Rotary doing good in Vietnam

A Rotary Foundation global grant helped to provide a water supply system and environmental sanitation benefitting 1,252 people in 316 households.

For some of us, it might be hard to imagine life without clean water. We may have suffered the inconveniences of temporary water cuts due to breakdowns or repairs in the water supply.

But those are just minor inconveniences compared to what people in the Huong Nguyen commune live with until recently.

It takes a drive over many miles through tortuous and bumpy roads to reach Huong Nguyen commune. It is located in a very mountainous region, close to the Laos border, in the A Luoi District, Thua Thien Hue Province, one of the most affected areas during the Vietnam War.

Through the assistance of a Rotary Foundation global grant, a project provided a water supply system and environmental sanitation benefitting 1,252 people in 316 households.

The project also enabled construction of 50 hygienic latrines. These play an essential role in keeping waste away from living spaces, which means less disease and better health for all the affected people.

It is expected that all these measures will have an important impact in the health of the inhabitants of the commune. But they are also expected to have other impacts.

It will no longer be necessary to travel long distances to bring clean water home, saving time for the inhabitants of the commune, time that might be spent in other profitable tasks, increasing the economic prospects of the whole area.

It is difficult to describe the atmosphere in the training sessions where those living in the commune learn about the new facilities and are taught hygiene.

The smiles on the faces of the attendees and the laughter of the boys and girls says much about the joy and happiness that Rotary has brought to this poor commune almost lost in the mountains of Vietnam.

He later taught at university, his last position being an Adjunct Associate Professor at Sydney University's Graduate School of Government.

Richard was President of "Dying with Dignity" NSW from 2012-2014 and his presentation this Wednesday night will focus on end of life choices, under the title "A Dignified Departure".

Richard will pose questions of interest and concern to each of us, including the ethical and legal issues that we – and our relatives – must deal with.

AUTUMN IN THE MOUNTAINS

The Mountain Ghost was not always a Mountain Ghost. A long time ago he was a City Ghost but moved to the Mountains because he loved them.

One of the attractions of the Mountains is that you actually get four different seasons, unlike Sydney which has just summer and winter. Hot and not so hot. Humid and not so humid. But the Ghost's favourite time of year is Autumn.

Last year was unusual. Autumn went missing and did not arrive until the end of May. The Ghost thinks there may be something to this global warming theory. The Ghost has spent an hour raking up leaves in his backyard so Autumn has arrived.

This time last year the Ghost was telling his thousands of readers (well hundreds anyway) of the best places to see the beautiful Autumn trees and colours. Well the best places to see Autumn in the Mountains according to Scenic World who do know a little about the Mountains are :-

 Mount Wilson – go to the village and the streets are lined with elm trees, liquid ambers and pink cherries. Mount Wilson is also home to some of the best private cold climate gardens in Australia. Most charge a small entrance fee which usually goes to charity. Many owners encourage visitors to have a picnic among the trees. 2. Mount Tomah – (our Blue Mountains Botanic Garden) to give it its full name is magnificent at this time of year. It covers 252 hectares of beautiful Autumn colours.

3. Blackheath – take any of the back streets in Blackheath and you will see rows and rows of spectacular trees. While there you can visit the Rocket at Soldiers Memorial Park. All this is for free.

4. Everglades House and Garden – at Leura is a must. For many years this was the Ghost's favourite Autumn place. This National Trust property set on 12 acres of mature gardens also has spectacular views of the Jamison Valley.

5. Wentworth Falls – one of the most spectacular sights in the Blue Mountains is the tunnel of flaming trees (no, the Ghost is not swearing the trees are flaming good) on route to Wentworth Falls lake.



Not mentioned because it is a little way out of the Mountains is Mayfield Gardens at Mayfield near Oberon. The Ghost has written about Mayfield before. It is recognised as one of the best cool climate gardens in the Southern Hemisphere and it is getting better each year. If you have not visited Mayfield in Autumn then you are missing a magnificent sight. Do it soon.

The Ghost is aware that deciduous trees (trees that lose their leaves in winter) are all from the Northern Hemisphere and the native eucalyptus are all evergreens. These northern invaders, some people call them feral trees, have made the Mountains a much more attractive place to be.

Just as Australia welcomes people from all parts of the planet so we shall welcome trees from all over the world providing they do not create any environmental problem (anyway that's what the Ghost thinks, but he has been wrong before.)
