Singapore to host the 2024 Rotary convention

Rotary members worldwide are set to converge in Singapore in 2024 as the Republic has won the provisional bid to host the the international service organisation's annual convention that year.

The five-day convention which represents Singapore's largest association congress to date, will be held at the Singapore Expo Convention and Exhibition Centre. Among other meetings, the event will include workshops, forums and entertainment.

Singapore's bid was led by Rotary regional leader Chew Ghim Bok, and supported by Rotary clubs from Singapore and around the Asia Pacific region.

The convention was last held in Singapore in 1999 and attended by about 19,000 participants.

As part of Singapore's bid to host a convention with a sustainable impact, the Rotary Clubs of Singapore plan to champion a legacy project striving towards sanitation progress and hygiene awareness by 2025.


Rotary club pays \$20,000 to refurbish lookout



The Esperance Rotary Club (WA) has reopened the lookout on Dempster Head, following its recent refurbishment.

The current estimated cost of the development was around \$20,000, provided by the club as a 'return' to the Esperance community.

The structure, first built in 1964, was last replaced in 1987. Esperance Shire president Victoria Brown commended Rotary on their work within the town. Ms Brown said the time and money contributed by Rotary was testament to what Rotary and the community were 'all about'.

THE NATIONAL PASS

The Mountain Ghost was saddened to learn of the death of David Gliddon and the injury of two others while repairing the National Pass Walk of Wentworth Falls.

The National Pass Walk is probably the Ghost's favourite walk in the Blue Mountains. An expanding waistline, bad knees and a lack of fitness has meant he has not done the walk for some time.

A good walk for the Ghost these days is from the public bar to the carpark (he has a designated driver)

The National Pass Walk has been described as one of Australia's finest bushwalking trails. It is also one of the most historic. The National Pass hiking track was built with picks, shovels, crowbars and dynamite between 1906 and 1907. The cost was 430 Pounds Australia.

Much of the track was fairly easy to create as it runs along a claystone ledge separating massive sandstone cliffs above and below.

Access to Wentworth Falls was the greatest challenge – solved by cutting a zig-zag staircase into the sheer cliff face from the bottom up, then quarrying into a corner of the cliff to create a pathway to the stairs. The Grand Staircase as it became known is the tallest outdoor staircase in Australia.

The opening ceremony was performed at the Valley of the Waters end in 1908. An area known as Prince Regents Glen was no longer the lost world that visitors could only gaze down on from above but was now accessible.

The Ghost learnt an interesting fact doing his research. It would be impossible today to build this Giant Stairway as conservation policies prevent blasting away any cliff face. We think the National Park is spectacular today, imagine it 100 years ago.

After 95 years of service the track was closed in 2002. Bushfires, rain storms and landslides played havoc with fencing and wooden bridges. The \$1.5M restoration project won a National Trust Award and another from UNESCO in 2008. This time helicopters deposited many tonnes of sandstone blocks and timber sleeper steps along the trail and a carefully chosen team set to work.

The Grand Stairway was the biggest concern with its 173 stone steps zig-zagging up a 90m cliff. Heritage stonemason perched on the cliff face to do the job.

It really is a great walk, 6km for the round trip and taking about three hours for people with good fitness. It is a hard walk but a safe walk. The only drawback according to seasoned walkers is the number of people doing it!


The Ghost won't spoil the walk for you but it starts at Wentworth Falls Lookout and descends to Fletchers Lookout. This is the lookout that so impressed Charles



Darwin in 1836. Then on to the Queen Cascade at the top of Wentworth Falls and crossing the stepping stones it becomes a very dramatic cliff walk to start the descent into the valley via the hand hewn sandstone staircase built in 1908.

After descending the Grand Staircase you are in lush rainforest. At the end of the walk we arrive at Conservation Hut for a well-earned coffee.
