**THE ROTARY MOMENT** was given by PAST PRESIDENT TERRI HALL.

"I really didn't know anything about Rotary, though I had heard it referenced on TV shows occasionally. Like when the neighbor was at a Rotary meeting or the best people in town were Rotarians. In 1989 when women were welcomed in Rotary internationally, I took notice. I was CEO of a not-for-profit organization and had a volunteer board of directors, many of whom were in the local Rotary Club. I was aware, as one of the few women leaders in the community of Ridgecrest, that my peers - mostly men - were Rotarians. As women were eligible for Rotary membership, I brought it up to my board President, who jumped at the idea, though he NEVER considered it on his own. He and a small group asked me out for a fireside chat and talked about Rotary, its local and international impact and even talked about Paul Harris fellow. I do not remember anyone mentioning that he was one of the organization's founders and all they could verbalize was, "PHF is an honor." I was honored with my first PHF from a Rotarian and his "Rotary Ann" for my work in the community. I now have 13 ...



I don't know ... a bunch!

I became a member and remember I was one of only three women in the Club. There were two tables in the back with the "old guard" who got to the meeting 30 minutes early, drank Whisky and Scotch and told dirty jokes. I gave them a wide berth. Over the next year, most of them left the Club and the membership grew and more women were added. Our community involvement was varied, helping the local schools,

providing \$25,000 - \$30,000 in scholarships per year and having involvement with local elections and events. We had a booth at the local fair and were recognized as a vital community asset.

I had read about a Club in Bakersfield that had an Ethics Conference for high school juniors and after investigating, I proposed it to our Club. I had my not-for-profit co-sponsor so my staff did conferences and I re-created it with the Oceanside Rotary Club and we successfully held it in 2008 with three schools. District 5340 then began working with middle schoolers with the LEAD program and we didn't have another Ethics event.

Wherever we traveled we tried to attend a Rotary meeting: Las Vegas, Lahaina Maui, Pukalani Maui, England and Ireland. In England the club had no women members and when I left, one member said, "Next time, bring your husband." In Ireland, two minutes before the meeting started, the President invited me to do the Prayer. That was surprise!

Working with two Clubs in India in 2010, Oceanside Rotary provided 400 sewing machines to women to start a business to support their family. This was my first international project and local district 5340 was very proud to publicize this.



I've been a Rotarian for 30 years this November and am so proud to be a part of that nerdy group of stalwart citizens that feed families, educate children, build homes, fix teeth, provide safe drinking water and vaccinate the world to prevent crippling diseases and allow others to live and grow without suffering. I'm proud to be a ROTARIAN!"

### **INTRODUCTION OF TODAYS SPEAKER - JANET**

BLEDSOE LACY introduced TINA ORTIZ, born and raised in Oceanside, California. Past President of the SAN LUIS REY ROTARY CLUB in 1994, and currently a member of our club. A proud product of the Oceanside Unified School District and graduate

of OCEANSIDE HIGH SCHOOL. Logistics and Marketing Coordinator for Tierra Data in Oceanside, CA. Proud mother of her daughter Brianna.

TINA was honored to be speaking to us today on behalf of the American Cancer Society (ACS) as a Voice of Hope. What is a Voice of Hope? Well, according to the Voice of Hope website they are: "empowered cancer survivors and caregivers who share their personal stories of their cancer journey while inspiring others to support the mission of the American Cancer Society." The American Cancer Society's



mission is to save lives, celebrate lives, and lead the fight for a world without cancer.

She was nominated and selected as a Voice of Hope in 2015 after speaking at the Oceanside Relay for Life Luminaria ceremony in 2014 - an honor that she never expected to be given. Over the years as a Voice of Hope, she has spoken at local Relay Luminaria Ceremonies, Survivor Celebrations and ACS conferences, as well as giving presentations to local organizations and businesses.

TINA told us the history behind the Relay for Life, which began in May 1985 when colorectal surgeon, Dr. Gordy Klatt, wanted to raise awareness of cancer and boost the income of his local cancer charity. He spent twenty-four hours walking a track in Tacoma, Washington, and raised over \$27,000, showing that one person really can make a difference. Since then, Relay has become the largest fundraising event for cancer in the world...celebrated by more than 4 million people in over 20 countries.

In 2001, seven people came together and walked the first local Relay for Life laps. This group set a goal of \$27,000 to match the amount raised by Dr. Gordy Klatt in 1985. This dedicated group walked the track at CSUSM and raised \$23,000. The following year, the event was moved to MiraCosta College and raised \$25,000 and in 2003, they successfully hit their initial goal of \$27,000 raised! The event has continued to grow and



this year will be celebrating the 21<sup>st</sup> Relay in Oceanside and the 20<sup>th</sup> year at Mira Costa College. In total, the Oceanside community has come together at these Relays and raised over \$1.7 million dollars for the fight against cancer. Pre-covid, this local event had over 35 teams, almost 100 survivors, and close to 600 participants.

TINA then described her personal path to becoming involved in the Relay for Life project. In 2001, when those first steps were taken around the track of CSU San Marcos, she was taking her first steps on another journey. It was a journey that began on December 29, 1999. "That was the day the 'C' word was said to us. I say 'US' because I am not the cancer survivor...I am a caregiver who walked alongside a cancer fighter...my husband, Gabriel."

Gabriel was 54 when he was diagnosed with stage 4 colon cancer. He was active, played soccer and swam with daughter, Brianna. Gabriel had a positive outlook on

life and could always be heard laughing. But as we all know, cancer is not selective.

TINA still remembers that diagnosis day so clearly and to this day, she does not know if anything can prepare you for hearing that word applied to yourself or to a loved one. In the Ortiz's case, they had just returned from funeral services for her mother-in-law who passed away after her own short 3-month battle against colon cancer. "We had celebrated Brianna's 8<sup>th</sup> birthday. We had celebrated Christmas with the family. We were getting ready for New Year's...People were talking Y2K and we were asking, 'Why us?'"

This was just the beginning of their cancer journey - not an easy journey for any of them.... There were surgeries (including one for a colostomy bag), rounds of chemo, radiation, hospital stays.... all while TINA was working full-time and keeping Brianna involved in school and extracurricular activities. It was a crazy 6 months, but the treatments worked and Gabriel was a survivor! He returned to work... He started practicing soccer with Brianna and he started swimming again! Life was good.

Until a year later, when signs of concern called for more appointments. The cancer had returned and the terrible cycle began again. This time it was too much for his body and after 1½ years...on the day after Father's Day ... his body slept. Brianna was just 9 years old and TINA was now a single mom. It was at that moment when she began to realize the toll that being a caregiver had taken on her. She had thought she could do it all..., but after her husband passed away, she was lost. "I was going through the motions of being a single mom, doing my best to keep Brianna positive and involved. My husband's birthday and our anniversary were hard days...I found myself taking the days off so I wouldn't cry at work...but then I ended up crying alone at home."

In 2003, two years after Gabriel passed away, TINA was reading the paper and saw a volunteer opportunity for the American Cancer Society - delivering daffodils on Daffodil Day - which happened to be on Gabriel's birthday. So, in memory of him, she signed up and delivered flowers throughout the county.

"It was the following year when we lit our first luminaria bags and walked that first lap remembering my husband at the Oceanside Relay for Life." She and Brianna walked in silence, holding on to each other as they looked for the bag with the name.... Gabriel Ortiz. "We found his bag. It



wasn't easy for me to see it through my tear-filled eyes, but the smile on Brianna's face as she saw it lit so brightly was all I needed to see. In a surreal way, it was very comforting. We knew that night that we would be back the next year with our own team...What I didn't know was how passionate I would become about Relay."

So, in 2004, they started their own team, Gabriel's Gang, which grew each year as more friends joined to walk laps around the track. Even after Brianna headed off to college, it was so important to her that she would come home for each Relay weekend, except the year when she studied abroad. That year, TINA became involved with the committee in anticipation of no longer leading a team of her own. Well, that didn't play out like she had thought because, as it turns out, high school friends wanted to participate to honor their moms, dads and spouses, so Gabriel's' Gang grew even larger that year PLUS she also did the committee work!

Over the years, Gabriel's Gang has raised over \$76,000! Family teams sell luminaria bags with personalized notes, drawings, and pictures (like the ones we saw displayed on our tables), reach out to family, friends & our employers for donations/sponsorships; and do separate team fundraisers like yard sales & business give back night's partnerships. TINA plans to organize a footgolf tournament as a fundraiser for her team.

When she was first asked to speak at the Luminaria Ceremony in 2014, TINA was hesitant because she had never used any American Cancer Services herself and didn't know what to say. A staff partner simply encouraged her to "tell your story. I know there is one." So, she described the commitment which she and Gabriel had made to each other that they were going to fight with everything they had and weren't going to let cancer get in the way of living. Part of their fight was to make some good memories...And they did! She told of how friends and family had been so helpful to them through it all. And she admitted in her speech how very scared she was.

"I remember thinking how can this be happening to us? What am I going to do? Will I be strong enough to help him get through this? What about my little girl? How do we tell everyone?"

Ultimately, "we did all we could to stay positive and we did...until we couldn't." When the cancer metastasized and came back, they spent many weeks in the hospital due to his weak immune system. Calls and visits from friends had to be limited. "He tried, but he had just enough energy for me and Brianna...He was trying to take care of us until the very end."

Many of these emotions and thoughts had never been shared by TINA until the night she spoke at the Luminaria Ceremony. "I realized that night that I was not the only caregiver who felt alone...there were others like me, and Relay was giving me a chance to let them know they are not alone."

Through her work with the committee and as a Voice of Hope, TINA learned more about the Relay event and about the services provided by the American Cancer Society. ACS receives over 1.4 million calls and chats to trained specialists on a 24-hour hotline. There are over 32 million visits to cancer.org, the ACS website. ACS provides accommodations, financial assistance, insurance navigation and rides to appointments. ACS provides funding for cancer research grants and there are currently 19 grants in SD County totaling almost \$10 million. This research ranges from cell & molecular studies to colorectal cancer screening strategies. Drugs for metastatic colon cancer that were in clinical trials in the early 2000's are now being manufactured, including one here in Oceanside at Genentech. TINA has seen the benefits of these discoveries directly, as friends are being treated with new immunotherapies and their cancer tumors are shrinking. Research has taught us that diet and exercise reduce our cancer risks, especially with colon cancer...a cancer that is known to be genetic. (In Gabriel's family, there are 4 generations with colon cancer... Mother-in-Law, Grandmother, a Niece and Gabriel.)

At each table, TINA had placed handouts describing ACS services and business cards with contact numbers for support groups which she wished she had known about while her family was riding the emotional roller coaster of diagnosis and treatment. "Take a card with you," she told us. "You never know when you may need to share the information."

Last year was a difficult time for ACS as Relays were cancelled and donations declined. The program offering rides to appointments was temporarily suspended and ACS reorganized to ensure services were funded. Due to current safety concerns this year, they anticipate that their numbers may be lower, but their passion remains high.

"I never thought one word would change my life so drastically...but the 'C' word has an incredible impact and so Relay is the continuation of my journey and the sharing of my story is a big part of it. When I see a post on social media or hear from a friend that they or a loved one have been diagnosed with cancer, I can't help but say a prayer for the journey they are about to begin. I reach out to let them know they are not alone.... I've walked a similar path."

"I will continue to walk not only for my husband but for my daughter and future generations, so they never hear the word and, if they do, it's not so scary. I will walk so others can celebrate more birthdays, more holidays...So more dads can walk their little girls down the aisle. I will walk so other caregivers are not alone. I really want to see a cure in my lifetime."

"I know that together we can fight this...We volunteer, we donate, we walk, we share our stories. We do this together. So, on behalf of the American Cancer Society, as a Voice of Hope, a fellow Rotarian and more importantly, as a friend, I invite you to come walk with me at this year's event and if possible, make a donation to help with the fight."
