Monday 18 March 2019 – Annette Parkes-Considine from Hunter Diabetes Centre



An excellent evening of education on Diabetes awareness was presented by Annette Parkes-Considine from the Hunter Diabetes Centre.

Annette is a Registered Nurse and Credentialed Diabetes Educator, who provides her patients with evidenced based, best your team for a healthy life! practice diabetes education.

Annette also speaks from experience as she has been a Type 1

sufferer for over 30 years.

The Hunter Diabetes Centre has been running clinical trials for the past year to find ways of helping those who suffer from Types 1 & 2.

An interesting statistic is that the Hunter has the biggest cluster of Type 1 in NSW. In Australia it is on the rise by 3% per year.

Type 2 is the most common and may be early or late onset, there is no specific age group that it affects. There are many contributing factors including age, family history and global location.

Women who have gestational diabetes have a tendency to move to Type 2. Type 2 can be a progressive condition and most well end up insulin dependent.

An alarming fact is that children are now being diagnosed with Type 2.

It is estimated that by the year 2030, 3.3 million people will be diagnosed with diabetes.

Some ways of preventing Type 2 are, lose weight, keep active, making healthy food choices and reducing serving sizes.

A most informative and entertaining night.



Monday 25 March 2019 - Night out at the Rotary Club of Cardiff at Wests Cardiff



Another one of the classic nights out, this time with 16 Waratah club members, partners and friends joining the Rotary Club of Cardiff at their meeting at Wests Cardiff.

We were made most welcome and certainly enjoyed the guest speaker Sarah Gray from Life Education Hunter Region. HLE has been in existence for 34 years and is run by a Board of Directors.

Their original Centre was opened 30 years ago with funds from the NBN Telethon. "Healthy Harold" is still their giraffe mascot. In the first year 7,000 students attended their sessions, but in 2018 this grew to 32,500 in the Hunter region. The area covered is from Denman to Forster to the Central Coast.

The program is based around preventative health; drugs, alcohol, cyberspace bullying and up to this point has been for primary students. They are about to launch a new program for high school students from year 7 to 10.

The last 18 months have concentrated on the following programs:

Decisions: a drug program for year 6 students to give them the skills to avoid peer pressure going into high school. Knowledge is power!

High School Drug Program: A high school program designed to be more on details about the effects of drugs on the body, and to put the myths to bed

with high schoolers. This program is interactive through a mobile phone app that students work through in the class.

Respect and Connect: All about personal safety, bullying and cyberspace bullying. A new concept for this decade. These days bullying can follow a student home via the web without a parent's knowledge. Each of these programs come with a parent component.

Hunter Life Education programs have remained basically the same and cover everything from children's health to wellbeing. They keep themselves abreast of the "new" challenges to young people.



The organisation is part-funding by the NSW Department of Health at \$4 per student with other funding coming from corporate sponsors and the community. It costs \$26 per student to run the program in the Hunter. The Federal Government cover the cost of designing the programs not necessarily delivering them. Nationally, over 1,000,000 students have benefited from HLE.

Sarah attended a "Breaking the Ice" forum in Maitland recently and expanded on the ice epidemic in this area, and the concerns we all should have around this issue. The forum

was to address the problems associated with young people making one wrong decision. Sarah confidently shared statistics on young people being much healthier than several decades ago with only 20% to 40% drinking to a concerning level, and 12 to 18 year-olds not taking up smoking. The main issue is obesity with young children. This improves as they reach their teenage years.

Mission Australia conducted a survey on the three main issues concerning young people these days. They were (1) Drug and Alcohol, (2) Image and (3) Financial Stability in adulthood. The pressure these days is on young people studying hard, so they are financially secure in the future.

Unfortunately, the Hunter has the highest presentation at hospitals for substance abuse than anywhere in Australia.

Interestingly, the issue among young people about nationality and sexuality is not an issue for them. Sarah was well received and appropriately thanked with a donation to Life Education Hunter Region from the Rotary Club of Cardiff.

We look forward to sharing more nights with other clubs like this in the future.
