I grew up in a historic town, Berwick upon Tweed, in England. The last town in England on the east coast, it has changed hands with Scotland 13 times and was still at war with Russia until about 20 years ago.

My hobbies at that time were dancing and dressmaking, mostly wedding dresses and evening gowns. I was part of a local entertainment group which competed in a television series with other border towns.

I lived in Scotland for 16 years in Coldstream, another border town and home of the famous regiment The Coldstream Guards. I was persuaded to take the girl guides then ended up being the district commissioner. By then I had another interest in gardening. I enjoyed entering the local show every year to show my roses and won many prizes. I still love my roses.

My work at that time was working for an agricultural company where I trained as a cereal crop inspector. I was actually the first woman in England to be an accredited inspector. I was also involved with the haulage side of the business.

Moving back to England I ran a haulage company for ten years before moving to Australia. The owner of the company always said if I ever left he would sell the business, which he did, six weeks after me leaving.

Apart from my paid work I was a member of the Northumbria Police for 28 years. It is a voluntary service known as Special Constables. I worked up through the ranks to Divisional Commandant in charge of 300 officers, covering 600 square miles. The highlight of that part of my career was when I received a commendation from the Chief Constable for my involvement in a local murder.

Twenty-three years ago I arrived in this wonderful country after marrying my husband, Alan, after getting together again after 30 years. I have continued my community work, being involved with Rotary,.Winmalee Neighbourhood Centre, Sister City committee and Buttenshaw gardens. More recently I am getting involved with Support the girls Australia.

I will always support our community and we love to travel.
