### Mountain Ghost

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime.

The Mountain Ghost was researching the origins of the name Warrimoo and came upon this most interesting story.

Now before you go on, the Ghost does have a computer and he does know how to use it! (even though it is peddle powered and does have a built in Esky)...

Back to the story of Warrimoo. There is a famous steamer SS Warrimoo built in 1892 in Newcastle United Kingdom. It carried Cargo and passengers to Canada, Australia and later to New Zealand.

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought the master, Captain John Phillips, the result.

The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LON 179° 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899. "Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line."

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called his navigators to the bridge to check and double check the ships position.


He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather and clear night worked in his favour.

At midnight, the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line! The consequences of this bizarre position were many: The forward part (bow) of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere and the middle of summer. The rear (stern) was in the Northern Hemisphere and in the middle of winter.

The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899. Forward it was 1 January 1900. This ship was therefore not only in two different days, two different months, two different years, two different seasons but in two different centuries - all at the same time!

The ghost was fascinated by this story and his original research on the history of the name of the town of Warrimoo seems very strange. Most histories say Warrimoo is an Aboriginal name for Eagle or Eagles Nest and this is how the town got its name in 1918. Prior to that date the town had been known as Karabah.





There is no record of Warrimoo being an Aboriginal name. It does appear it could be named after the SS Warrimoo but no evidence to prove it. However the SS Warrimoo was a troop carrier in the First World War and ran into a French destroyer in 1918. Both ships sank with loss of life.

It could well be that with the sense of patriotism around the time and being only a few months after this event the town was renamed Warrimoo by a Sydney developer Arthur Rickard.
