

Interactive Sensory Garden Springwood Public School -Support Unit Project 2018-2022

This project began in 2018 following a call from a parent of a child in the support unit. It was a simple request for Rotary to supply bottled water or poppers for a walk to raise funds for a



As president, I thought that our Club might be able to make it a project and went to see Assistant Principal Nicole Swan, to see if we could help. She had the idea of a play area full of colour, sensory plants, herbs etc. and had collected many large old tyres and was in the process of painting

them in multi colours to use as planting beds. She had also managed to fund a free swing and frame. Some parents had made interesting play boards with lots of different tactile objects for the children to touch etc.

I approached our Club with the suggestion we apply for a matching grant to assist and some hands on help for installation. Shannon Atkins had already been in the wings with Nicole on this and following a meeting and grant approval we set about stage one! We had days of fun, planning, painting, building, planting and laughing. Behind the scenes things were going on in sheds with equipment being assembled! We had a shortfall and we're not able to afford soft fall under the swings but the right sized mulch did the trick!

Shannon and his team provided the bulk of the labour and expertise at no charge, only barely covering costs, and in very good humour. For this and lots of other community work he was awarded a Paul Harris Award that year at changeover! It would not have been possible without his generosity and experience.

We succeeded in a further grant in David Rayner's year as president to extend the garden, but COVID stepped on and it was held over for a year. Another successful grant application from Jenny Kroonstuiver's Board and away we went again! The design was changed to make the garden very interactive, suitable for all ages and colourful and sensory. This time, as the work was so specialised, Shannon gave up his Easter Holidays with his family to





complete the task during the school holidays with all of the heavy equipment needed and the end result is amazing. Rain delayed progress until finally it is done!

This has been completed by Rotary Foundation grants, generous donations by members, initial funds raised by parents 4 years ago and labour by club members led by Shannon and the Landsculpt team. The total costs have been approx. \$20,000 with this budget being stretched as far as possible to include sand pits, wall mirrors and play boards.

With the loss of our much loved and respected Charter member, Alan Bruce Cameron, we wanted to dedicate this project in his honour as past principal of Springwood Public School.

I give many thanks for the indulgences from our Club on this project and for the many laughs along the way! I am delighted to say it is now done!!!

# Don Cameron's message in response to the dedication to Alan Cameron

it is with great pleasure that I acknowledge the dedication of the Springwood Primary's Sensory Garden to my Father Mr Alan Cameron.



It is a most appropriate tribute that speaks to 3 aspects of Alan's life he held dear-as an educator, a Rotarian and a passionate gardener.

As an educator Alan spent 38 years in the profession–teaching in demonstrations schools in North Newtown, and Haberfield; spending a year teaching in Edinburgh as well as starting Carlingford West Primary School amongst other positions. The final chapter in Alan's career as an educator was here at Springwood Primary from 1977-1988. Upon being appointed Head Master, Alan finessed every aspect of the school down to the motto, school song and uniform.

As principal, he wasn't an elusive figure but was visible and personally engaged in every child's advancement.

The enduring allegory he established of The Good Ship Springwood Primary, became legendary amongst students of the school. The staff were officers who would show leadership, plan and provide example; the students were the crew who would be decent, fair and honest. There were no passengers. Just workers. At the end of each year the school achievements would be presented at assembly in the form of a long scroll that would role from the lectern down the aisle to the door. It was a masterful and fun visualization of how much could be achieved when you work together. The Good Ship Springwood Primary would dock victorious at the end of each school year before re-entering unchartered





waters and the adventures the following year would hold.

Of the things we think, say or do...

Is it the truth

Is it fair to all concerned

Will it build goodwill and better

friendships

Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

As a Rotarian, Alan was able to serve the community that had welcomed him and in which he had made his home. Forming Springwood Rotary Club alongside founding members Fred Thompson and Tony Hammond in 1984 the club has; and continues to—contribute to the local community as well as participate on wider national and international projects.

Gardening for Alan was an activity that provided a lot of joy through nurturing and hard work. He loved his roses and cold climate garden he laid out and cared for—which continues to reward through the changing seasons in a myriad of ways. The healing and restorative aspects of gardens are well known as well as how plants appeal to our senses-visually and through touch and smell. The ecosystems gardens promote visualize the cycle of life—providing a constantly rewarding sanctuary.

I would like to acknowledge the creative work of the Landsculpt Group in realising this Sensory Garden and the Rotary Club of Springwood along with Springwood Primary school for honouring Alan Cameron with the establishment of this beautiful garden—a most appropriate outcome that captures many facets of Alan's life he held dear.
