ROTARY FOUNDATION

This year will go down as our most active connection with the Foundation in the Club's 39 year history, due to:

- a successful application for a matching grant to construct a training farm for the Orphanage at Pattaya, Thailand.

- an initial contribution of \$A10,000.00 to the Foundation's Annual Giving programme, with an additional contribution of \$A2,000 at the conclusion of the Rotary year.
- the presentation of 3 Sapphires, to complement the Paul Harris Fellowships already held by Stan Spencely, Leon Scott and Roy Parker.
- two additional Members agreeing to become Centurions, ie. making a commitment to contribute \$100.00 per year for 10 years. We now have 4 Centurions, with others indicating their intention to join soon.

The farm project is very exciting, and rewarding. It will not only provide skills training for many of the orphan children, a number of whom have rural backgrounds, but it will also generate food for the Orphanage itself. The total project is estimated to cost 1,355,296 Thai Baht, ie. \$A45,976.00, \$US33,056.00 which was raised as follows:

First Rotary Club

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and three friends, Sylvester Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, met in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago to discuss Paul's idea that businessmen should get together periodically for camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances.

From their discussion came the idea for a men's club which would meet weekly and whose membership would be limited to one representative from each business and profession. After enlisting a fifth member, Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Sylvester Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become it president until two years later.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2004-2005

The Rotary Year of 2004/05 has been a very successful year for the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk. It has certainly been a busy year for the Club as it was also the Centennial Year of Rotary International.

The Directors have all submitted reports on the various activities but I wish to highlight several projects of great achievement.

During the year we have been very fortunate to induct, and welcome to our Rotary Family, 4 new Members; Phil Britton, Maureen Lougoon, Carolyn Robinson and Denis Rowston.

The R.O.S.E. Program proved to be really successful. P.P. Howard Osborne and Vivienne and Rotarian Peter Cox deserve our congratulations on a very successful venture. The changes in the students during their 10 months stay were incredible. We now welcome 4 new students from Pattaya Orphanage in Thailand who have joined us during the past few weeks.

The Farm Project for Pattaya Orphanage has eventually come to fruition. The Rotary Foundation and several other organizations have matched our donation of A \$10,000-00 and the orphanage can now not only teach their students farming techniques but also grow food to support the orphanage and eventually operate on a commercial basis. The visit by Father Phillip from Pattaya Orphanage last December was certainly a highlight as was the visit of

Nittipoon Navaratna and Miss Pepsi on our first meeting night last July.

Through an appeal to Club Members and friends of Rotary we raised in excess of \$5,000 towards the Tsunami Appeal. What a fantastic effort for a Club of 37 Members. This money was forwarded for use in Thailand. We were in contact with our Sister Club, Jomtien-Pattaya, during this period. The relationship with this Club is working well.

In February we moved into our new home at the California Gully Mechanics Institute. Many months of hard work went into the restoration of this old building that dates back to 1861. Every Member contributed in some way to this restoration but particular mention must be made of P.P.'s Stan Spencely, Bill Slee and John Haugh and Rotarian Joe Cogo. Having our own Club Meeting Room has certainly been beneficial. The Mayor of the City of Greater Bendigo officially opened the building on Saturday 20th February 2005 to coincide with the Centenary of Rotary International on Wednesday 23rd February. District Governor Judy Nettleton and John Nairn joined us for the day together with around 160 guests.

Several Awards have been made during the year. At the opening of the Cal. Gully Mechanics Institute it was a wonderful honour for me to present Paul Harris Sapphire Pins to P.P. Leon Scott and P.P. Stan Spencely. Last Wednesday night I also had the honour to present P.P. Roy Parker, our last surviving Charter Member, with his Paul Harris Sapphire Pin. Certainly they are three very worthy recipients. On Saturday 20th February we also made presentations of special mantle clocks to P.P.'s Bill Slee and John Haugh to acknowledge their fantastic efforts in the restoration of the Mechanics.

The students returned home full of confidence, self esteem, with new life skills and most importantly with a very good grasp of the English language. Their conversation skills had improved dramatically.

Their stay in Australia was a life changing experience and one they will never forget.

The R.O.S.E. Program has commenced its second year with the 4 new students arriving in Australia on Sunday 22nd May 2005.

Koi(15), Lakkana(15), Kit(15) and Paeng(19) were greeted and welcomed to Australia by representatives of the host families, Rotary and 'On Track' at approximately 11.15 PM by the time they came through Customs. After meeting everyone they then had the long trip back to Bendigo by car so they were very tired travellers for the next couple of days.

On behalf of the International Committee, Vivienne and I would like to sincerely thank the following:

- The caring Host Families without whose generosity this program could not continue.

- Peter Cox and 'On Track' for agreeing to continue providing the educational program for the students at nominal cost to the Rotary Club.

My appreciation is extended to all those people who have helped in any way over the last Rotary year to make this small but worthwhile international project a success.

ROTARY CLUB OF EAGLEHAWK

REPORT ON REBUILDING EAST TIMOR 2004-5

The Rotary Club of Eaglehawk has maintained strong connections in providing assistance to the people of East Timor, including financial support from one of our members to an orphaned child at Fatuhada.

Last July-August, Team No 11 led by Kyneton Rotarian Steve Burgess, supported by Rotarians from Toorak as well as from

Kyneton and Laverton, erected a security fence around the Maubara Orphanage.

Difficulties have been experienced in getting humanitarian aid containers into East Timor over the past year, however approval has now been granted by the East Timorese Government for acceptance, (duty free) of building materials and educational supplies to rebuild Balibar Primary School.

Last August, East Timor First Lady Kirsty Sword-Gusmao, was Guest of Honour at the Eaglehawk Primary School 150th Anniversary celebrations. She was presented with a Mosaic as a gift to Eaglehawk's Sister School in East Timor, which is Balibar Primary. Team members will mount this mural to the new school building by when the project is completed.

Fund-raising activities, donations, together with gifts of clothing and other items still continue to be received. District 9800 Rebuilding East Timor Committee has organised a fund-raising concert by the Australian Army Band – Melbourne to be presented on 14th September at Caulfield Town Hall.

A request has been received from the Carmelite Sisters for fly screens at the Maubara Orphanage. The reports indicate that they are extremely satisfied with this building, also the annexe which Rotary has provided at Fatuhada, but they feel the provision of fly screens at Maubara would assist in preventing the children from contracting Malaria. A donated Shade Sail has been sent to East Timor from Eaglehawk and will be erected at Maubara at the first opportunity.

At the time of writing this report, Teams are being organised to return to East Timor to start work on Balibar Primary School, so hopefully this project will soon come to fruition.



COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT

'SKATE PARK BENDIGO' - 2005

Much has happened during this Rotary year to move the process of establishing the 'SKATE PARK' project in Eaglehawk closer to reality.

In Brief:

- Application for planning permit resulted in 12 objections and a mediation meeting was held at the City of Greater Bendigo Council Offices to voice concerns.
- Council unanimously approved application and a late objector takes the application to a Directions Hearing at VCAT.
- 'Directions Hearing' outcome rules in our favour and dismisses late objector. We are granted a 'Planning Permit' by the City of Greater Bendigo to build a 'state of the art' skate park in the location requested by the user groups and all concerned with the skate park.
- Consultations are in progress with a graphic designer to develop promotional material for the launch of the fund raising campaign. This will also include the establishment of a web site where skaters will be able to see the proposed design and get all the relevant information about the skate park as well as have links with the designer, CONVIC Design.

The next Rotary year will hopefully see a concerted effort of fund raising and the realisation of another Rotary Club of Eaglehawk community project to benefit the youth of the region.

California Gully Mechanics Institute

Undoubtedly one of the highlights of the year, in fact one of the highlights in the history of the Club, was the function held on Sunday 20th February 2005, to mark the opening of the renovated heritage listed building in School Street. The completion of stage 1 of the renovation programme not only provided us with a permanent “home” for our Club, but also restored a community facility back to a valuable asset.

The City of Greater Bendigo deserves our sincere thanks for their support, not only for appointing the Club as the Committee of Management, but also for funding grants totalling \$40,000.00. Additional money was raised by:

- (a) rentals paid by our regular tenants, a dance school and a carpet bowls competition, a total in excess of \$13,200.
- (b) Club members “buying” chairs for the meeting room \$4,200.00, and
- (c) Club members loans of \$6,200.00

Whilst the works could not have been carried out without the funds to purchase materials, and engage the services of skilled tradesmen, the most significant contribution to the project was provided by the countless volunteer hours put in by Rotarians, partners and friends. It has been estimated that more than 5000 hours of voluntary works was put in, of which Stan Spencely alone contributed at least 2000, with Bill Slee and John Haugh also being very significant and tireless contributors.

Mention should also be made of the assistance given by our partners, who not only provided food and sustenance at all times, but also raised funds for purchase of venetian blinds for every window.

The Building Committee, comprising Stan Spencely, Bill Slee, Rob Layton, Alf Thorpe, and myself, continued to meet during the year, and will do so until the whole project has been completed. A Committee of Management has now been created, to operate the facility and raise funds by letting it out for functions, as well as regular tenancies. This Committee has the same members as the Building one, with the addition of Carolyn Robinson. For the forthcoming Rotary year, Walter Lourie, as Club President, will be an ex-officio member on the Committee of Management.

The project is not complete, although the interior of the building has been fully restored to its former glory. There is much to do externally including construction of a new toilet block, entry foyer, car parking and storage sheds.

It was very gratifying to all of us that Stan Spencely, John Haugh and Bill Slee were recognized for their efforts at the Function on 20th February. It was also very pleasing to be awarded, by District Governor Judy Nettleton, with a special Centennial Project certificate, for our outstanding achievement.
