Coming Next Tuesday, January 30th, our club member Shabnam Miglani on our Global Grant to Uganda



Shabnam Miglani is the co-founder of BitRouter which licenses its IP to major consumer electronics companies globally with a footprint in over 60 million devices. She is a lawyer by training and has practiced in corporate finance. Beyond the business realm, Shabnam has collaborated with non-profits throughout her career. She has worked in the fields of law, finance, tech, and entrepreneurship, driven by a passion for innovation and a commitment to making a positive impact in society.

Its objective is to provide technology education and empowerment to the youth and women for economic and employment opportunities in Mbale, a disadvantaged region in Eastern Uganda.

Getting up at 5:30 AM, never easy. Nonethess 11 stalwart members of **Rotary Club of La Jolla** showed up, and yes, had a very good time.

Four Clubs were represented. Rotary Clubs of: La Jolla, La Jolla Sunrise, Coastal San Diego, and our host, Rotary Club of the Golden Triangle.

The meeting opened with a Sing Along to "America the Beautiful" followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.



Our District Governor **Don Fipps** spoke, announcing the recent passing of former District Governor for 2022-2023, **Chuck Pretto.** (there was an audible gasp by the audience) **Dave Oates**, later eulogized him.



Contests of all sorts were held. First to determine who had been a member of Rotary for the longest time, (President **Barbara Brown** came in *second* at *37 years*), then who was a member for the shortest time. There was an award for who had the most Rotary pins. Additionally there was an impressive show and tell of all the projects each club's members were personally involved in. We proudly spoke of **TJ Scholars.** The other clubs talked of their club's achievements including **The Rebuild of Coast Walk**, an **Ensenada School rehab**, and a new **Life Guard station for Rosarita Beach**, among others.

Our Councilman Joe La Cava was the highlighted speaker. He gave an open discussion on issues before the city of San Diego as well as their significant budget issues. After fielding various complaints concerning city services, he stated generally, deficiences in city services were being caused by non competitive salaries in staffing. He also said in response to a question, re: the Recent "Free La Jolla" campaign, it was the strongest effort he had seen over the years. Nonetheless he noted the difficulties that will be involved in the uncoupling, pointing out the



last city to successfully achieve independence from the City of San Diego was Coronado in 1890.

After answering questions from the audience as best he could, he was thanked by the 4 **Rotary** presidents and received a <u>plethora</u> of speaker gifts, including two coffee mugs from Presidents' Christy White, Golden Triangle, Sam Doyle, La Jolla Sunrise, and Barbara Brown.



The Gong rang, and the meeting ended. No question, "A Jolly good time was had by all."

Who AM I ???

Bill Meanley, "Living the Dream"



There can be no doubt, **Bill Meanly** has had quite a life. Born at the old Scripps Hospital in 1946, the first 10 years of his life were spent at Windansea Beach. At age 10, his father bought a 22 acre ranch in Poway and he became an active member of 4-H instead of a surf club. The lack of good schools in rural Poway, meant communting with his Dad every day to La Jolla on old I-101, with just one stop sign, to attend school.

Life on the farm meant learning to drive a tractor, as well as becoming knowledgeable in raising sheep, cattle,

chickens, horses, and the like. High School was at both Escondido and Poway Hi. His college years were spent at the University of Santa Barbara where he earned a degree in Electrical Engineering.

His first job was at JPL¹ in Pasadena working on NASA's Space program in their High Power Transmitting Division. After the disappointment of Apollo 13, Congress cut NASA's budget significantly delaying the development of future

space travel. Irritated by the cut, at age 26 he decided to quit. He bought a VW bus and moved to Europe with his girlfriend at the time. For a year, they toured from Scotland to Morocco, Portugal to Austria, skiing in Chamonix during ski season.

By1973, he had returned to the US, broken up with his girfriend, and drove his VW bus to Lake Tahoe, where he took a job as a dishwasher. In Tahoe, he skied all day worked at night, met his wife to be Patty, and together they built a cabin by hand over three summers.

His father unfortunately died young, leaving Meanley Hardware to his mom to manage. She reached out and began to actively recruit Bill to return to La Jolla to help out. Eventually he agreed, growing tired of 4 years of snow, plus he was broke from building the house. On the way down to La Jolla, he and Patty married in Santa Barbara paying the judge \$35.00, and purchasing 2 wedding rings at a Pawn shop for \$10.00. It was 1976, and the beginning of Meanley & Son.

IN 1978, he was invited to join Rotary by Rim Madson and worked as our Scholarship and Vocational Director. Nine years later his life changed again. His family had a squabble as families sometimes do, and once again he decided to retire.

He bought a 37 foot sailboat, "Dolphin", and in April 87, together with Patty and their 7 year old daughter Kelly, sailed to the South Pacific for 2 1/2 years, visiting such places as Tahiti, Moorea, Bora Bora, the Cook Islands, stopping in New Zealand for the hurricane season, then on to the Figis' Samoa and Hawaii, eventually sailing to British Columbia and exploring the San Juan Islands.

They returned to San Diego in 89, enrolling Kelly in the 5th grade. Deciding he still liked being in the hardware business, Bill spent two years of cajoling the owner of Hammer and Nails in Pacific Beach to sell. Success occurred in 1991, and he became the store's new owner. He also rejoined Rotary, and continued to work in the Scholarship program as Chair as well as the Chair of the LJ Rotary Foundation.

During his talk, Biill commented, he tends to hold close things that are dear to him. He has been married to Patty for 48 years, still owns his Tahoe cottage built 50 years ago, his sailboat purchased 39 years ago as well as his store, Hammer and Nails, purchased 33 years ago. Our Rotary club of La Jolla joined some 46 years ago too remains special to him. These days, he s he spends much of his time either sailing Dolphin, or up in Tahoe at his cabin. Once in a while though, if you're lucky, you can find him working at Hammer and Nails.



Last Week's Speaker for January 23rd, on The Gary Sinise Foundation, Mike Ragsdale²



Mike Ragsdale, a member of the Board of Directors of the Gary Sinise San Diego Chapter, was an impressive speaker. Mike has over 20 years in the United States Intelligence Community and has extensive experience in building and leading teams and programs, detecting analyzing and mitigating threats, and thriving in ambiguity.

He joined the Navy in 2002 as an intelligence Officer. During his time in the Navy, he completed two deployments to the Middle.

East: one as an Air Intelligence Officer with a F/A - 18 Hornet squadron on board the aircraft carrier USS George Washington and the other as an interrogator with Special Operations Task Force in Iraq.

In 2008, Mike joined the FBI as a Senior Intelligence Analyst where he established and led an intelligence and liaison program in Washington DC. In 2012 he transferred to the San Diego Field Office and while working received an MBA from UCSD. Today he works on both National Security and Criminal Issues.

He began by telling us he joined the Gary Sinise Foundation because he has a passion for helping Vets like him who have just gotten out of the Military and are blindsided by civilian life.

Initially the Foundation worked only with vets with PTSD. Today it is more broadly based with Four Pillars of Service. 1. Building Mortgage free homes for the disabled, adapting vehicles and mobility devices to the needs of those with disabilities. 2. Providing programs of Relief and Resilience for families to build new memories, such as trips to Orlando's Disney World for vet families, as well Mental Health services. 3. Outreach and Education to the Community; to advise the public of their services, as well as educating the vets what is available to them both in educational and work opportunities. 4. A new category, First Responders, offering them the same services they offer to Veterans.

The Foundation's base of support is primarily from individual donations. Their intake is approximately \$70 million a year. After speaking to us, the audience had numerous questions about **Mike's** military service as well as the various work and education related programs the Foundation works with.

In closing Mike said, if any of us knew of someone who had needs that the Foundation might be able to address, to contact him.³
