Rotary rededicates Parkes, NSW as a peace community



The NSW town of Parkes, with a population of around 15,000, was rededicated June 28 by Mayor Ken Keith as a Rotary Peace Community on behalf of Parkes Rotary Club.

The ceremony took place at the Rotary Arboretum on the corner of Bushman and East streets.

Parkes was declared as one of Rotary's International Peace Communities in 2012.

The concept of Rotary Peace Communities originated in Wagga in 1993 and since then 58 Peace Communities have been proclaimed in 17 countries.

Parkes Rotary Club constructed the new Peace Precinct. The columns have been carved by local artists in traditional Wiradjuri designs and the club hopes that this area becomes a focal point for all of the community.

The theme is a dry river bed meandering along the tree line and is designed to engender a feeling of peace and contemplation.

The five pillars stand for Peace, Respect and Value Diversity, Acknowledge the Past, Strong Families Strong Community, and Yindymarra Winhanganha - a Wiradjuri phrase meaning 'the wisdom of respectfully knowing how to live well in a world worth living in'.

They should remind us that respect, rejection of violence, resolution, reconciliation and freedom contribute to a state of peace. The pillars are carved with Wiradjuri iconography to acknowledge the First Peoples and our local history.

Council staff joined members of the Rotary Club of Parkes to carry out some landscaping and planting around the pillars.



In August 1873, Henry Parkes (later Sir Henry) visited the area and in December 1873 the town was officially renamed Parkes in his honour. Sir Henry Parkes is recognised as having played an instrumental role in Australia becoming a unified and federated country. In March 1885, Parkes was proclaimed a town.

The birthday party was at Silos Estate, a winery just out of Berry and naturally enough the wines were fantastic as was the food. Beautiful views of the mountains and from the top of the hill you can see the ocean.

Berry is about 3 hours south of Katoomba, about 30 minutes north of Nowra just off the Princes Highway. If you want a lovely drive go there via Kangaroo Valley. The scenery is spectacular.

Berry has a population of about 2,000 but is a very popular spot with tourists because of its beautiful buildings, craft and unusual homeware shops and restaurants.

Berry is named after the Berry brothers, Alexander and David, who were pastoralists in the area from 1836 to 1889. The

As always there is the famous Berry Product Market held twice a month at the Berry Showground. Not forgetting the beautiful beaches of Gerringong and Gerroa just 20 minute's drive away.
