

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2013-2014

PRESIDENT RON PAYNE

The obvious opening line is **“Where has that year gone?”**

When appointed as incoming President it was with some apprehension as an overriding concern was my capacity to ensure the high standards of predecessors and the good name of the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk was not diminished.

Whether or not I have been successful in this is for others to judge, however I know that this has been one of the busiest years of my life and I have been fortunate to have been involved in a wide range of service and have met many wonderful people who make marvellous contributions through their giving and their time.

‘Engage Rotary and Change Lives’ was the theme for my year. With an acknowledgement that Rotary worldwide was experiencing membership challenges, I included a focus on building membership as one of my key objectives. We have inducted four quality people into our club this year and I am sure they will make significant contributions over the coming years. The ‘Friends of Rotary’ concept was also adopted, however has not progressed far at present. This has potential to provide a strong support base for the club, particularly in terms of local community service activities. The president alone cannot drive such initiatives however and members need to be far more proactive in encouraging the involvement of others if we are to grow this group and to provide them with meaningful involvement. My final endeavour with respect to broadening our membership base was to explore the concept of an Interact club, drawing on the potential involvement of students from Eaglehawk Secondary College. This remains a work in progress and something I will continue to provide leadership to the club in.

A further key objective was to lead the club through a visioning exercise. While this was not greeted with open arms by some, and has not been strongly promoted by me as a guiding document, it has been an important process and the outcome now provides strategic direction for the club should incoming president Richard wish to pursue this. The document was presented to the combined boards meeting recently and I believe, because members had the opportunity of input, reflects where our club's immediate direction lies. That will be very much up to the willingness of members to embrace it.

The membership profile of our club is very diverse. Our vocations allow broad integration across the community and the age range brings with it wisdom borne of long Rotary and life experience as well as strong potential from the enthusiasm of newer members. We must however remain relevant within our community by encouraging enterprise and opportunity, by embracing change and not stifling new energy and endeavour through adopting an attitude of "that's the way we've always done it!" We must continue to encourage and support the progressive attitude displayed by many of our members this year.

The Rotary Club of Eaglehawk is a leader within District 9800 and, while I have consciously worked at ensuring our club has been an active member of our Rotary district and cluster, there is no doubting that our strength has been very much underpinned by the established programs and major projects that have become our focus over recent years.

Our standing within the Foundation giving program is undeniably strong and the contributions of all, and some members in particular, is simply meritorious. I am hopeful that incoming president Richard's intentions in this area are successful.

The one thing that you can count on with the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk is that when we need support for the conduct of longstanding community events, our membership turnout is first

class. Australia Day, Dahlia & Arts, ANZAC Day, the Swap Meet and the numerous community group BBQs are all greeted with solid support.

A recent presentation by PP Howard Osborne of the history of the R.O.S.E. program reinforced just what an outstanding program this is and how the lives of so many can be positively impacted when determination to do good meets with support across many layers of our communities. The fact our club is taking on the challenge of reintroducing the Youth Exchange program next year while continuing our commitment to R.O.S.E. demonstrates a powerful determination to support programs that really make a difference and I congratulate our Board for this.

The continuing work within East Timor has also become a cornerstone of our club's work in the international field. Aside from the ongoing visitation program led by Leon Scott and involving members of our club, its connection with the 'Friends of Maubisse' Group serves to strengthen our club's ties with other service organisations and I wish to thank all involved for their ongoing efforts.

An area that probably didn't go as well as I had hoped was in the makeup and function of the respective committees.

I tried an approach intended to more strongly empower individuals and to give authority for each team in designing their direction for the year. My leadership may have been lacking in providing the guidance necessary, however, when I reflect in a holistic sense, the respective committees have achieved a great deal and I'm not sure that we could have fitted in too much more anyhow.

I extend my sincere appreciation to the directors of each committee and to the members for the work undertaken throughout this Rotary year. The committees are the backbone of our club's operation and each has undertaken many tasks that have contributed to a successful twelve months. The very nature of our club's priorities dictates that some will have more profile than others and this was

the case this year. The report by each director will provide due recognition to the programs and efforts of members.

In bringing my report to a close, and notwithstanding what I have covered above, I also wish to note some aspects of our year that have been highlights to me and cause me to feel that the experience has been most rewarding.

- Our weekly meetings have been a standout to me. We have been exposed to an outstanding program thanks to Leon Scott and his team. I can't recall any meeting where our attendance would have been below 80%
- My involvement with fellow Presidents within our cluster led to some wonderful friendships being formed and a genuine endeavour to build the collegiate nature of clubs doing work together.
- The Gold Coast Conference was most rewarding. While I respect the views of others in not attending, this provided me with a firsthand opportunity of seeing the collective power of Rotary at work. The presentations featuring key work of all clubs within our District was nothing short of amazing. We belong to an incredible organisation.
- I have worked with District leaders this year in an endeavour to promote more programs being conducted in the rural areas. We ran a successful Rotary Leadership Institute at the Mechanics this year and have a commitment to continue this. We must commit to attendance however, otherwise this opportunity will be lost.
- Our social program was very enjoyable. We participated in some great activities and Carolyn Robinson did a marvellous job leading this area of our program.

I looked through my weekly programs summaries. There is so much more that could possibly have been included in this report, from the

raft of activities we've been involved in to the mention of individuals for the outstanding contributions each has made. I trust that you will simply accept my thanks for a job well done and for having made this a memorable experience for me and my wife Deb who has lent patience and support to me in my year as president.

Thank you and best wishes to Richard and his incoming team.

Once again our Club has been an outstanding contributor to this vital facet of our Rotary organization.

- Twenty three of our members have made personal commitments to the Every Rotarian Every Year programme. There would be very few Rotary Clubs in Australia that would have as high a percentage of members as we have for the Foundation.
- Six of these 23 are members of the Paul Harris Society, which means they have committed themselves to a minimum contribution of \$US1000 each year, of these PHS Members, two have been recognized as Major Donors, which means that they have contributed in excess of \$US10,000 in Total Personal Giving.
- Since the Club was chartered in 1966, a total of 47 worthy people have been recognized with the Paul Harris Fellow Award. Thirty three of them are current or Honorary members, as at the date of this Annual Report. Fourteen of them have Sapphire or Ruby recognition.
- A Club contribution of \$2000 has been forwarded to The Rotary Foundation, this represents \$50 per member.

In 2013/2014 the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk has continued to support a wide range of youth programs. Cooperation with other New Generation (now Youth Services) Directors across the cluster through quarterly meetings has expedited the delivery of programs with the willingness of clubs to support each other being a strong feature of that cooperation. A very positive relationship with Eaglehawk SC through chaplain Tracey Wolsley is also of great benefit.

With the support of club members **Junior Citizenship Awards** were presented to primary schools in our area – Lightning Reef, Eaglehawk, Eaglehawk North, St Liborius, Raywood and California Gully. Many clubs have difficulty in attracting candidates because of the timing during the school holidays but our traditional process negates that issue. In March we sponsored two students to **RYPEN** (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment).

Our **RYLA** (Rotary Youth Leadership Award) candidate for this Rotary Year was Zoe Schenck. Zoe is a university student studying

education and works extensively with young people in Eaglehawk. Zoe provided an enthusiastic report to the Club on her experiences.

For the first time in many years RC Eaglehawk was involved in Youth Exchange as the sponsor club for Jessica Burch. Jess spent 2013 in Brazil and enjoyed a wonderful experience. During her exchange she provided regular reports to the Club. In July we will be hosting an incoming exchange student, Sigurd Lovisendal, from Norway and this project is being coordinated by incoming Director, Gordon Tivendale. We are currently seeking further offers of support from potential host families.

Fundraising continues to present a challenge. Another successful trivia night was held in October in association with ROSE and this has allowed us to sustain our support for the suite of programs offered to our young people.

First Rotary Club

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and three friends, Sylvester Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, met in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago to discuss Paul's idea that businessmen should get together periodically for camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances.

From their discussion came the idea for a men's club which would meet weekly and whose membership would be limited to one representative from each business and profession. After enlisting a fifth member, Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Sylvester Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become its president until two years later.

R.O.S.E. Program:

The 10th year of the **R.O.S.E. Program** concluded successfully on 9th May 2014 and since inception in 2004 has seen a total of 19 students from the Pattaya Orphanage and the Fr. Ray Foundation Home for Children arrive in Bendigo from Thailand to partake in this life changing Program.

Currently we have two students here in Bendigo and it is fitting that in the 10th year Ploy (from the Pattaya Orphanage) is completing her final year at La Trobe University and will graduate with her Degree in Graphic Design.

Annie (from the Fr Ray Foundation) is in Year 11 at Girton Grammar School and will aim at completing her VCE in 2015. Annie would like to study Nursing at University in Bangkok.

I would sincerely like to acknowledge the support provided by, and the love and dedication shown to Annie & Ploy by their respective host parents Liz and Rt. Les Dingfelder and Leonie Adamson (PHF) over the entire journey of their stay in Bendigo and for their support for the Program over many years.

I would like to also acknowledge Girton Grammar School for their continued support of the Program and their caring and holistic approach to the welfare and education of the R.O.S.E. students past and present.

East Timor

Please refer to the comprehensive report by PP John Jones regarding the continuing work of Rotary in East Timor.

An amount of \$2000 is put aside annually in the International Committee's budget for ongoing financial support for Rotary's work in East Timor.

I would like to extend my congratulations to John, members, family and friends of the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk for their successful reconnaissance and rebuilding trips to East Timor and the dedication shown to the people of East Timor. Hopefully our Club will support John in the coming Rotary year.

Tanzania – Lara Manning:

Lara Manning was presented with a cheque for \$500 to aid in her volunteer work in the Rift Valley, Tanzania, Africa.

Lara contacted the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk via email to let us know that she has arrived safely in Tanzania and thanked the club for its support of \$500 toward expenses whilst working at the orphanage.

A subsequent email was received from Lara who has been the recipient of a teachers grant. As a result she will be a full time teacher still living at the orphanage and does not need as much financial assistance as first expected. She will be making a donation to the orphanage instead – we wish her every success.

'Team China' Primary Schools:

RC of Eaglehawk has supported the sending of a team of local PS students to China in the 'Team China' Program – an amount of \$300 per Rotary Club from the 6 local Rotary Clubs was raised to purchase the uniforms for the students – a great initiative of the local Primary Schools involved.

The total funds raised for the International Committee 2013–2014 adequately covered our original budget estimate of ~\$20k (refer annual financial report).

Finally I would like to congratulate President Ron on a great year of Rotary service and I would also like to wish incoming President Richard all the very best for 2014-2015.

Peter Sullivan, Work Safe Officer, outlined the licensing requirements, daily activities and responses required in the conduct of the role of Work Safety Inspectors, highlighting the ‘dos and don’ts’ encountered on a daily basis.

Geoff Hocking – artist, author, designer, spoke of his latest book “Memories” which commemorates the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of World War 1 – a fascinating 100 years, 100 memorials, in 100 different towns.

“Our Shed” co-ordinator, Mark Polsen; Simon Clay, City of Greater Bendigo co-ordinator of Waste Management; and Rod Bowles, long time Executive Officer of the Bendigo Show Society enlightened us on their varied roles, and all members are indebted to Program Director Leon Scott for bringing forward such an entertaining program.

In the latter months of 2013 we conducted our inaugural “Pride of Workmanship” Awards for employees within our club environs, catering for apprentices, retail, business, service, professional and trade vocations. As a bonus it proved to be an invaluable promotional exercise and a most satisfying opportunity to promote our Rotary Club. A most enjoyable Presentation Evening was attended by all Award Winners and their partners as well as their employers and partners. Generous sponsors enabled us to present each Award Winner with \$200, an engraved plaque and Rotary “Pride of Workmanship” Certificate. It is very gratifying to see those Certificates on display at the workplaces involved. The lessons learned from this initial competition can be applied to future Awards.


