Meeting summary from Monday 18 October

The quality of speaker presentations continues to stimulate, inform and invoke us to think beyond our day to day and to focus in on the wonderful programs and projects that our work and fund-raising support. This week we heard from three amazing women who are involved in the Youth and Teen Mental Health First Aid Program; and a brief outline of this is presented following the director reports.

President Jenny welcomed all those online and followed by reminded members that next week we return to face to face meetings at the Ori. Details of meeting arrangements were emailed to all members. Jenny also spoke about the Bunnings BBQs and Raffle Ticket selling, covered elsewhere in this newsletter.

Secretary Norm confirmed the Club AGM is scheduled for Monday 8 November at the Ori. The Club is still seeking nominations for two executive positions for the 2022/23 Board; being President Elect and Club Administration director. Norm



confirmed orders for the Gingerbread House fund raising effort have improved, but he is still looking for more orders to meet our commitment of 80 units. Norm also confirmed the disbursement of funds to our nominated recipients will occur shortly.

Treasurer, Bill Bowler noted the recent very generous donation the Club had received from Carrie Graham. Also the next round of Pick A Card now has 25 subscribers with the draw to recommence next week.

Youth Director, Cheryl spoke to the fact that she was very much looking forward to tonight's guest presentation, confirming that at this time the program is hoped to recommence in the 4th term of this year and if not in the 1st or 2nd term of 2022. Cheryl doesn't have any RYLA nominations at this time, but members could certainly refer any relevant 19-20 year olds to her for consideration. Cheryl also noted that RYPEN is online this year.

Club Administration Director, Bronwyn

noted there are five Club meetings this month; with the 1st, 15th and 22nd being the usual weekly meeting; the 8th being the AGM, and the 29th being the Pride of Workmanship Awards.

Community Service Director, Geoff

Glassock confirmed the wine orders will close at the end of the month. The Norman Lindsay event now has sufficient volunteers to assist with parking. And the Rotary Australia Day program has again received a regional \$20,000 grant with the possibility of a further \$10,000; this is a



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significant event for the Club to be involved with.

International Director, Frank Ross

stated Richard Owen, who is closely associated with the Cambodia project, has been very ill.

Bill Clague, Foundation Director

confirmed the Springwood Hospital Palliative Care project is at a stage where the furniture is to be ordered and it's exciting to see this important Club supported project nearing completion.

Welfare Officer, Valda Bray noted that 'everyone is doing well'; and then invited the members and guests to wish our President Jenny a very happy birthday.

Guest Speakers – Rose Glassock, Justine Drew, Maddy Forward – The Youth & Teen Mental Health First Aid Program

Geoff Glassock introduced the speakers and welcomed them to the Club meeting. He then handed over to Rose (his very accomplished daughter) and the Network Specialist Facilitator for this program.

Rose opened by an

Acknowledgement to Country followed by a short PowerPoint presentation. Rose outlined the program noting how it was initially conceived having identified the need, onto the funding grant application and the development of an interagency partnership; from this the Youth & Teen Mental Health First Aid Program was formulated.

Rose noted the current program operating in the Blue Mountains is



focused on Year 10 students at Katoomba, Springwood, Winmalee and Blaxland High Schools as well as this same year at the John Wycliffe Christian School, Warrimoo.

The program teaches students how to recognise mental health issues among their friends and peers and when identified how to provide initial mental health first aid. The importance of this approach of young people supporting their peers came out of research that showed that young people have a preference to sharing their problems with peers. The value of the program is that it arms young people with the resources to give initial support (first aid) and then to direct the friend or peer to professional services as appropriate.

Rose stated that the young people learn about the different types of mental health problems and mental health crisis situations that can occur and their relationship between thoughts, feelings and behaviours. These issues can include anxiety disorders, depression, eating disorders, alcohol and drug related issues and psychosis. These problems in young people can lead to suicidal thoughts and behaviours, deliberate selfharming, excessive use of alcohol and/or drugs and also exhibit in behaviours of bullying and abuse. Rose noted that due to Covid-19 and the isolated many young people have experienced in recent times there has been an increase in mental health issues with young people in the mountains and the importance of this program is very much at the forefront of schools and the team responsible for its implementation.

Rose then introduced Maddy Forward, the acting manager of MYST (Mountains Youth Services Team). Maddy noted that the arant received to run this program came at a very aood time, as it allowed for the training of two additional workers that the current funding would not have allowed. This additional human resource has allowed the program to be more widely offered across the mountains. Maddy then spoke to the Street Art Walk which is a skills based workshop, this project has developed a mural that highlights the importance of resilience. Maddy also noted that the ability to train so many to teach the program has been significant as it requires at least 10% of the teaching staff to be trained to deliver the program.

The third speaker for the evening was Justine Drew, Justine is the Attendance Support Officer for the area (Blaxland to Mt. Victoria). Justine also noted the importance of the team having been able to train 10% of the schools' teachers and the fact that further training will again occur next year. It was noted that the more teachers trained in the program, the better support there is for the students. Justine stated that young people are looking to help their friends and are keen to have the skills to do so. The program teaches what a mental health crisis might look like and who and when to reach out to for assistance. Where significant mental health issues are identified young people are then offered further support and can be referred to one to one counselling, etc.

It was noted that this is an evidence based program on the wellbeing





continuum, with ongoing measurement being applied for its effectiveness.

In closing the financial support provided by the Rotary Club of Springwood, as well as the other mountains clubs, was acknowledged. It was noted that this had allowed the program to be run at no cost to the participants. It is the hope of the team that this program can be run each year and that the young people of the mountains will continue to benefit from the very valuable peer support program.

Cheryl Kitto thanked the three speakers, firstly for their work with our youth and also for taking the time to provide such an informative and enlightening session to the members.
