She added with pride, "I even got a photo with our incoming RI President from Uganda — OLAYINKA HAKEEM BABALOLA. That alone made the trip worth it."

## **Service Season in Full Swing**

Next, TERRI outlined our plans to help with the Thanksgiving dinner for the VisTAY Youth Home in Vista which serves young adults who've aged out of foster care. A clipboard with a signup list to provide specific items was passed around. "We've got stuffing and mashed potatoes covered," she said, "but we still need vegetable dishes, some bread and rolls, and desserts for about thirty-five people."

"Don't skimp on the rolls," someone joked. "Those kids will eat them all!" (Latest update: The signup sheet found lots of willing helpers that day, but a few more desserts would be nice. Contact TERRI to add your name to the list.)

TERRI confirmed that this dinner will take place November 20 at 5 p.m. and your items should be dropped off at the VisTAY house (727 Ascot Drive, Vista) on that day. (If you need to deliver food the day before, bring it to RENEE's condo (720 Silver Drive, Vista). If your food needs to be warmed, make sure that you bring it in disposable aluminum pans. Feel free to stay to help serve the meal and mingle with the house guests during the gathering, if you would like.

Next came the Nichols Leadership Academy Food Drive. "The SNAP program may be changing," RENEE explained, "so we want to help their pantry to stay stocked — canned goods, boxed stuffing, instant potatoes, pumpkin, all the classics." Bring your items to our November 14 meeting.

JANET BLEDSOE LACY chimed in "Good news! The courts said SNAP stays funded — at least for now. Thank God for lawyers!" The room had to laugh about that one. RENEE smiled and said, "Perfect. We'll keep collecting. The need's always there."

DALE MAAS then turned to one of the club's favorite traditions — the Women's Resource Center Holiday Gift Drive. "Our fourth year running," he said, "and we want this to be our biggest yet."

"This year's even easier, The WRC created a Wish List — Just click on the link on the drive flyer to see the list of needed items." This drive runs from November 3 through December 5, with all donations due by December 6. Drop off your donations at DALE's office, or bring them to our next meeting on November 14. And gifts should be unwrapped, so the WRC staff can sort them by age and need.

"We usually fill a few truckloads," DALE reminded the room. "Let's do it again."

#### **Youth Service Revives at Oceanside High**

DANA took the floor with updates and enthusiasm. He shared that the Oceanside High Interact Club is officially active again — and he's working hard to man the programs and keep things running smoothly.

He and the youth team also met with the school principal to discuss reviving several long-standing Rotary initiatives:

- Model UN
- Speech & Debate
- Four-Way Test Contest
- Youth Instrumental Music Program

Contests will begin around Valentine's Day, move to regionals in March, and conclude with district scholarships later that month. He invited other members to volunteer to help with these events.

"We're getting the next generation involved," DANA said. "And there's a role for everyone — judging, mentoring, or cheering them on."

### **Broadway Comes to Rotary**

Finally, RENEE introduced the guest speaker, JOEY LANDWEHR, Education and Outreach Associate for Broadway San Diego.

"Hi, I'm JOEY," he began with a grin as his photo was being taken. "And I know how to pose." The laughter told him he had the crowd.



JOEY shared Broadway San Diego's history — from its 1976 beginnings as the San Diego Playgoers to its current home at the Civic and Balboa Theatres. He played a six-minute promo video showcasing the remainder of their 48th season lineup: *Hell's Kitchen, Water for Elephants, MJ, Six, The Sound of Music, The Notebook*, and *Beauty and the Beast*.

"How do you turn a circus story into a Broadway show?" he asked. "With puppets, aerial stunts, and a lot of magic."

Then he shifted to what drives him most: inspiring young audiences. "My goal is for every student in San Diego County to see a Broadway-level show before they graduate," he said. He explained that students can see professional productions for as little as \$25 through their program Broadway Bridges as well as special Theater Thursdays invitations to schools for group showings.

Broadway San Diego's Highlights & Outreach Programs

- Triple Threat Training crash courses taught by touring cast members covering acting, singing, and dancing
- The Biz by the Pros after-show Q&A sessions with performers and crew
- Behind the Magic backstage experiences where students watch semi-trucks unload and full sets go up before their eyes
- Broadway for Beginners introductions on how to enjoy and understand theater
- Jimmy Awards Program a national high school competition that's launched careers; Broadway San Diego has already produced two national Jimmy Awards winners

"Theater changes young people's lives," JOEY said, sharing stories of students who found confidence and careers on stage. He also discussed ways to donate to these programs, adding, "Community partnerships make it all possible."

Joey closed with a personal reflection: "I grew up in a small town in Missouri—the first in my family to graduate high school. Theater gave me direction and purpose. It changes lives. It even saves them."

After a few questions and some positive feedback from members who are subscribers to Broadway San Diego, the crowd gave him a warm, extended round of applause.

With very, very few cards left on the table to choose from, DAVE HALL had a very good chance at the \$1,000 jackpot, but unfortunately the 6 of Hearts did not make it happen for him.
