Apex in action — or inaction

"...Not since the dark days of the Great Depression and World War 2 has there been such a crying need for real leadership in Australia. Apex — the Australian Service Club, can provide this leadership at National and local levels...".

How often have we heard this said? More importantly, is it true, and if so how can we make it happen?

The "state of the nation" at any one time is a moot point. There will never be (fortunately) complete agreement, in a society as diverse as ours, as to what constitutes problem areas and what are examples of acceptable solutions.

However, I think it fair to assume a consensus that we ALWAYS need a good supply of leaders, at all levels — unhappy is the nation with a "Hobsons Choice" of leaders!

Australia is a different society from its European ancestors. There has been for nearly 200 years a conscious rejection of the concept of a "ruling class". W.C. Wentworth's proposal of an hereditary aristocracy was laughed out of existence in the 1850's. Much to the despair of quite a number of immigrants, accustomed to automatic respect in their home countries due to the circumstances of their birth. Australians have tended to grant respect only when it is earned.

This robust democratic philosophy has led to problems in the past. Most notable of these have been in the military sphere; Australian soldiers in 2 World Wars frequently fell foul of the British (and in WW2 the American) military establishment. Similarly, the talents of General Monash in WW1 were slow to be recognised because "he is only a citizen — soldier, not a real general". Monash was, of course, arguably the most able commander on the western front.



A like problem bedevils industrial relations. There is no question that the preconceived ideas of "class enemies" held by some "Pommy shop-stewards" have caused as many problems as has the arrogance displayed by some "would-be-if-they-could-be" managers.

Our healthy democratic traditions carry with them, I believe, the seeds of a rather more insidious problem. Too many of our Leaders are afraid to lead.

How often do we see this in politics? The leader who is honest enough to stand up and tell us the truth about how tough things are gets shot down in flames. The one who pretends everything will be hunky-dory — "Just trust me" — gets hailed for his political nous. The short term gain is the target all the time.

I am afraid it is we who are to blame for this. We demand accountability only in the sense that we must not be hurt, and that if things go wrong, it is someone else's fault — preferably our leaders, because we can sack them at the next election.

The fact is, we are NOT seen by the community as an active aggressive group of young men, keen to right the wrongs in our society. We are seen increasingly as a conservative group of middle-aged men trying hard to pretend that Australia and the world have not changed for the last 15 or 20 years. I believe the evidence for this is that (i) we are increasingly ignored by Governments, as indicated by our National President, and (ii) we are increasingly ignored by the younger sections of our community, as shown by our ever declining membership in the under 25 areas.

To restore the position to what we believe it should be, we are going to have to allow our leaders more freedom — at all levels of Apex. Instead of howling for blood when a decision is made that we don't immediately like, why don't we look for ways of making it happen?

Our leaders within Apex must feel confident about their positions. It is not a sound display of leadership to say to every difficult decision "... I don't know, I'll have to consult my Club/District/Zone on that". All too often it is an abdication of responsibility. If this attitude change can come about, we may see Apex Clubs, Districts, Zones and the Association once again taking their rightful leadership positions out in front, at the cutting edge, where life ain't easy. We may feel a little uncomfortable - but is that so undesirable really?

The respect we expect from the community is that which we, the current membership, earn — not that which our predecessors earned. Do we have the confidence, the courage, to go out and face the loneliness of leadership? I hope so!
