JAY CRAWFORD then shared his Rotary Moment, recalling that he had first joined Rotary in 1982 when he joined a club in Corpus Christi, Texas. Later, he joined a Rotary Club in 1984 in Missoula, Montana, just about the same time that women were invited to join Rotary. JAY joined the OCEANSIDE ROTARY CLUB in 1999, and had the opportunity to get involved with an international

service project. **JAY** stated: "A small orphanage outside of Ensenada in Baja Mexico needed help, and a number of Rotarians in our club said, 'Let's do it!!" Once a month, a dentist from our club took care of the children's dental needs for free, while others helped improve dormitories, added bathrooms, upgraded electrical service, water and sewer facilities. We also provided them with needed food and supplies, and at Christmas we took gifts to the children for several years. Eventually, the Fullerton Club stepped in and took over this project to continue to help the kids. In recent years, our club has worked with local middle school kids from Oceanside's Crown Heights neighborhood, encouraging them to not join gangs. We explain to them the importance of keeping their grades up and taking

advantage of the programs available to them so they can attend college. "Through this", **JAY** said, "I saw the real meaning of 'Service Above Self' and the 'Four Way Test.' Rotary has become, for me, not only a service club and an opportunity to enjoy fellowship with others, but a way of life."

OUR SPEAKER: MICHAEL ODEGAARD



JANET BLEDSOE LACY then came forward to introduce our speaker. Born and reared in Newport Beach, California, MICHAEL ODEGAARD graduated from the University of California at Irvine and pursued a 15-year career in community master planning and design that also includes the design of neighborhoods in China, Mexico, Canada, and Italy.

After completing an MBA, at the onset of the Great Recession in 2007, **MICHAEL** moved to Honolulu to study the Hawaiian language, and he began to teach Hawaiian language here in Oceanside while assisting his mother with apartment building maintenance projects during breaks beginning in 2008. In Honolulu, **MICHAEL** wrote the first urban design curriculum used



translated early Christian prayers and worship services into this indigenous language. He also launched "Hawaii Bilingual" via social media advocating for the right of the Hawaii resident to receive public services in the official language of their choice regardless of their English language proficiency. He went on to teach the Hawaiian language for the Hawaii State Department of Education before attending seminary in the Boston Tri-City area where he also was the first to teach Hawaiian language at Harvard University through their Native American Program. Since 2015 MICHAEL has lived full-time in Oceanside taking care of his mother MONA MAERTENS and her apartment building, and he has also continued to teach Hawaiian language privately throughout San Diego County. MICHAEL is currently President of the ROTARY CLUB SAN LUIS REY which is District 5340's first Peacebuilder Club accredited by the Rotary Action Group for Peace.

MICHAEL descends from 95 generations of indigenous Hawaiians and also the Europeans who brought the idea of Real Estate to Hawaii, including the founder of the city of Honolulu. Today **MICHAEL** hopes to convey to his fellow Oceanside Rotarians the value of our indigenous neighbors and especially their languages.

Hawaiian was the primary language of all islanders until the late 19th century. In 1893, the last reigning Hawaiian monarch, Queen Lili`uokalani, was overthrown by American forces. Soon thereafter, Hawaiian was banned as the language of instruction in all schools. That prohibition was finally officially lifted in 1986. Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act of 1975 authorized tribal governments to take over education of their own members.

MICHAEL shared much of the history of legislative acts that have sought to preserve and protect indigenous languages in the United States and the world. These include the Native American Languages Act of 1990 which repudiated linguicide by United States, and "declares to preserve, protect, and promote the rights and freedom of Native Americans to use, practice, and develop Native American Languages, and fully recognize the right of Indian Tribes and other Native American governing bodies, States, territories, and possessions of the United States to take action on, and give official status to their Native American languages for the purpose of conducting their own business." Some of the specific acts taken to protect and preserve language include:

UNESCO Convention against Discrimination in Education (1960) is a multilateral treaty currently with 106 member states. The International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (1966) Article 27 states that individuals of linguistic minorities cannot be denied the right to use their own language. The Convention on the Rights of the Child (1989) Articles 29 and 30 declare respect for the child's own cultural identity, language, and values, even when those are different from the country of residence, and the right for the child to use his or her own language, in spite of the child's minority or immigrant status. The UN Declaration on the Rights of Persons Belonging to National or Ethnic, Religious and Linguistic Minorities (1992) Provides that States should provide individuals belonging to minority groups with sufficient opportunities for education in their mother tongue, or instruction with their mother tongue as the medium of instruction. However, this Declaration is non-binding. The European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages (1992) Part II details eight main principles and objectives upon which States must base their policies and legislation. They are seen as a framework for the preservation of the languages concerned:

- 1. Recognition of regional or minority languages as an expression of cultural wealth.
- 2. Respect for the geographical area of each regional or minority language.
- 3. The need for resolute action to promote such languages.

- 4. The facilitation and/or encouragement of the use of such languages, in speech and writing, in public and private life.
- 5. The provision of appropriate forms and means for the teaching and study of such languages at all appropriate stages.
- 6. The promotion of relevant transnational exchanges.
- 7. The prohibition of all forms of unjustified distinction, exclusion, restriction or preference relating to the use of a regional or minority language and intended to discourage or endanger its maintenance or development.
- 8. The promotion by states of mutual understanding between all the country's linguistic groups.

MICHAEL displayed a wealth of information on this topic, and answered many questions from those present. He encouraged us all to attend the Rotary Club meeting for the **SAN LUIS REY ROTARY** which is held at the Broken

Yolk Cafe in Oceanside on Tuesday mornings at 7:15 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.

Half-Pres L.J. then presented **MICHAEL** with a lovely succulent arrangement created by our very own **ANCHISA**.
