Blackheath Rotary renovate a deck at Junction 142 Katoomba



Blackheath Rotary has completed a new deck at Junction 142 Katoomba. Lucian Keegel, Rotary e-club of Geater Sydney, was the foreman.

In partnership with the Uniting Church, the premises, at 142 Katoomba Street, deals with homelessness every day. Often it can be locals who just haven't been able to make the rent or mortgage payments.

Director Rosa Del Ponte says: "We deal with ordinary people who struggle to manage sky rocketing housing costs. It just takes a run of bad luck and anyone can end up homeless. We have even helped a family of five who were living in a tent in the bush".

The Soul Kitchen also helps homeless people who are riding the trains at night to stay safe and warm.

Rosa explains: "They hop off at Katoomba and come to us for a meal or to have a shower and launder their clothes".

You can't have a Rotary barbecue without sausages (see photograph, bottom left) but at the Aboriginal Cultural Resource Centre Katoomba Family Day, Friday 27/04, Central Blue Rotarians Tom Hickey, Steve Gillett, Ava Emdin and Ray Wiles also served up delicious portions of kangaroo, emu, crocodile and beef.

It was a fun day out for many local families at Melrose Park, Katoomba, on a not so warm Blue Mountains day. Residents were able to access information about child care, welfare and social issues.

The Mountain Ghost was not always a Mountain Ghost. A long time ago he was a City Ghost but moved to the Mountains because he loved them.

One of the attractions of the Mountains is that you actually get four different seasons unlike Sydney which has just summer and winter. Hot and not so hot. But this year who has stolen Autumn?

This time last year the Ghost was telling his thousands of readers (well hundreds anyway) of the best places to see the beautiful Autumn trees and colours.

Well the best places to see Autumn in the Mountains according to Scenic World who do know a little about the Mountains are :-

- Mount Wilson go to the Village and the streets are lined with elm trees, liquid ambers and pink cherries. Mount Wilson is also home to some of the best private cold climate gardens in Australia. Most charge a small entrance fee which usually goes to charity. Many owners encourage visitors to have a picnic amongst the trees.
- 2. Mount Tomah (or Blue Mountains Botanic Gardens) to give it its full name is magnificent at this time of year. It covers 252 hectares of beautiful Autumn colours.
- Blackheath take any of the back streets in Blackheath and you will see rows and rows of spectacular trees. While there you can visit Blackheath Rotary's famous Rocket at Soldiers Memorial Park. All this is for free.
- 4. Everglades House and Garden at Leura is a must. For many years this was the Ghost's favourite Autumn place. This National Trust property set on 12 acres of mature gardens also has spectacular views of the Jamison Valley.
- Wentworth Falls one of the most spectacular sights in the Blue Mountains is the tunnel of flaming trees (no, the Ghost is not swearing the trees are flaming good) on route to Wentworth Falls lake.

Not mentioned because it is a little way out of the Mountains is Mayfield Gardens at Mayfield near Oberon. The Ghost has written about Mayfield before. It is recognised as one of the best cool climate gardens in the Southern Hemisphere and it is getting better each year. If you have not visited Mayfield in Autumn then you are missing a magnificent sight. Do it soon. The Ghost has been a little slow in mentioning the now famous Sculptures at Scenic World in Katoomba, now held at this time of year. The exhibition features sculptures from Australian and International artists dotted along a boardwalk in a beautiful rainforest setting. The Ghost thinks this is the 7th annual exhibition but his memory is not as good as it

used to be. The Ghost hopes you have enjoyed this article but please do not sue him if Autumn does not make an appearance......
