Last week we reported that Gosford Rotary donated 17 computers to a local school with the help of Harvey Norman's Erina store.

We also mentioned that Oberon Rotary Club received a State Government grant of \$14,800 to construct a viewing platform in the local area.

This week's good news story comes from Lower Blue Mountains Rotary who received a State Government grant of \$16,335 to erect shade sails at the old Glenbrook Public school.

Stuart Ayres MP, Member for Penrith joined representatives of the Rotary Club of the Lower Blue Mountains and school staff to announce a grant of \$16,335 as part of the NSW Government's 2017 Community Building Partnership (CBP) program.

Stuart Ayres said this funding for Rotary will go towards shade sails at the old Glenbrook Public School offering the many users of the school grounds some much needed relief from the harsh sun.

"It is my pleasure to support Rotary with this grant which I know will benefit locals and visitors alike," said Stuart Ayres. Pamela Noal, Rotary Past President said "On behalf of the Rotary Club of the Lower Blue Mountains I share our immense appreciation in receiving this grant that will create an area of shade for multiple users of site including after school care and people who visit on many occasions through each month of our community calendar of events".

"Funding through the CBP Program aims to create more vibrant and inclusive communities and deliver positive social, environmental and recreational outcomes," added Stuart Ayres.

The NSW State Government's Community Building Partnership (CBP) program forms a partnership between the NSW Government and community organisations to develop projects that need funding support.
