Gail donated \$10,000.00 towards the gardens and orchards at our Change-over last Rotary year and she has been working on getting it started. There is a soil test and excavations to improve the soil is underway and the fruit trees and berries will be planted soon. We have a grant application in for more planter beds, water tank, irrigation and drip feed system which would all help to make this project be one that will be fully usable by the students and staff from the Primary School.

The Healthy Lifestyle Project involves school staff in trying to make the children aware of eating healthy produce. By having the children involved in planting and nurturing the berries, vegetables and fruit trees, it will definitely help in the understanding of what it takes to grow these produce. #### Kliuchevskoi

The tallest mountain (also transliterated from Cyrillic as Klyuchevskoy, 4835M) in Russia's far eastern Kamchatka peninsula is also its most active stratovolcano, with a fairly continuous record of eruption during the last 6,000 years. Its eruption products are basaltic, accounting for about half of Kamchatka's total yearly output, and the mountain is surrounded by flank vents and scoria cones.
