Meeting summary from 16 August

The Rotary Club of Springwood, Inc. certainly had an enormously interesting zoom meeting last Monday with two superb presentations.

Rachel Dunwell of Destiny Rescue provided insight into the work undertaken in a number of third world countries (including Philippines, Cambodia, Nepal, Thailand, Dominican Republic) rescuing children from sex slavery and trafficking. Founded in 2001 by Australian Tony Kirwin,

Destiny Rescue has to date saved over 7000 children from a life of shameful abuse and violence. The data Rachel presented was both sobering and tragic:

- At least 1 million children worldwide are victims of sexual exploitation
- 99% of them are girls (aged 0 – 18 years)
- 73% are from Asia and the Pacific
- The commercial trade of children generates \$99 billion annually (2017)
- A child is trafficked every 27 seconds.

Destiny Rescue undertakes a number of different strategies in their efforts to rescue these children and they include:

- Covert – Teams of 2 agents go undercover, gain the trust of the child and develop an exit strategy

- Raids – Agents team up with local authorities, arresting pimps and closing establishments
- Borders – Agents patrol the countries borders and intercept children before they are trafficked into neighbouring countries
- Interventional – Investigate local tip offs and intervene where necessary, in some cases this includes the prevention of child marriages.

Once rescued, a 'Freedom Plan' is developed to enable the child to remain safe and protected from future exploitation.

Michelle Ellery spoke to the work of ROMAC (Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children) and the impact it has on improving the lives of children with significant medical diseases or injuries in small developing countries in our region.

ROMAC commenced in 1988 and is an official Rotary International Project and is

totally run by volunteers. Each year medical care and intervention is provided to between 40-50 children of 15 years or younger. Whilst initially ROMAC

was Australian based, in 2004 New Zealand also became a partner in this essential program. The medical specialities offered are wide ranging and include – cardiac, orthopaedics, ophthalmology and plastic surgery.

For the children treated each year the outcomes are usually life changing, with most going on to live significantly better lives. It's sometimes hard to rationalise that in countries just on our doorstep (Timor Leste, PNG, Fiji, Tonga, Vanuatu & Solomon Islands) that the medical care we come to just expect is out of reach for the general populations of these neighbouring countries.

Michelle stated that ROMAC requires approx. \$750,000 annually to treat the 40+ children; she invited us to consider becoming a friend of ROMAC.

I would like to thank our many Rotary
Clubs for their interest and support for the
program over the past 16 years of this life-
changing project. Your contribution is
invaluable. You can be sure that we plan
and work hard to make a positive and
sustainable impact on the lives of
underprivileged children born with a cleft
lip or palate in Bangladesh.

The pandemic has meant the last 18
months have been very trying for the
Bangladeshi Community. Despite all the
challenges, lockdowns, and Covid-19
community fatalities Operation Cleft
together with our partner DCKH have
completed more than 1,600 life changing
surgeries in this last 12 months.

This wonderful humanitarian Rotary
program could not achieve the impact
without Rotary Club support. For more
than 16 years we have reached out to
the poorest of the poor in Bangladesh,
offering hope and providing services that
would not be available without Rotary.
The success of this project with more than
15,000 free surgical operations now
completed is only possible because Clubs
have joined with us to make it possible.

But there is still much to do with more
than 5,500 children in Bangladesh born
with a cleft lip or palate each year.
