Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation announce \$450 million commitment to end polio

ATLANTA, Ga. (June 12, 2017) – Today in Atlanta Rotary President John Germ and Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, announced a commitment of up to \$450 million to support the eradication of polio.

To an audience of nearly 40,000 Rotary members attending the humanitarian organization's annual convention, Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation renewed their longstanding support for ending polio.

Rotary committed to raise \$50 million per year over the next three years, with every dollar to be matched with two additional dollars from the Gates Foundation.

This expanded agreement will translate into \$450 million for polio eradication activities, including immunization and surveillance over the next three years. This critical funding helps ensure countries around the world remain polio-free and that polio is ended in the remaining three endemic countries: Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan.

In a partnership spanning a decade, Rotary and the Gates Foundation, along with the other Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) partners, have led the effort to end polio worldwide.

This funding extension reaffirms a commitment established at the 2013 Rotary Convention in Lisbon, Portugal, when the Gates Foundation pledged to match Rotary contributions two-to-one, up to \$35 million per year through 2018. Rotary, including matching funds from

the Gates Foundation, has donated more than \$1.6 billion to polio eradication.

Today's announcement comes on the heels of the news that world governments and other donors have pledged to contribute US\$1.2 billion total to the GPEI for polio eradication efforts. The government funding also announced today at the Rotary Convention—will substantially help to close the US\$1.5 billion funding gap, allowing partners to immunize 450 million children every year and support rigorous disease surveillance in both endemic and at-risk polio-free countries.

Film debuts at international convention

Around 2,000 people watched the debut of Rotary International's new virtual reality film, "One Small Act," at one of the largest simultaneous viewings of a VR film.

The film follows the journey of a child whose world has been torn apart by conflict and supports the causes that Rotary champions, including polio eradication and peacebuilding.

Angus Fraser, of the Rotary Club of Quirindi in New South Wales, Australia, was among those who registered for the event, which was a part of the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, USA.

"The film was great. A bit shocking; I didn't really know what to expect from it but it was really cool," he said. "I think the film's message will open up the world a bit, to make people realize there are terrible things happening and there are people trying to help -- Rotary being one of the main groups doing that."

Mountain Ghost

Katoomba's Winter Magic Festival is a celebration of music, art, parades and stalls. Last year an estimated 50,000 attended, the largest festival in the Blue Mountains.

THE WINTER SOLSTICE

The Mountain Ghost loves the annual Winter Magic Festival at Katoomba and has been to many over the last 10 years or so and it gets better each year.

It is a celebration of music, art, parades and stalls. Last year an estimated 50,000 attended, the largest festival in the Blue Mountains.

But the Ghost wondered why it was held on or close to the Winter Solstice. What is the Winter Solstice? The 21st June will be the shortest day of the year in the Southern Hemisphere.

The Ghost was under the impression that all days

were 24 hours long but evidently it means the shortest day time and the Ghost being the genius he is reckons it must also be the longest night and he is correct.

The Ghost asked his friends at the Australian Geographic Society for an explanation. It all gets down to the fact that the Earth is tilted at about 23* so at some point the top of the Earth (Northern Hemisphere) is closer to the sun than the bottom (Southern Hemisphere).

We are at the point where the Southern Hemisphere is further from the sun. In the Northern Hemisphere they will be experiencing the Summer Solstice at this time. Solstice by the way means "sun still".

In the Blue Mountains the sun will

rise on the 21st June at 6.59am and set at 4.53pm. At the Summer Solstice in the Blue Mountains there would be an extra 4 hours and 31 minutes of daylight.

In Reykjavik (Iceland) the sun rises at 11.22am and sets at 3.29pm giving a total daylight of 4 hours and 7 minutes. The Ghost thinks it's hardly worth getting out of bed.

There is a lot of cultural significance for the Winter Solstice. Stonehenge in England was aligned to catch the winter sunset at the Solstice.

The pagan people of Scandinavia and Northern Germany used to celebrate a 12 day mid-winter holiday called Yule. Many Christmas traditions such as the Christmas Tree, the Christmas wreath, the Yule log are direct descendants of Yule customs.

The Ghost hopes you have enjoyed the history of the Solstice and will see you at the Katoomba Winter Magical Festival next Saturday.....
