

THE LAST MEETING



Last week, Marilyn Kenney spoke about ROMAC for which she is the District 9685 Chair. She was introduced by Geoff Glassock, and thanked by Norm Kitto. Her response to the gift is shown here.



ROMAC commenced in March 1988 out of the actions of an Australian Rotarian who, with a group of surgeons, visited Lambasa in Fiji. They found the child mortality rate as high as 25% in some places. They quickly identified that lack of medical and surgical facilities and skills for children of the island nations in Oceania, was a major cause. Rotary faced the challenge to assist an 18-year-old Fijian girl whose right leg was threatened if immediate surgery was not performed. During the next four years, eight children were brought to Australia for major, often lifesaving, surgery. Soon 20 Australian Rotary clubs were caught up in the success of each case and assisted in various ways. ROMAC established five regions representing clubs in the west, east, south, north and centre of the country. A New Zealand region was formally established in 2004 and treated its first patient, from Vanuatu, in December 2005. The inaugural New Zealand region representative was Trish O'Reilly and Dr Max Morris, the first New Zealand Medical Director. It was a slow and steady process to promote the objectives and raise awareness of ROMAC in the New Zealand region, but the number of patients treated in New Zealand has risen to more than 25 patients per year. ROMAC in New Zealand and Australia enlists assistance from medical experts, hospitals, nurses, physiotherapists, pathology and radiology services, airlines, sponsors and other supporters. Today ROMAC is providing surgical treatment to around 50 children from Oceania every year – we are making a huge difference in their lives.

Mission Statement

ROMAC provides surgical treatment for children in Australia and New Zealand from developing countries from our Pacific region in the form of life giving and/or dignity restoring surgery not accessible to them in their home country.

Objectives

- Provide hope and restore dignity to transform a child's life
- Provide the best possible surgical and medical expertise
- Engage Rotary and the community at all levels to fund and support the ROMAC cause



Mourine is a 14 year old girl with a fast growing, non-malignant, Desmoid Tumour. She initially arrived expecting surgical removal of the tumour, but the doctors considered it too dangerous, given the proximity of major blood vessels and nerves through the tumour. Instead she underwent chemotherapy to initially stop the growth, and then hopefully shrink it to a more manageable size to allow surgery. Mourine comes from a small village on a remote island in the Solomons – no electricity, subsistence living. She has had only 6 months schooling in the past three years as her school was destroyed in a major earthquake, and the embarrassment of the tumour prevented her attendance. She has been catching up at the Hospital School during her 8 month stay here in Sydney. A recent life-saving operation at the Children's Hospital at Randwick has resulted in this amazing transformation. A 1.5 kg tumour was removed from Mourine's neck and she will be going home soon.

In 2016-17 the Rotary Foundation raised US\$304.3 million, primarily through Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and Friends of Rotary. 92% of the annual expenditure goes towards projects and programs aimed at "doing good in the World". 2% is administration and 6% promotion. The Rotary Foundation has been awarded a four-star rating by the Charity Navigator for eight consecutive years.

END POLIO NOW

The Rotary Foundation's universally best-known program is Polio Plus — the eradication of Polio — which began in 1985 and is now hopelessly in the final stages.



Not so long ago, the world was paralysed by the fear of polio. More than 125 countries were polio-endemic, and thousands of families watched in anguish as the disease killed or crippled 1000 people a day, most of them children.

For 35 years now, Rotary and its partners, such as the World Health Organisation, UNICEF and the US Centre for Disease Control, have worked tirelessly to rid the world of polio. So far Rotarians have raised over US\$1.3 billion to help fund this program.

Since 1985, more than two billion children have received the polio vaccine, and five million children destined to be polio victims are walking today because of global immunisation. In 2011, India, which has been one of the most endemic countries, went one full year without a single case and has now been removed from the endemic countries list. In 2017 Africa, the continent, has now also achieved two-year polio free, including Nigeria which is one of the 3 endemic countries in the world.

The Final Challenge

Reported cases have dropped 99.8% and only two countries Afghanistan and Pakistan remain endemic. However, the virus knows no borders and can quickly spread from endemic countries into polio-free countries.

The greatest battle now is financial. The World Vaccine Summit in Geneva, estimated that Polio can be eradicated within the next 3 years and that the cost will be US\$5.5 billion. Fortunately, world governments and other agencies have committed \$4.4 billion leaving a **short fall of \$1.5 billion**. This is another fund raising challenge for Rotary, in conjunction with the Gates Foundation. Rotary has now sent out the call for Rotarians to **raise \$50 million per annum** which will be matched by the Gates Foundation 2:1.

Key Note Speaker

Ian Riseley IPRIP



Ian H.S. Riseley is a chartered accountant and principal of Ian Riseley and Co., a firm he established in 1976. Prior to starting his own firm, he worked in the audit and management consulting divisions of large accounting firms and corporations. His firm specializes in income tax and management advice for individuals and small businesses. He has a master's degree in taxation law and graduate diplomas in accounting and income tax.

Riseley has been a member of the boards of both a private and a public school, a member

of the Community Advisory Group for the City of Sandringham, and involved in Sea Scouts and sporting groups, as well as honorary auditor or advisor for a number of charitable organizations.

Riseley's honors include the AusAID Peacebuilder Award from the Australian government in recognition of his work in East Timor, the Medal of the Order of Australia for services to the Australian community, the Distinguished Service Award and the Regional Service Award for a Polio-Free World from The Rotary Foundation.

A Rotarian since 1978, Riseley has served as treasurer, director, Foundation trustee, and member and chair of numerous RI and Foundation committees. He is Immediate Past Rotary International President, having served during the period 2017-18.

He and his wife, Juliet, a past district governor, are Major Donors and Request Society members of The Rotary Foundation. They live on seven hectares at Moorooduc, where they practice their personal philosophy of sustainable and organic living. They have two children and four grandchildren.





GARDENER'S HELP KIDS

The six large properties, each have a different style, and are sure to provide interest and ideas for most people who enjoy their out of doors.

Plant sale "Avonlea" 58 Lee Rd Winmalee



"Heatherbrae" 336 Hawkesbury Rd, Winmalee is one of the earliest homes built at "North Springwood", and the surrounding gardens are now being tastefully recreated to compliment the old sandstone and timber residence and out buildings. A entrance driveway of sentry like conifers, a promenade of Manchurian pear trees, tall hedges, old iron gateways and fencing, standard roses, sandstone paved patios and walk ways, raised vegetable garden plots, large old date palms and wandering guinea fowl, compliment the fabulous old property and sympathetically lend themselves to a time gone by.



"Avonlea" - 58 Lee Rd Cnr Pentlands Drive Winmalee— Access from Pentlands Drive

This well established garden features banks of Azaleas interspersed with young rhododendrons and camellias growing in dappled light of large trees planted along boundary fencing. In the central front garden, the focus is on roses and spring flowering bulbs. An interesting compact Stachyurus tree with its signature draping tendrils of buds, is something for knowledgeable gardeners to admire. The covered side entrance walkway provides a wonderful micro climate for ferns and orchids to thrive.

"Winmara" 228 Singles Ridge Rd, Yellow Rock

With imposing street presence, this established garden is a real pleasure to the eye. From the sweep of green lawns, curved driveway to the home, the paved walk way to the front verandah with its border of standard roses and box hedges. A graceful formal fountain, extensive array of azaleas and camellias under planted with low growing perennial plants and mix of deciduous exotic trees ensures year round colour. Situated on a level half hectare, this property is an entertainer's delight.

226A Singles Ridge Road Yellow Rock

Situated on a one hectare lot, this is a new home with a young garden that is fast changing from a work in progress to a surrounding treasure of landscaping. The front of the home is predominately formal exotic plants and landscaping, however this gives way to mainly native plants at the rear of the dwelling. Inspired by the adjoining bush valley the gardens have impressive Doryanthes "Gymea Lilly's" Callistemon, Banksia, Grevilleas, and Syzygium "Lilly Pilly" that are encouraging the birds to feed in the garden. Of note are the impressive driveway entrance pillars, the formal "prancing horses" fountain, cylindrical wisteria clad archway and large fish pond.

60 Bunnal Avenue Winmalee

This is a most deceptive ten year old residential garden with winding paths and terraced corners filled with a wonderful variety of textures, and plant contrasts. An orange flowering gum, a Cercis (Crimson forestry pansy) and Malus loensis (Blooming Crab apple) providing a cool microclimate for understory flowering scadoxus, veltheimias, sprekelia and much more. Backing to a bushland valley, the tall tree ferns create natural shade for the variety of orchids, bromeliads and cycads, interesting nooks and crannies filled with garden decoration and planted Springtime colour.
