History of The East County Californian

The East County Californian has been the hometown newspaper of the eastern region of San Diego since 1892. The East County community has grown up reading us, delivered our papers, interned for us and were covered in our high school sports section. We have a rich history in our community and still today drive a strong, loyal readership of over 71,000 readers weekly. We have been committed to delivering hyper-local news coverage for over 120 years serving the communities of Spring Valley, Lemon Grove, El Cajon, La Mesa, Santee and Lakeside.

The Californian started out publishing monthly and became the Daily Californian publishing six days a week until 1999. In 2000, Jay Harn, the owner of The Alpine Sun and the Forum newspapers purchased the Californian name. He then began publishing The East County Californian on a weekly basis. In 2003, CommunityMedia Corp purchased the paper and have continued weekly publication since that time.

The East County Californian publishes every Thursday and offers the best local news coverage and distribution available with a circulation of 32,500 copies delivered weekly. We are the only home delivered weekly community newspaper reaching 17,000 homes in addition to 15,500 bulk dropped into 225 high traffic locations.



Prospective New Member: Terrence Young



Terrence Young is the Vice President of Dry Express Restoration. What Is RYLA?

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is a program that originated with Rotary International and has subsequently been specifically designed by Rotary District 5340 for students in San Diego and Imperial Counties. RYLA is held at Idyllwild Pines Camp in Idyllwild, California.

RYLA encourages servant leadership in youth by recognizing and rewarding deserving 11th grade students who are chosen to attend RYLA as an "award" for their past and present leadership and service activities. These select young people attend an all-expense-paid camp where they are inspired by a diverse group of exceptional speakers, make life-long friends through fellowship activities, and discuss the ethical and social issues of today. These activities are conducted in an atmosphere of trust and respect. The result is that these students return to their schools and communities motivated to take on additional leadership roles and to find additional ways to serve.

RYLA's intent is to encourage students to be more effective servant leaders. RYLA is not a camp intended to teach leadership skills (it is assumed that the students in attendance already possess those skills), however the following topics naturally arise in the course of RYLA activities and discussions:

- Fundamentals of leadership
- Ethics of positive leadership
- Qualities of a "servant leader"
- Importance of communication skills in effective leadership
- Conflict management and problem solving
- Building self-esteem and self confidence
- Elements of community and global citizenship
- Rotary's purpose of service to the community and world

RYLA began in Rotary District 5340 in 1972 with 100 participants and has since grown to include more than 350 participants annually. Rotary Clubs in District 5340 look each year for high school juniors who are outstanding school and/or community leaders with a strong service background to apply for RYLA. If you are selected to participate in RYLA, you will have the opportunity to exchange ideas with knowledgeable District 5340 Rotarians who are local and regional leaders.
