and grandkids about internet safety.

COVID has also led to Criminal Justice impacts on the human trafficking survivors. There is increased health risk in the jails they can end up in and more isolation of the incarcerated individuals since family members cannot visit in prisons as much. Court dates get postponed, and the right to a speedy trial has been suspended, since it is so difficult to hold a jury trial with so few members of the public showing up to serve a jury summons. There is a push for early release, particularly for low-level offenders, but the people released face more difficult conditions, with fewer supportive services and resources available to them and probation / parole requirements are more difficult for them to take care of. Free to Thrive aims to help them through these difficulties and keep them up to date on court cases.

There is a huge correlation / interaction between family law and domestic violence situations and human trafficking. In the current COVID climate, abusive

relationships are becoming increasingly strained and volatile, putting more potential victims at risk. To help these individuals, Free to Thrive provides:

- *Periodic welfare checks and safety planning
- *Status checks on shared custody arrangements
- *Temporary restraining orders
- *Emergency custody order assistance

One of their programs which JAMIE described is STEER ("Survivors of Trafficking Essential Emergency Resources"). It was created as an immediate response to the COVID pandemic to ensure that clients receive the supports they need to get them through the crisis in these uncertain times and beyond. It provides free, personalized, holistic, and trauma-informed one-on-one guidance for emergency resources and services. They have served 159 clients with over 200 needs with this program since the COVID outbreak started.

Free to Thrive has provided presentations to eight San Diego area Rotary clubs since 2018. They also held a full day workshop in September of 2019. Some clubs have chosen to make human trafficking one of their service focus areas. In 2020, an "Issues Based Rotary Club" was launched in L.A., and she is hopeful that the San Diego region may choose to start up an issues-oriented club like this as well. of what that club doing be Some is can seen at: rotariansfightinghumantrafficking.org JAMIE was proud to say that she herself has joined Rotary, and believes, "If Rotary can end polio, it can end human trafficking."

How can WE help? JAMIE had a list of ideas for us.

- *Learn more about human trafficking
- *Educate others
- *Practice empathy and respect
- *Share resources
- *Provide gift cards for basic needs (especially important over the holidays)
- *Donate to non-profits
- *Get personally involved and put your experience and skills to use



JAMIE also recommended that we might want to view the short film which they produced called "A Starfish Story" The film itself runs 18 minutes and there are also remarks from San Diego community leaders and two incredible musical performances attached to it. It can be

Friday, November 20 there will be a board meeting on Zoom at noon. All are invited to sit in and see what the board is up to. And our last meeting of this snakebit year of 2020 will be held on Friday, December 4. There will be a prize for the most festive holiday attire, so raid your closets and dressers and get garbed up accordingly.
