The Ross Ingram Award – Norm and Cheryl Kitto

The Ross Ingram Award is a new award to be presented to a member for outstanding Community Service. PP Ross Ingram, who passed away suddenly last year, was an exceptional community member who provided extensive service to or community over many, many years. He will always be remembered for his exceptional support to bushfire victims, the seniors' community lunches, and to so many people in need in the community.

The initial recipient of this award is not one, but two people. Norm and Cheryl Kitto have long been active supporters of the Ronald McDonald House, and have been first to volunteer for any community appeal or event. In particular, during the COVID outbreak over the past year their support of both members and others in the community by collecting meals, shopping etc has been notable.

Bob was born at Barmedman in 1930 and with his twin brother was one of 5 children raised on the land. He attended a one-teacher school at nearby Reefton until he reached high school, when he moved to Yass with his family and attended the local high school. This involved a 7-mile bike ride into the wind to and from school each day through "rain, hail and snow" and he claims the wind changed and he had to ride into the wind to get home again. This has become a family favourite story!!

After doing his Leaving Certificate, he joined the Commonwealth Bank, with his first postings being to Dee Why and Manly branches, and then to a very desirable position on migrant ships, setting up bank accounts for the new arrivals. He did 13 trips from Fremantle to Sydney on board migrant ships and was then posted to the inspection staff where he travelled extensively around NSW cities and towns.

Bob decided that he wanted to study accountancy so asked the bank for a transfer to a place where he could study

at Technical College, and he was appointed to head office in Canberra where he began his accountancy course at night. After several years of this, he left the bank and accepted a position with Goodyear tyres in the late 1950's.

I met Bob in 1959. After a year there, Goodyear wanted him to travel overseas but he told them he had had enough of living out of suitcases, was still studying at night and he was engaged to me. Once he completed his accountancy course, he became cost accountant at Speedo Knitting Mills, where he stayed for many years.

We married in 1961, bought a home at Beacon Hill and later at Belrose, and had a daughter Susan and a son Robert. However, Bob really wanted his own business, and we bought our first newsagency at West Lindfield which we ran for 4 years, during which time we had another son, David. We then sold it and bought Strathfield Newsagency.

Strathfield Plaza opened in 1981 and together with my brother-in-law, a pharmacist, we combined adjoining shops to make a combined newsagency and pharmacy. We sold the street newsagency shortly after this and as no deliveries were involved with the plaza shop, Bob was relieved that he no longer had to get up at 3am to prepare papers and sometimes deliver them. We ran this shop until 1987, sold out and travelled to

UK , Europe, USA, New Zealand , Pacific Islands and the Antarctic over the next few years.

Bob pursued a number of charitable causes including Walcha- the Work and Leisure Centre for disabled adults at Bexley, and Motor Neurone Association of NSW where he was financial director for many years. I returned to teaching at a school for severely and profoundly disabled children (aged 4 to 18 years old) at Lakemba, which I loved.

In 2006, we decided to retire to Blue Mountains. Bob transferred from Strathfield Rotary, (which he joined in 1981, and served as President in 1983) to Springwood Rotary, where we both have made some wonderful friends.

Bob is now 91 and his mobility unfortunately had deteriorated so much that our family was forced to make the decision to put him into care at Uniting Care Springwood in 2020 where the staff have been wonderful, especially considering the virus problems of the last 2 years. He still prides himself on being an Honorary Member of Springwood Rotary Club and his 40 year association with Rotary.
