

Introduction

I am sure that we are all happy to feel as we start another year of service, that upon this foundation we have built an organization which will be of increasing usefulness to the community. So, even as I congratulate you, I urge you to look ahead in the assurance that "the best is yet to be."

I take this opportunity to express my personal thanks to all of our members and to many of our visitors for their willingness to cooperate and to make "my year" a most pleasant one for me.

FIVE-YEAR HISTORY

Some interesting facts covering the history of the La Jolla Rotary Club, its formation, activity and progress during the years 1947 to 1952 inclusive.

In order to develop a history of the La Jolla Rotary Club it will be necessary to go back several years in order to get a true picture of events preceding the granting of our Charter.

From what can be learned a number of petitions were made to the San Diego Club to release enough territory for the formation of a club in La Jolla. All of these petitions were rejected for various reasons, but the men who were interested most felt that sooner or later it could be accomplished.

Sometime in the early part of 1947 the matter was brought up again and this time was successful. The San Diego Club finally was convinced that if the influence of Rotary was to be extended, La Jolla was one area that could qualify for the formation of another Club. It is to be noted that the men who had labored so hard not only from the beginning but in the final and successful action were Gordon Gray, George Ash and Fred Annabel. It is felt too, that Cecil Crew, who was our District Governor when final action was taken, as well as John Fox, our District Governor the first year, contributed greatly toward the culmination of the work of these men. With permission for the formation of a Rotary Club in La Jolla granted, effort began to find the necessary number of men who could qualify for membership. In all this preliminary work Gordon Gray took the lead and it was felt that because of his long experience and his wide knowledge of Rotary, he was best qualified to guide this new Club in its formative stage. It was not long before the formalities were completed and we were ready to ask for a Charter. This was done and our request was granted. It is to be noted that at the same time permission was granted for the formation of the Old Mission Club and it so happened that our Charter and Old Mission's were presented at a joint meeting in the San Diego Hotel on the evening of April 27, 1947. This was a gala affair, a never to be forgotten experience, as seldom does it happen that two new Clubs receive their Charters at the same time.

Speaker for the day was Bruce Watt, manager of Stationer's Corporation and member of the San Diego Club. He spoke on the application of the ideal of service by every Rotarian to his personal, business and community life.

We are happy that we have held our birthday celebration with Old Mission several times. With our Charter in hand the next step was to effect an organization. Again because of his work from the beginning, his inspiration, counsel and advice in all the preliminary efforts leading up to the successful culmination of our dreams, Gordon was selected to guide us in our early life. Certainly we were fortunate that we had such men as Gordon Gray, George Ash and Fred Annable, two Past District Governors, and, in addition, Otto Bradshaw, a Past President, to help lay the foundation of our Club on solid ground. This has been proven by the progress and activity shown over the short time of five years.

Perhaps nothing is so important in the beginning of any organization as laying a firm foundation to insure a worthwhile future. Consequently the officers, with Gordon Gray as President, Otto Bradshaw as Vice President, and Kenneth Glazebrook as Secretary, spent most of the following two months in


inoculating the new Rotarians with a zealous Rotary spirit, re-vitalizing the old Rotarians thereby binding all of us in a united working group ready to begin in earnest the building of a larger Rotary Club for La Jolla.

This Club started with twenty members, and it is thought well to record the names and classifications of the men who had the honor of starting La Jolla Rotary. They are as follows:

It would be difficult if not impossible to mention a worthwhile Community Project undertaken in this community, that was not either sponsored or participated in by some Rotarians, during the last five years.


You have joined in the Visa movement (Visiting International Students Association) by sponsoring a student from Japan and thereby doing your bit to bring International understanding to a closer realization.

Gordon Gray



**One of the organizers and the first President
from April, 1947 to July, 1947**

Born on a farm in southwestern Michigan on August 20, 1877, Gordon Gray spent his boyhood in the nearby town of Niles. The outstanding event in his early life was an extended trip to Scandinavia, Russia and Central Europe. After graduating from high school, he went east to college and law school. In 1903 he was admitted to practice in the State of Illinois and was employed by a prominent law firm in Chicago.


He moved to San Diego in 1910 and opened law offices in the Union Building. The following year Gordon was instrumental in starting the San Diego Rotary Club and two years later became its President. At the International convention in Houston in 1915, he was elected a director of International Rotary.

In 1927 he organized the law firm of Gray, Cary, Ames & Driscoll (now Gray, Cary, Ames & Frye), of which he is still the senior member. Gordon moved from San Diego to La Jolla in 1929 but did not spend much time here until the firm opened a branch office in La Jolla in 1941. In 1947 Gordon assisted Fred Annable in organizing the La Jolla Rotary Club and became its first President.

**PROGRESS AND ACTIVITY OF THE TRANSIENT PERIOD
OF APRIL, MAY AND JUNE, 1947**

It would be difficult to attempt to evaluate the progress and activities of such a short period of time, yet in these three months, much was done to insure the future success of the La Jolla Rotary Club. The first group of officers consisted of Gordon Gray, president; Otto Bradshaw, vice president (two men with a wealth of Rotary experience), and Ken Glazebrook, secretary. With the counsel and advice of the two Past District Governors, Fred Annabel and George Ash, they can take pride in the accomplishments of those two or three months. Their work consisted primarily in welding the twenty charter members into a working organization, getting the group in a friendly, co-operative attitude, educating them in the real concept of Rotary. This was especially necessary with those members who had had no previous understanding of Rotary ideals, its aims and objects. How well this work was done can be attested to by the progress of the Club during the succeeding years. The Club can justly be proud of their leaders during this transient period and to their untiring efforts to lay a strong foundation for its future success.

Otto H. Bradshaw



Second President 1947-1948

Otto was born in Council Bluffs, Iowa, and received his education in Council Bluffs and Omaha, Nebraska. His first venture in business was as an apprentice in watch and clock repairing. He then went to Belle Fourche in the Black Hills and went into the jewelry business. He became interested in optical work and went to Chicago and took a course in Optometry in the McCormich Medical School and later practiced in South Dakota and Nebraska. Being of a roving nature he migrated to California and went to work as a salesman and bought an interest in a wholesale Optical company in Los Angeles and a year later came to San Diego for the same company. In 1920 feeling the need for outdoor life, he purchased what has been described as a run down ranch near El Centro in Imperial Valley and here he found the work he loved the most, growing grapes, fruit of all kinds and farm products. Being of a most industrious nature, it was not long before this old run-down ranch, began to blossom like a rose.

During the twenty-three years spent in the valley he took on active part in all kinds of Farm Bureau work. He served on the board of directors and as chairman of one of the Bureau centers. He was intensely interested in the Associated Farmers, a state organization devoted to fighting Communism and protecting the interest of farmers and farm workers. He served on the board of directors and was president for one year. He took an active part in the Masonic lodge, as Master in 1929-1930, and served as inspector of lodges in Imperial Valley for three years. He also was on the advisory board of the Bank of America at El Centro, and as chairman for a year. He also served as secretary of the Grape Growers association and was on the board of the Imperial Valley Grape and Fruit Growers for several years. He joined the El Centro Rotary Club in 1925 and served as its president in 1929-30. His classification was Grape and Fruit Grower. In 1934 he moved to La Jolla and states this is his last move. He has been active in community affairs and became one of the charter members of the La Jolla club.

His many and varied activities most eminently fitted him to become the second president of the club. The record of the progress and activities of the club under his leadership is a glowing tribute to him. Of his work in our Club, it might well be said "Well done thou good and true Rotarian."


PROGRESS AND ACTIVITY OF THE SECOND YEAR OF
LA JOLLA ROTARY CLUB — 1947-1948

This year was notable for the increase in membership. Sixteen new members were added to the Roster, making a total of 36 members at the end of the year. Its activities were as follows:

- 1st: Contributed to the American Red Cross
- 2nd: Sponsored and aided the San Diego Boy Scouts Camp
- 3rd: Sponsored the La Jolla Planning Council in conjunction with other clubs and interested citizens. Otto was a member of the Council from Rotary.
- 4th: Participated in the new Palm Springs Rotary Club
- 5th: Sponsored San Diego Orchid Show in La Jolla
- 6th: Joined with the Soroptimist club in starting Essay contests in our high school.
- 7th: Assisted in the Tuberculosis Mobile Chest X-Ray
- 8th: Raised by voluntary subscriptions \$260.00 for the Rotary International Fund. This was the first club in the district to secure the subscription of 100% of its members.
- 9th: Established the first Ladies' Night and a Stag Party for the members.

The above represents a splendid accomplishment for which we were highly complimented by our own District Governor, John Fox.

Kenneth Glazebrook



Third President 1948-49

Ken was born May 28, 1909 in Syracuse, New York; moved with his family to Yakima and later to Spokane, when 16 months old. We presume that he had the usual common school education as he graduated from high school in due course. His experience has been so varied he might be placed in the "Jack of All Trades" category, for he went to work in a grocery store when 11 years old, became a relief manager of a small chain of food stores at 15 and later manager of MacMarr Stores, later Safeway. His experience runs the gauntlet of grocery stores, health food and then with the H. J. Heinz company. About 1933 he entered the life insurance field with the Sun Life Insurance company and later transferred to the Prudential. In 1935 he became interested in real estate and general contracting. In 1942 he went back to life insurance for a year. He did some work for the government and later became connected with Consolidated as an estimator and moved to La Jolla. At the end of the war he formed the Glazebrook-Nelson Real Estate company and in 1949 incorporated Mobilhomes, his present affiliation. A very busy fellow I would say.

Married in 1930, he has two children and a very charming wife.

He has always been interested in civic affairs and in La Jolla he was president of the Real Estate Brokers association, helped form the La Jolla Planning commission, now the La Jolla Town Council; was president of La Jolla Rotary Club 1948-49 and one of its charter members.

THE CLUB'S ACTIVITIES AND PROGRESS DURING ITS THIRD YEAR

Ken's year was actually the second year of operation and the main objective was good fellowship among the members, as well as learning how to entertain the visiting Rotarians. It was during this year that members were loaned their Rotary buttons at the time they were accepted into Rotary, as well as the frame for the "Objects of Rotary."

The community project for the year 1948-1949 was to provide a fund to be used at the Scripps hospital for the purpose of helping children who were in need of hospitalization but were unable to pay for it.

The first international project was the sending of CARE packages to Clithero and Lewton, England.

At the close of the year the service club signs were erected at the north entrance and the south entrance to La Jolla.

During Ken's administration the first club bulletin was issued.

The sum of \$36.00 was allocated to the La Jolla Grade School to defray expenses for grade school children that were unable to pay their own way, to the Cuyamaca winter camp.

The first membership roster was printed in February, 1949.

A very successful joint venture with the Soroptimist Club was concluded, sponsoring an essay contest at the La Jolla High school and appropriate prizes in the form of savings bonds were given.

\$100.00 was given to the Boy Scouts of America for their proposed home at the Balboa Park camp.

A very successful joint birthday party was held at the Old Mission club, April 26, 1949. The La Jolla club hosted the President and Secretary clubs in May of 1949.

One of the social highlights of the year was the stag party held at Joan Ray's in June.

Sidelights to add interest to the meetings were the piggy bank, the Rotary necktie, and fining for such things as advertising, etc.

The membership of the club increased to 39, an increase of five new members. A very creditable showing in view of the fact that the limitation placed on membership of only one individual representing an approved classification can be accepted.

Kenneth Rearwin



Fourth President 1949-1950

Ken was born in Salina, Kansas, July 19, 1913. He graduated from the Salina High school and then entered Northwestern University in the N. U. School of Commerce where he graduated in 1935 with highest honors.

He entered the Aircraft business in Kansas City and when the Rearwin Aircraft & Engines, Inc., was formed he became secretary and sales manager. This company was a large manufacturer of troop carrying gliders. In 1943 he resigned his position to become affiliated with the TWA, now the Trans-World Airlines as assistant to the treasurer and later entered the U. S. Navy as a reserve officer. While in Kansas City he was active in various community activities. On various trips around the country he fell in love with La Jolla and in 1947 came here to reside. He became associated with the brokerage firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Beane in their San Diego office and in 1949 opened their sales office in La Jolla where he is now stationed.

He has served on many committees, including the aviation committee of the San Diego Chamber of Commerce and the Junior Chamber. He is now a director of La Jolla Art Center, a member of American Legion Post No. 275 and a member of the San Diego Board of Education.

His numerous activities eminently fitted him for guiding the La Jolla Rotary Club as its third president during the year 1949-1950.

**PROGRESS AND ACTIVITY OF THE FOURTH YEAR OF
THE LA JOLLA ROTARY CLUB**

This was another year of real activity and progress. Starting with a membership of 37 the year ended with 49 members.


This increase was obtained by strengthening the organization and filling open classifications.

The principal projects started and accomplished during the year were:

- 1—A Welcome to La Jolla sign listing the names of the different Service Clubs, was installed at the junction of 101 north of town and also at Turquoise street at the south end.
- 2—A double room was furnished in the new wing of the Scripps Memorial hospital at a cost of \$900.00. A most formidable project for a small club.
- 3—This year marked the beginning of our weekly club bulletin.
- 4—The first club roster was designed and distributed to the members.
- 5—Distinctive make-up cards were designed and give to guest Rotarians.
- 6—An outstanding La Jolla High school junior or senior student was invited to be our guest at our weekly meetings.
- 7—A donation of \$100.00 was made to the emergency Infantile Paralysis fund.
- 8—A Girl Scout troop was sponsored and flags were given to them. \$70.00 was appropriated to send Girl Scouts to camp if otherwise unable to attend.
- 9—The second annual Soroptimist-Rotary Essay contest for La Jolla High school juniors and seniors was sponsored and prizes of cash awards were contributed to the winners.
- 10—San Diego Boy Scouts were given \$100.00 toward their new building. The club also participated with other service clubs in printing Safety Calendars. Distinctive letter openers were presented to visiting Rotarians.
- 11—Held a joint meeting with the Old Mission club celebrating the formation of our club, with Cecil Crew, Past District Governor, as guest speaker, and Ralph Black, president of San Diego club, as our honored guest.

We also held a joint meeting with the Tijuana club. Held a Ladies' Night Valentine party and a stag affair during the year.

Emory W. Armacost



Fifth President 1950-51

Emory Watson Aramacost, better known by the less imposing name of "Buz," president of the La Jolla Rotary club for the 1950-51 year. "Buz" is a charter member of the club and without a doubt, one member of the La Jolla club who is entitled to the name "Mr. Rotarian." He is one of our outstanding members who has taken seriously the Rotary slogan "Service Above Self."

A real native son, born in Oakland, California, September, 1912. His family moved to San Francisco the next year and he completed grammar and high school in San Francisco—then commuted to University of California for two years of pre-medical training.

He left school in 1932 during the depression to join the then exceedingly thin ranks of "the employed." His first full scale wage earning efforts were in a garage, but unknown to him at this time destiny was pushing him to a new endeavor, namely Butler Bros., San Francisco branch. He rose from the ranks at Butler's to become an exceedingly capable credit man. It was here that he met Betty Robinson (the boss' secretary) and convinced her that a good credit man was a solid risk, even in a depression and they were married November, 1935.

During the war years he was employed by the San Francisco Port of Embarkation as administrative assistant in Civilian Personnel. The end of the war brought an opportunity to move to Southern California, first Laguna, then La Jolla.

**ACTIVITIES AND PROGRESS OF LA JOLLA ROTARY
FOR THE YEAR 1950-1951**


This has been another year of unusual progress and activity as evidenced by the following:

- 1—This year saw the introduction of singing as a regular practice. A fine thing to build up Rotary spirit.
- 2—Decision was made to award buttons for 100% attendance to increase interest.
- 3—Complimented wives with corsages on their birthdays, and gave members birthday cakes.
- 4—Changed method of election of officers to conform with Rotary International constitution and by-laws.
- 5—Arranged for and had two Ladies' Nights with the Tijuana club as a means of fostering international relationship.
- 6—The principal project for the year and its main activity was setting up a Student Loan fund of more than \$800.00.

There were many other things of lesser importance but which contributed greatly to the progress of the club. Club activity is the tonic that promotes real progress and this year we witnessed a decided growth in the development of Rotary spirit.

Starting the year with a membership of 47, the year closed with a Roster of 53 members, thereby, showing real progress, not alone in members, for mere numbers mean little, but in quality and a greater desire to render service.

Paul D. Spillane



Sixth President 1951-52

Paul was born in Watertown, Massachusetts, and very shortly thereafter moved to Brookline, Massachusetts, six miles from Boston.

He suffered from early childhood with a bronchial condition, which necessitated his spending about six months every year in bed, until he was seventeen years old. Therefore, he has the distinction of having received his education through private tutoring.

When he was 23 years of age he came to California for his health and on various occasions visited La Jolla.

After he returned to Boston Paul's first job was acquired at the age of twenty-six at the famous Hollis Street theatre, in Boston, which was owned and operated by Erlanger, Dillingham and Ziegfeld. His first job was "office boy;" the following year he was assistant treasurer and that followed a year later with his being made treasurer. Two years later he was made treasurer-manager. In 1931, the theatre became an independent legitimate theatre. During the succeeding five years original stage plays were produced. Paul produced five plays himself during this period. He later was connected with the Shubert theatres in Boston as treasurer, and also was director of ticket sales for the Metropolitan Opera association for several seasons, and in the summer, when the legitimate theatres were closed, he was in charge of the ticket sales and the business end of the National Doubles Tennis championships, for seven seasons at the Longwood Cricket club, Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts. In 1942 he became subscription manager for the Boston Symphony orchestra.

In 1945, due to the severe Boston winters, he decided to resign from his position with the Boston Symphony Orchestra and came west. He located in La Jolla and became manager of Cochran & Company, Jewelers, which business was liquidated in 1949. He then returned to his first love "selling tickets" by entering into a partnership at the La Jolla Travel Bureau.

Paul was married in Boston June 26, 1938, to Lola Mason and they have one child, Paul, Junior, age 11.

In La Jolla Paul has been most active in civic affairs. He was a member of the board of directors of the Merchants' association, the Merchants' Credit association, president of the Community Concerts and president of La Jolla Players.

His genial nature, together with his quick wit, and fine expression, has made him an exceptionally fine president of Rotary.

- 2—Sponsored a Japanese student at Scripps Institution of Oceanograph for Visa, Noriyuki Nasu—"Nori" a gentleman liked by all.
- 3—Held a joint International Rotary meeting with Tijuana, Mexico, at the Tijuana club.
- 4—Contributed to the Crusade for Freedom program.
- 5—Sponsored a second Brownie Scout troop.
- 6—Contributed to the purchase of magazines by the Red Cross for use in Naval hospitals.
- 7—Purchased clothing for two needy school children and Christmas baskets for their families.
- 8—Sent \$200.00 to the victims of the Tijuana fire disaster.
- 9—Contributed \$75.00 to the Infantile Paralysis drive.
- 10—Started proceedings to have a "Drive-Up" mail box installed at the curb outside the postoffice.
- 11—Held a Ladies' Night Valentine party at the La Jolla Beach and Tennis club. Governor Fred and first lady Jeane came from Covina to attend. Presented District Governor Fred with a portrait of himself painted by Lola Spillane.
- 12—Produced a Fifth Anniversary Book of the Rotary Club of La Jolla.
- 13—Held annual birthday party with our twin club, Old Mission.
- 14—Contributed \$200 to the Gillispie Foundation Welfare Cottage Fund.
- 15—Donated two one hundred dollar scholarships for one boy and one girl at La Jolla High School to further their college education.
- 16—Progress of the Club has been most satisfactory during this year as evidenced by a further increase in the membership. Starting the year there were 53 active members on July 1, 1951. So far, since that date we have added nine new members and lost two for a net gain of seven. For the purpose of this History, it will record a membership of 60 active members as of May 1.
