The meeting started promptly at 12:30 with our MADAM PREZ. RENEE RICHARDON-WENDEE herself leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by our own special Song Meister VICKIE PROSSER leading us through "School Days" and "Smile." TOM BRAULT then read his Rotary Inspirational Moment obtained from the



website We Are The Mighty.com, whose Mission is Capturing, empowering, and celebrating the voice of today's military community. **TOM** reminded us that we just acknowledged the 17th anniversary of "9/11" and then read to us the following:

"While the planes were hitting the World Trade Center, 27-year-old Jason Thomas was dropping off his daughter with his mother in Long Island. When Thomas heard what had just transpired in the City, the former

sergeant, who had been out of the Marine Corps for a year at that point, made the decision to change into the Marine uniform he had sitting in his trunk and sped toward Manhattan.

'Someone needed help. It didn't matter who,' Thomas told the Associated Press later. 'I didn't even have a plan. But I have all this training as a Marine, and all I could think was, 'My city is in need.' And so he joined the first responders in searching through the rubble for survivors."

TOM then added his own thoughts on this story:

He was not given any orders, and he did not have to become involved, but on that day, Sgt. Thomas truly embodied Rotary's goal of "Service Above Self", as he put his own life



on the line and chose to intentionally drive into the chaos and toward the most unimaginable terror of his lifetime in order to help his fellow man.

We hope and pray that we never will never have to face another 9/11 level of calamity in our lifetimes. But opportunities to serve our city, our community, our world are out there for us, day after day. May all of us have the commitment and the character to step up like Sgt. Thomas and may we as Rotarians make the conscious choice to serve, wherever and whenever we see someone in need of our help.

MADAM PREZ. RENEE then gave us our Club Updates, reminding us that the Harbor Days Nail and Sail event is set for Sunday, September 16th with boat construction starting at 9:30 AM. (Races are scheduled to start close to 2 pm.) THE PROGRAM: MADAM PREZ. RENEE introduced our speaker, JOEY LANDWEHR of JCOMPANY YOUTH THEATER. JOEY is the proud Artistic Director for JCompany Youth Theatre, and has won over 40 awards for his work with young artists in San Diego, including a special creativity award for shaving his head to play the lead in THE KING AND I, Yul Brynner

style, and raising over \$10,000 for Rady Children's Hospital's Cancer Unit - earning him the title **Joey "Do Anything For The Arts" Landwehr. JOEY** moved to San Diego after being a professional actor and director in New York City working on and off Broadway, national tours, regional theatre and directing and soloing at Carnegie Hall. **JOEY** has worked in all medias of entertainment and is a proud member of the Actors' Equity Association (AEA), the Screen Actors Guild (SAG), the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA), the Director's Guild of America (DGA), the Actors Alliance of San Diego (AASD), and Americans for the Arts (AFTA).

Since moving to San Diego, **JOEY** has worked for the San Diego Performing Arts League as Membership and Community Development Director; in 2007 he received the "40 Under 40" Award from San Diego Metropolitan Magazine for outstanding leadership in the arts. **JOEY** was also honored as the 2011 Newsmaker in the Arts. In 2016, **JOEY** was further recognized when the City of San Diego proclaimed October 18th Joey Landwehr Day.

JOEY first introduced his program to us with a film that included testimonials from some of the participants in the musicals and plays put on by his young actors, as to how important this program has been to them in their lives. This is the 13th season for the youth theater organization, and they are celebrating it with a Random Acts of Culture theme, which includes a variation of our motto of "Service Above Self." **JOEY** encouraged us all to attend theater events, and most importantly, to bring younger kids

to the theater, because they are the ones who will "keep theater alive." He shared how many students learn skills that will help them all of their lives through their theater experience. Their mission statement is "The artist is not a special kind of person, rather each person is a special kind of artist."

He shared how inclusive their plays are with all children, including those with special needs. This was memorialized by **SUZAN SENCAN**, who spoke of how this program changed the life of her son, who is on the autistic spectrum. He has thrived during his summers spent in JCompany's summer youth theater program. This program has been the only constant program in his young life, because of the challenges that he has faced at elementary school which has caused a rotation of his educational experience from classroom to classroom.

The JCompany Youth Theater is located at the Lawrence Family Jewish Community Center in San Diego, which hosts a theater with 500 seats. **JOEY** said that we can all help by one of four avenues: PROMOTE the program; VOLUNTEER to paint sets; sew costumes, or just visit; CONNECT them with other organizations; and SUPPORT them financially or by acts that help them. **JOEY** ended the program with a slide depicting his company logo, which reads: "Earth without art is just 'eh'."

Questions from JIM SCHRODER, VICKIE PROSSER, TOM BRAULT, and BOB PICKREL resulted in our finding out that the age range of the actors is typically 7 to 19; the actors are not paid, but the professionals involved are, which includes the orchestra, production managers, as well as there are costs in securing costumes, the fees surrounding the acquisition of the play itself; etc. There are as many as 82 kids in a show, and they usually rehearse for 6 weeks, and then perform over a 2 to 3 weekend period of time. When asked about his colorful jacket full of patches, JOEY let us know that each patch represents the logo for every show he has produced with the company, and he proudly wears this jacket everywhere to promote his cause! MADAM PREZ. RENEE then had both JOEY and SUZAN SENCAN select a book from her collection that would be donated to a local Oceanside school to put in their library.
