It was a cold night, but once inside their home, our newest members and a few old timers, found tables full of delicious food as well as a warm fireplace to sit around as they learned of the many aspects of our club.

Davis welcomed all and talked about the history of Fireside

chats that began with FDR, encouraging all to ask questions as this was a night to learn about the different parts of our club. He was followed by **Russell King** who talked about "Big Rotary" the International Branch of Rotary, **Chuck Dick**,



then took over and narrated the history of Rotary generally, the founding of Rotary in San Diego and our La Jolla Club. **Denise McGuire** discussed the many possibilities of Community Service. **Midge Coburn** as Membership Chair, then explained the steps involved in Membership , and the revived

Red Badge Program, as well as mentorship. **Craig Schniepp**, talked about Youth Services, Interact, the Mexico house build project, RYLA and LEAD. **Pat Stouffer, our treasurer for many years,** then ended the program discussing, our Foundation, the scholarship program and the many endowments we have been entrusted with.

It was a lot, like being hit by a firehose of information as Davis said. But a very good start and much appreciated, as the many, many emails of thanks that followed attested to. Hopefully this will become a yearly tradition.

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Community Service, and Food Distribution at the ASYMCA

For more than 100 years **the ASYMCA** has supported San Diego's military community and families. The first location at 500 Broadway opened to military members in 1924. As the need for support grew, so did their programs. In



1970, ASYMCA San Diego moved into the middle of military housing in **Murphy Canyon and Santos Road** and led patient recreation programs at Naval Medical Center. Fast forward to 2020, when they now provided **drive-thru meal distributions**, virtual youth activities, and more to families during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Last week at 8:30 AM our club joined 2 other Rotary groups at the Santos

location and numerous YMCA volunteers, for food packing and distribution for the families of our military. We began by unpacking hundreds of crates of food donated by the Smart Food Foundation and the San Diego Food Bank, into bags of healthy grains, oats, rice and spices, as well as canned goods, oils and the like.





By 9:30AM a long line of cars and pickup trucks had formed for the food distribution. We were ready.

Depending on the number of families in each vehicle, we placed bags of grains and canned products as well large boxes of frozen meats and fresh produce into their trunks, beds of pickup trucks and/or back seats.


By 11:30 AM, all the food had been distributed to nearly 300 families.

Our speaker with a few new friends

Madhukar (Maud) Rao is a retired Chemical Engineer and currently serves as the Chief Strategy Officer for Workforce Development at Innovation Impact Partners, LLC. He holds a Ph.D. and M.S. in Materials Science from The Pennsylvania State University, and a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from The New Jersey Institute of Technology.

For the past 3 years, Maud has been a docent at the San Diego Air and Space Museum. He serves on the museum's Scholarship Committee and is a training coordinator for new docents. He enjoys engineering, history, and teaching, so being a docent at the museum is a perfect fit. His talk to us centered on three periods of Aviation History in San Diego,

Early Aviation, 1834-1918, The Golden Era, 1923- 1940, and World War II. Each period was rich with invention and creative men and women who would change air travel forever.

It was surprising at least to this observer, how hungry and daring all of them were. Like Icarus, they ignored all warnings in pursuit of their dreams, and often many fell tragically to earth. Nonetheless, it is because of their early devil may care adventures that we can fly all over the world today.
