PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2008-2009

PRESIDENT ALF THORPE

It is with much pleasure I present the Annual Report for the Rotary Year 2008/2009.

It has been a busy year with many ongoing projects.

The 'Stephanie Alexander Kitchen' project at Eaglehawk primary School was successfully completed with the opening in October, congratulations to Leon, Walter, Doug Poole, Trevor, and the many others who participated in this excellent project.

Working bees were held on many weekends, dismantling and removing equipment and materials from Eaglehawk Secondary College, Weeroona College and Golden Square Secondary College, as well as Flora Hill Primary School; most of which was, or is destined for East Timor for the ongoing projects over there. As well, there were working bees at Heather Ridge's and Mayfair, to load the containers for East Timor.

The Neanger Park Pony Club Project was started, with plans afoot for that to continue.

On Saturday 6th of February we had that devastating fire that resulted in the loss of one life. About sixty homes and over one hundred and sixty other buildings were destroyed. Our own member, Norm Kenyon, lost his home and another member, Geoff Adcock, suffered some damage.

As the fires were located in the Maiden Gully, California Gully, and Long Gully areas, we were presented with a challenge; how do we respond? What can we do to help those affected by this terrible event? Immediately after black Saturday we invited

all affected families to a fellowship meet and talk social event at our club rooms, this event was supported by the Eaglehawk Brass Band and the Eaglehawk Football Club.

We distributed 5 holiday packages donated by the LaSalle Motel in Narooma, NSW and 15 Bicycles donated by the Police 'Blue Light' organisation, all to worthy affected families.

Some members joined with Leon Scott in clearing a property in Happy Valley Road where the house had been destroyed.

Our major effort was to offer to have title boundaries of affected properties surveyed; letters were sent to 125 property owners and so far 71 properties have been surveyed. The cost of the project is expected to be approximately \$55000 and this has been raised through donations from Community enterprise foundation \$30000, the Australian American Motorbike Club who donated \$5350, radio station 4BN in Brisbane \$5000, District 9800 recovery fund \$10000 and many other sources.

The 'Rose' project continues with another five students Urgn, Nut, Kaew, Gib and Rit arriving in May. On Track, once again will provide the core of their studies; many thanks to On Track for their continued support of this project. Thank you also to Girton College, Catholic College, Victory Christian College and Creek Street Christian College and Eaglehawk Secondary College for their support. Ploy, a 'Rose' student from 2007/8 is also at Girton on a scholarship awarded to her; she is doing very well and is to be congratulated on her achievement so far.

Ploy made her debut at the Dahlia and Arts Ball this year; she looked delightful and made her host family proud, I'm sure it was a night she will remember always.

The 'Rose' program could not succeed without the generous support of the Host families, thank you very much, as well as other supporters in Thai Airways, the Rotary Clubs of Bendigo Sandhurst, Bendigo Strathdale, Kangaroo Flat and Jomtien Pattaya.

This year, District Governor Jim Studebaker paired each of the Goldfields Cluster Clubs with a metropolitan cluster and asked that we work with that cluster on a drought relief project.

Eaglehawk was paired with Gateway Cluster which consists of Essendon, Moonee Valley, Tullamarine, Keilor, East Keilor Essendon North and North Melbourne.

Gateway raised \$3000 for drought relief with which we were then able use to assist affected students at Inglewood Primary School and Pyramid Hill College with school and camp fees, books and uniforms.

Other Projects this club has engaged in during the year has been erecting and dismantling the Nativity Scene at the Eaglehawk Town Hall, setting up seats and running the BBQ on Australia Day at Canterbury Gardens, assisting in the setting up and pulling down of the Dahlia and Arts Festival, Clean Up Australia day, and we also entered a team in the Relay for life.

We sent two Students from Eaglehawk Secondary College to the Skandia Weekend and awarded two scholarships at the 2008 end of year awards.

Fundraising has also been a busy time with many activities held during the year. In August we joined with 3 other Rotary Clubs to cater for the '150 years of Defence in Bendigo' celebrations; unfortunately wet and cold weather kept the crowds down and only a very small profit was made.

September we had the annual 'Cycle about Whipstick' and November we joined with the other 5 clubs once again to cater for the 'Swap Meet'; recipients this year were Righteous Pups, The Bendigo Youth Choir and the Bendigo Volunteer Resource Centre.

The Christmas Stocking Raffle ran during December, then in March we once again produced the 'Festival Idol' competition during the 'Dahlia and Arts' Festival, this year there was an increase in entries and those who made it through the audition

round to the final were of a very high standard; the judges award was won by Elizabeth Barrow from Bendigo; she sang 'Poor Wandering One' from Pirates of Penzance; the audience award was won by Sinead Archbold of Eaglehawk and this year, for the first time, we gave two encouragement awards, one to Sam Eddy of Kangaroo Flat and the other to Jessica Kulwin from Lancefield.

A BBQ was held for the Astronomy Club in April and the annual 'Bendigo by Bike' followed in May; the final fundraiser for this year was the Chrysler Car Club catering at the Bendigo Town Hall.

I have to congratulate both the mechanics committee and the catering committee on their outstanding achievements this year. First the catering committee; Bill Slee, John Haugh, Rita O'Brien and their helpers have been magnificent in what they have achieved, they have catered for well over 30 events and, along with the bar, they have made well over \$13,000; an outstanding result.

The Mechanics Institute Committee has also achieved much. There has been a new front fence and gates erected, the car park has been completed to an all weather standard, a veranda with concrete floor has been erected to protect the back of the building.

Shrubs have been planted along the back and north fence lines, a watering system installed with kerbing to protect them.

The side door has been opened up allowing access to the meeting room when the front hall is in use, new equipment bought for the kitchen and an exhaust canopy is being assembled over the stove and grill plate.

Lastly I must thank our Rotary Partners.

Many have been actively involved in so many projects, from catering at working bees, participating in fundraising events such as the swap meet, the Chrysler BBQ, the Idol competitions, the Christmas stocking raffle and other events; much of what we have done this year simply could not have succeeded, without their assistance.

My partner, Joye initiated a project to collect 5 cent coins and together with so many partners and Rotarians taking part, they collected over \$300 in 5 cent coins. The efforts and achievements of our partners must be acknowledged, thank you to all the partners.

Finally, I thank you for your support, I have enjoyed my year as President and I wish incoming President, John Jones and his team, every success, I pledge my support to him and hope he enjoys his year.

EAST TIMOR REPORT - 2008 - 2009

Strong support for East Timor during this Rotary year has been provided once again through the City of Greater Bendigo-Maubisse Friendship Community Committee projects.

Rotarians from all Clubs in this area have supported many working bees to salvage building materials, school furniture and equipment, donated by the Loddon Mallee Region of the Department of Education from schools earmarked for demolition through the Bendigo Education Plan. Together with donations of household items and clothing, the school collectables have contributed to 9 container loads of goods being packed and forwarded to East Timor this year, with 2 more being loaded at present. These containers along with the corresponding paperwork are sent via District 9800 Donations in Kind Co-ordinator PP Bill Dagg and very capably handled in Dili by Rotary Liaison Officer, Rtn. Daryl Mills, who is also a tremendous help with all projects being undertaken in East Timor. A collection of about 30 generators of various capacities has been donated and will be used to provide power, lights and access to IT facilities for many schools in the Maubisse region.

The 'Bendigo Volunteers House' has been refurbished and now provides comfortable western style accommodation as well as cooking and laundry facilities for work party team members and visiting professionals from our area. Community volunteers, Rotarians and their partners, as well as staff from City of Greater Bendigo have brought this project to fruition.

Liquetei School is currently being built from a dismantled Reservoir Road Council depot building. At present the footings, concrete floor, frame for three classrooms, iron clad roof and verandah have been completed. School children currently carry their desk and chair to their old classrooms. At the close of their school day, the furniture is returned to a store

room. Certainly beats sitting on bamboo poles, the floor or standing in class all day and proves how much this furniture is appreciated by the children. Rtn. Heather Ridge is currently leading a team of 13 Literacy Specialists to East Timor, spending one week in Dili and the second week in Maubisse.

Two East Timorese Nuns spent time during 10th-27th September 2008 in Bendigo, staying with Rtn. Maureen Lougoon. Thanks to PE John Jones for arranging a program in the schools throughout the area and PP Peter Cox for providing a learning environment at On Track for Literacy and Numeracy classes. Mariazinha and Joaninah thoroughly enjoyed their stay and I thank everyone involved for their support.

Guest Speaker engagements have resulted in several donations of funds to assist with freight costs in transportation of containers. PDG Gordon McKern has applied for a matching grant of \$45,000 through the Rotary Foundation to pay further freight costs.

Through donated funds, working bee volunteers, or work party team members from the Rotary Clubs of Eaglehawk, Kangaroo Flat, Keilor, Bendigo South, Bendigo, Bendigo Strathdale, Ballarat South, Bright, Brighton, Euroa, Rochester, Traralgon, Bendigo Sandhurst, Essendon North, Williamstown-Port Gellibrand, and the corporate sector, our near neighbours in East Timor have been very well supported throughout the past Rotary year.

BUSHFIRE ASSISTANCE

Saturday, 6th February 2009 has become known as "Black Saturday", with good reason. Whilst, understandably, everyone's attention was drawn to the devastating fires to the east and north-east of Melbourne, there were 61 homes destroyed in Bendigo, 125 properties damaged, and 1 life lost. As the fires were located in the Maiden Gully, California Gully, Long Gully and Ironbark areas, our Club accepted a major role in providing comfort and assistance for the victims.

Unfortunately, our own member Norm Kenyon, lost his house in Upper Road, and Geoff and Beryl Adcock, came close to losing theirs in Dean Street.

Our first function, held immediately after Black Saturday, we invited all the affected families to a no-charge fellowship evening, supported by the Eaglehawk Brass Band, the Eaglehawk Football Club, and others. The evening was well attended, and gave people the opportunity to meet and talk.

Soon afterwards, the Anglican Church set up "Our Place" in the Eaglehawk shopping strip, with Tracey Wolseley as a fulltime Chaplain. Lola Miller was asked to be our Club's liaison with Tracey, and this has proved to be an excellent arrangement, with a large number of services/assistance being offered, as well as comfort and advice.

The La Salle Motel, Narooma NSW, made available five holiday packages, for a 1 week stay for a family of up to 5. Four of them have been offered, and accepted, by families who lost their homes.

The Police Blue Light Organization, donated 15 bicycles, these were given to people who were in need of means of transport.

Led by Leon Scott, Club members cleaned up a property in Happy Valley Road where the house had been destroyed. The owner was an elderly lady who was very grateful for the assistance.

Our major project, suggested by Leon, has been to offer title boundary survey to those properties where the fences were lost. Letters were sent to 125 property owners, resulting in 71 acceptances. With the co-operation of Roger Muller, Survey manager at the D.S.E. Bendigo office, the four accredited Bendigo-based land survey businesses agreed to carry out the work at a reduced rate. The survey businesses are CPG Australia, Adrian Cummins & Associates, Geoff Shaw & Associates, and Tomkinson Group.

The total cost of the project is expected to be about \$55,000. The funds have been secured, as follows:

In addition to his assistance in the kitchen, John Haugh deserves special thanks for his tireless efforts as caretaker. He is in attendance virtually every day, without fuss or bother, doing what is necessary to maintain "our home" in a spotless condition.

Thanks also to the Mechanics committee, Rob Layton, Alf Thorpe, Walter Lourie, Bill Slee, and John Haugh.

First Rotary Club

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and three friends, Sylvester Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, met in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago to discuss Paul's idea that businessmen should get together periodically for camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances.

From their discussion came the idea for a men's club which would meet weekly and whose membership would be limited to one representative from each business and profession. After enlisting a fifth member, Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Sylvester Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become it president until two years later.

NEW GENERATIONS REPORT

2008/09 has been another positive year for the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk in our endeavour to support young people within and beyond our community. Highlights include the following:

RYLA: Our candidate, Nadia McCombe, had a wonderful time at RYLA in December and provided a most engaging and entertaining report on her experience to the club. Nadia has expressed interest in pursuing ongoing involvement with Rotary, especially in Youth Leadership programs.

Skandia: P.P. Wayne McAuliffe managed this program and we were fortunate in that this year we were able to send two candidates, Emma Lewis and Ashlee Fry. Both have reported back to the club and this project continues to be a key platform in our youth development program. An unexpected bonus was a donation of \$500.00 per participant from the Skandia Corporation. In turn \$500.00 was made available as a seeding grant for Storm the Stage.

Junior Citizenship Awards: Again Grade 6 students from six primary schools in our area, Eaglehawk, Eaglehawk North, Comet Hill, California Gully, St Liborius and Raywood, were asked to nominate a Grade 6 student who best represented the core values of the school. Each successful student was presented with a certificate and a \$20.00 voucher at their respective Grade 6 graduations.

Eaglehawk Literature Festival: The festival was conducted on Universal Children's Day in October. Our involvement was to provide a barbecue lunch for about 500 young people (aged 3 – 7) at Canterbury Park. The Festival included a storyteller,

story reading hosted by secondary college students in business houses in the Eaglehawk shopping strip and entertainment at Canterbury Park.

MUNA: In June this year we sponsored two students to attend MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly). Our students, Leah Mitchell and Tia Steen, represented Spain and, as such, had to represent that country's point of view in debates across a range of international issues. We look forward to hearing about their experiences.

A continuing challenge is our involvement with the National Youth Science Forum. To date we have requests for support from three outstanding young candidates but we do not have the financial capacity to support all three. They have yet to complete the selection process. When that process is completed we will need to ascertain just how much financial support we can provide.

The New Generations Portfolio continues to provide a wide range of opportunities for young people in our area, which is only constrained by our capacity to generate the financial resources to support those opportunities. I look forward to maintaining the priority of this portfolio on 2009/10.
