#### First Rotary Club

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and three friends, Sylvester Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, met in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago to discuss Paul's idea that businessmen should get together periodically for camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances.

From their discussion came the idea for a men's club which would meet weekly and whose membership would be limited to one representative from each business and profession. After enlisting a fifth member, Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Sylvester Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become it president until two years later.

### **ROTARY FOUNDATION**

During Rotary year 2006/07 our Club maintained its strong history of support for the Foundation, in four ways:

- The Club has continued to make a direct financial contribution, often in conjunction with the awarding of a Paul Harris Fellow recognition, or a Sapphire to a existing P.H.F.
- Some of our members make personal contributions by being on-going participants in the Centurion Club.
- We have a number of members who give unselfishly of their time and expertise as volunteers for worthy projects in needy countries in our region of the world. - We continue to support the Pattaya Orphanage, in Thailand, following the creation of the Farm project through multi Club and Foundation financial assistance.

This year has been a busy and successful year in community service.

We kicked off the year on Sunday July 30 with a BBQ for 'Greening Australia's' tree planting program at lake Tom Thumb reserve. A 'Wine Tasting' evening was held in September where those who attended had a very pleasant evening, although not as successful as one would have hoped it did raise a few hundred dollars, so I guess that's what it is all about. Wednesday the 21<sup>st</sup> was our musical night and this year we opted for a change of format. 'Festival Idol', a talent show structured loosely along the lines of the TV show produced some excellent local talent, the entertainment was outstanding and the evening was a great success, raising about \$2000 toward the Skate Park project.

### Rotary Tour of India – Rita O'Brien

Delhi was the starting point for my tour of India with the Rotary club of Chadstone/East Malvern. We visited many magnificent tourist attractions, including my highlight the Taj Mahal at Agra. The bus driver, with the speed and skill of a slalom skier, transported us from Chenni (Madres) to Karikal to be warmly greeted by members of the Rotary club of Karakal – our guides for three days.

At Paravaipet Village (D9800 Tsunami project SAVI) we met our allocated 45 families and inspected the houses under construction.

Thanks to help with fundraising from our club, I presented \$1000 (34,000 Rupees) each to the Thiruivalivar Tamil School in Karikal (a private, free school for 175 children of slum dwellers) and the Rama Krishna School in Chidambaram, which provides education for the disabled. A moving experience.

### EAST TIMOR:

6 Eaglehawk Rotarians, together with a partner and family member, joined with Rotarians from other clubs and districts, along with Master Builders Association Victoria members, to work on Rebuilding Balibar Primary School.

After starting this project during the 2005/6 Rotary year, it is pleasing to report that this school of 3 classrooms, plus new male and female toilet facilities, a computer and staff room, all with electricity and running water was completed and officially opened by the First Lady of Timor Leste, Kirsty Sword-Gusmao in October, 2006. It was a grand occasion, with Brigadier Mick Slater and other members of the Australian Defence Force attending as Rotarian Heather Ridge formally quests. presented and unveiled the Tile Mosaic given as a gift from the Eaglehawk Primary School to their sister school Balibar Primary School in East Timor. The sister school relationship was set up by the First Lady Kirsty, as a part of her Friendship Schools Programme. The Mosaic of Eaglehawk Primary School was created by the children of Eaglehawk as part of their school 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations and has been built into the front wall at Balibar school.

One container from this area was loaded with school uniforms, made by ladies from Eaglehawk Primary School, classroom furniture and computers, also for Balibar Primary School, together with building materials to complete this project.

A re-union of team members who have worked on projects in East Timor, their families and friends, was held at Camp Getaway Axedale in March, 2007. Many volunteers indicated that they were keen to return to East Timor if another project is undertaken.

Civil unrest once again dominated the news this year, with continued destruction of buildings. It is hoped that life will return to calm for the East Timorese after Government elections in July this year. Rotary has decided not to send work parties to East Timor until after these elections.

Xanana Gusmao has stood down as the country's President and is seeking a position in Government – possibly as Prime Minister. Dr. Jose Ramos Horta has recently been elected as the new President.

### INDIA:

Eaglehawk Rotarian Rita O'Brien, joined a group of District Rotarians and friends to travel to South East India in February 2007, to inspect the building progress of 23 homes which Rotary District 9800 is paying to build as a result of the devastation caused by the Tsunami in 2004. Rita organised a couple of fund raising functions and Eaglehawk Club increased funds raised to total \$2000 for Rita to distribute to a school for disabled children at Chidambaram and a school in Karaikal for street kids.

### <u>'SKATE PARK BENDIGO'</u> - <u>2006-2007</u>

Much again has happened during this Rotary year to bring the process of establishing the 'SKATEPARK BENDIGO' project in Eaglehawk closer to reality.

The Year In Brief:

- > Fundraising Campaign continued in earnest.
- Meetings with Politicians, CVACC, DVC, and respective submissions for grants proved successful with both the State and Federal Governments providing \$100,000.00 each toward the proposed facility.
- A total of 7 Platinum, 4 Gold, 15 Silver & 10 Bronze Sponsorships (see sponsor list attached) have been received to-date with countless smaller donations from the broader community to make the 'Fundraising Barometer' read \$443,000.00 at the time of compiling this report – a fantastic effort to reach this target in ~21 months.
- There were many and varied great fundraising events over the last 12 months but a special mention must go to Rotarian Heather Ridge's Garden Party last November which featured the raffle of an original watercolour by acclaimed local artist Terry Jarvis. The afternoon raised \$3,151.00 and culminated in the public announcement by Jacinta Allan MP that the State Government would contribute \$100,000.00 to the skate park – what an afternoon!
- PDG Gordon & Anita McKern announced that they will match Michael McKern's (McKern Building Products) contribution of \$25,000.00 making a total of \$50,000.00

toward the skate park and that the facility will be known as the **McKern Skatepark** when completed. This will be a tribute to the lifetime contribution and commitment to the Eaglehawk Community by the McKern family – a truly magnificent gesture of support for the youth of the region.

- Combined Rotary Clubs of Bendigo agreed to donate 25% percent of this years 'Swap Meet' profits to the 'Skatepark Bendigo' project. This resulted in a donation of \$10,000.00.
- Cocktail evening held 30<sup>th</sup> May 2007 to thank all major sponsors (Platinum, Silver, Gold & Bronze) and present them with Certificates of Appreciation.
- Convic prepare final tender documents and tender is advertised in the Advertiser on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> June 2007.
- Convic are presently preparing landscaping documentation and hopefully this contract will run parallel with the construction of the skate park.

It has been a very successful year of fundraising for the skate park project and I would like to thank everyone who has in anyway assisted with this campaign.

It is all about providing the youth of the region with a facility that they have been desperately wanting for many years and once constructed they will be proud to take ownership of.

It is envisaged that the park will be constructed by October this year including the associated landscaping (here's hoping anyway!!).
