PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2016-2017

PRESIDENT RON PAYNE

Like most, the 2016/17 Rotary Year has been a very busy one for many of our members. A number of new approaches to our service endeavours were tried, some successful and others not so. The year however has again seen our club ensuring that our theme of "Rotary Serving Humanity" was pursued across all avenues of service and our individual Director reports will highlight the broad array of initiatives we were involved in.

I wish to extend thanks to all members and their partners for whatever level of contribution you made to our club during my year as President. I quite willingly adopted District Governor Neville's mantra of "You do whatever you can when you can," as our club is made up of people with varying levels of capacity and we need to continue to be mindful of this as we look to further build our membership and undertake our Rotary work.

An early highlight for our year was the celebration of our 50th anniversary which was attended by many past and present members, by our District Governor Neville and Rebecca, and with a special guest being Charter and current member PP Roy Parker. Our commemorative photo will be a valued memento for many years to come.

During this year we unfortunately lost a longstanding member and community stalwart in Lola Miller, OAM BEM. It is clear that Lola left a significant legacy of community service and will not be forgotten. We also recognised the sad passing of Ruth Orde, wife of honorary member Bill. Our thoughts are with both families. During this year we have inducted five new members who I am sure will prove to be very active

contributors to our club's future. Ken Martin, Dean Pearce, Jill Barker, Peter Taylor and Gary Frank have all injected positive levels of enthusiasm through the tasks they've already taken on.

Our presence in the local community, and building our profile, was something I wished to strongly focus on for the year and I thank members for the range of support provided. Some of the more significant local work achieved included:

- The Rotary Bookshop has become an institution under Rita O'Brien's guidance and is proving a steady source of fundraising for the club.
- Our involvement with the Swap Meet. The weather gods didn't treat us too well but we still achieved some significant fundraising through our catering and car parking efforts.
- A number of our members contributing time over the course of the year in supporting the District's clubs under Leon Scott's leadership to produce a high quality industrial kitchen at Camp Getaway. I found this to be one of my more enjoyable experiences for the year and looked forward to being involved.
- Small working bees to clean up rubbish from local resident's homes.
- Provision of new whitegoods in support of community organisations assisting the underprivileged and homeless
- A major makeover at the home of Tony and Heather Lester during the family's time of need and subsequent loss. Special thanks to Les Dingfelder and Walter Lourie for their extensive work and contribution to this.
- Our traditional community service BBQ events including; Australia Day, ANZAC Day's Gunfire Breakfast, Secondary School orientation day.

A weekly dinner meeting remains the preferred mode of our members coming together and Alf Thorpe, with the support of various directors, ensured we had a most varied and stimulating program of guest speakers for the year. Topics included presentations on the Dairy Industry, the new Bendigo Tech School, Autism /Asperger's challenges, military vehicle productions, and so many more. This program was also integrated with the wonderful efforts of Les and Liz Dingfelder who put together a fellowship program that provided members with plenty of opportunity to come together in relaxed and friendly environments. My thanks to all concerned for this planning and preparation.

Fundraising remains an important but challenging aspect of our work. It is through this that we are able to do the extras at local, district, national and international levels. Our report lists the recipients of our giving for this year and I wish to thank all members for the effort made in undertaking this work. The Trivia Night, Bingo, Christmas Stocking raffle, Swap Meet, Macedon gardens trip, Bookshop and the many barbecues undertaken have been the main sources of revenue this year. Well done to all and particularly to the coordinators of each of these activities.

Our club participated in the Rotary Youth Exchange program during this year and again we got lucky with the quality of young person we were privileged to host. Ariana Fornaguera Castro (Ari) proved to be a delightful young lady who made the most of every opportunity provided to her and I'm sure she took many wonderful memories and photos home to Spain. I suspect there wouldn't be too many exchange students who go home as an Australian state champion, as Ari did in calisthenics. Thank you to those who engaged with Ari and especially to the Epskamp, Anderson and Bacon families for their hosting of Ari. I look forward to the RYE program next year as we join with the Rotary Club of Bendigo South in co-hosting Victor, a student from France.

Sincere congratulations to Leon Scott who was recently awarded a special recognition on behalf of our club and District 9800 for his ongoing contributions to Rotary. This award was instigated by one of our own members who could quite easily qualify for similar recognition. I was very pleased to be able to see this proposal supported by D9800 and presented by District Governor Neville. Well done Leon!

There are two major projects ahead that I am pleased our club has committed to support. The development of the Eaglehawk Playspace at Lake Neangar is bringing together many Eaglehawk organisations and groups and our contribution of \$20,000 towards this is a significant amount.

The other initiative will see our club joining with the Rotary Club of Kew in supporting the Stroke Association of Victoria to extend its work into the rural area of our state. Our contribution will be through partnering with SAV in facilitating their use of the Mechanics Hall to conduct their program. Together with SAV, Bendigo Health and City of Greater Bendigo, I foresee our club having a major impact on the future wellbeing of people across central and north-western Victoria through this program.

Our club is in a sound financial position. Members have instigated and supported our fundraising endeavours. All of this, together with the general financial management requirements, has been very capably overseen by our Treasurer, Carolyn Robinson. My thanks to Carolyn for her most competent management of our financials.

While I have singled out particular individuals throughout this report, I am also very mindful of, and thankful for, the work of our members and, in many cases, their partners throughout the year. I also wish to say "thank you" to my Board members for their commitment to specific responsibilities throughout the year and for the time involved in ensuring the various

avenues of service and committees have operated successfully.

In closing, I wish to extend particular thanks to Secretary, Alison Bacon, for the extremely diligent manner in which she has undertaken her work. There's been quite a deal of 'learning as you go' but Alison's support of me, and her attention to detail, has ensured that our administrative obligations have been competently addressed. Our club is acknowledged at District level as a successful one and this has been in no small part due to Alison's work. I am sure all members will join me in wishing Alison well as she steps into the President's role in 2017/18 and we trust that she and her Board have a successful and personally enjoyable year.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

DIRECTOR: ROD HANSON

Once again our Club has been a very strong contributor to the Rotary Foundation, the charitable arm of Rotary International.

This year marks the centenary of the Foundation. Arch Klumph's idea for an endowment fund dedicated to "doing good in the world" planted the seed for The Rotary Foundation in 1917. That one idea and an initial contribution of \$26.50 set in motion a powerful force for good that has transformed millions of lives around the globe. During the past 100 years, the Foundation has spent \$3 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects.

Rotary, along with our partners, has reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent worldwide since the first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979. Polio is now endemic in just two countries: Pakistan and Afghanistan. Thanks to global vaccination efforts, more than 2.5 billion children have been protected against polio since 1985. In 2015, there were 74 reported cases of polio. In 2016, that number dropped to 37. So far, in 2017, that number has reduced even further – to single digits.

Recently, The Rotary Foundation received independent verification that it sits at the top of the list as one of the world's most respected charities. Charity Navigator is an organisation that evaluates charities for their integrity and effectiveness. The Rotary Foundation was one of a handful that ticks all the boxes and has a 100% rating in all the areas of financial performance, accountability and transparency.

Our Club's achievements this year include:

- The award of second District Grant for the sum of \$2500 (the maximum available) to be matched dollar for dollar by the Club as part of our commitment of \$20,000 towards the Eaglehawk Playspace Project.
- Seventeen members of our Club continued personal commitments to the Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) program under which at least \$100 a year is given to support the work of the Foundation. We are honoured to have such a high proportion of members who support this program.
- A further four members and three "associates" of our Club, are also members of the Paul Harris Society (PHS) which requires each of these members to commit themselves to a minimum contribution of US\$1,000 each year to the Foundation, for as long as they are able to do so.
- Twenty-four of our current members have been recognised with a Paul Harris Fellow Award (PHF) for their contributions to the Foundation, the Club and the community.
- Members, who are able to do so, are encouraged to join EREY or PHS, to support this important and highly successful work of the Foundation. This year the Club and its members contributed approximately \$14,000 to the Rotary Foundation.

We were particularly saddened by the passing of Lola Miller AM BEM during the year. Lola was a devoted supporter of the Foundation.

YOUTH SERVICES REPORT

This year the approach to Youth programs saw directors from each of the cluster clubs coming together on a regular basis for meetings. The intention of this was to discuss how the established district programs might be best conducted and enhanced through a joint approach. This model proved very successful and will be continued into the coming Rotary year.

The National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) is seen by all clubs as a significant program and, for this reason, a commitment has been made for all clubs to budget for an annual contribution of \$1500 to enable it to function effectively, even if not actively participating by way of sending students.

Again, we were actively involved in the Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) and the Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) during 2016/17. Our club was represented by Eaglehawk Secondary College student Jennipher Andrews (RYPEN) and Katie Bacon (RYLA). Katie participated in our club speaking program to recount her experiences to members and affirmed the decision to support her involvement by providing a very articulate presentation. Supporting these programs is a most important aspect of our youth programs as it creates opportunity for our future leaders to further develop their public speaking and presentation skills.

In December we were involved with all local schools in the presentation of student scholarships and citizenship awards. Club members visited local schools to undertake the presentations which are always highly valued.

Thanks are extended to Alison Bacon who took on the role of student counsellor for Ari during her time with us as part of the Youth Exchange program.

First Rotary Club

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and three friends, Sylvester Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, met in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago to discuss Paul's idea that businessmen should get together periodically for camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances.

From their discussion came the idea for a men's club which would meet weekly and whose membership would be limited to one representative from each business and profession. After enlisting a fifth member, Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Sylvester Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become it's president until two years later.

CALIFORNIA GULLY MECHANICS INSTITUTE "Our Home"

This Rotary year has seen our use and management of the Mechanics Hall increase to a level whereby it is being recognised as a facility with potential far beyond that of just the home for Eaglehawk Rotary.

The willingness of some members to assume responsibility for its management is ensuring we continue to breathe new life into this wonderful old building. I extend thanks to our hall committee members for the commitment to regular meetings, their insights into how the buildings and surrounds can be improved, their regular commitment to maintenance matters and their willingness to consider how the facility can be used to support broader community groups.

A recent meeting affirmed the City Council's supportive position on our club's management role and we continue to enjoy a solid relationship with council. The significant physical improvements over the past couple of years is continuing with other minor maintenance work bringing the buildings up to a pleasing level. The addition of presentation and information technologies in due course will further enhance its capability as a meeting place.

In the coming times we will be extending community use of the facility through a partnership with the Stroke Association of Victoria, Bendigo Heath and the Rotary Club of Kew as we implement a program of support for people experiencing blood pressure concerns and for those having previously suffered stroke. This program will complement the community use already in place and capably managed by Alf Thorpe who is responsible for booking matters.

I extend particular thanks to Bill Slee for his management of the bar with the willing support of John Haugh and others with RSA qualifications. Walter Lourie and Doug Poole have taken the lead on maintenance matters and are doing an excellent job. Leon McGlashan's work with cleaning, maintenance and support of the bar management is also ensuring we maximise our resources and keep on top of things. The trial of a member roster for cleaning will hopefully address our needs and reduce potential costs of hall maintenance and management.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

DIRECTOR: HOWARD OSBORNE

A synopsis of the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk's International Committee's program for this Rotary year 2016-17 is as follows;

- We continued the R.O.S.E. (Rotary Orphan Student Education) Program this year (established in 2004). The Program has the simple mission statement or premise of 'Giving an advantage to the disadvantaged through education'.
- The R.O.S.E. Program took a different tack in 2016 instead of bringing the orphaned students to Bendigo as we have since 2004 we have committed to fully funding (over a 5 year period) 5 students (at an all-inclusive cost over the 5 years = \$6,500 per student) through a university in East Timor. This is part of the Bendigo Maubisse Friendship Committees Scholarship Program.
 - Our first sponsored student, *Mizela* is studying Medicine and Midwifery and doing well with her studies and our second student *Carmelita*, funded this year, is studying Computer Programming and we wish them both well with their studies and their future life.
- Additional to this we again will provide two \$5k educational scholarships; one to the Fr. Ray Foundation in Pattaya, Thailand, and one to the HHN (*Human Help Network*) Foundation (also in Thailand) as per 2016.

- Since 2004 we have helped provide life skills and an 'educational advantage' to 25 young disadvantaged students total of 19 Thai students from the Pattaya Orphanage and the Fr. Ray Foundation (majority have gone on to higher education/university and/or successfully employed) and six students through educational scholarships; two in East Timor and four in Thailand.
- Additional to paying for the student's university courses in East Timor (incl. living costs etc.) we are also looking at the possibility of bringing those students to Bendigo for 'work experience' thus value adding to their University degree and life experience and human development.
- To fund the R.O.S.E. Program this year we have had two main fundraisers to cover our estimated budget:
 - 1. Trip to Mt. Macedon raising \$1,787.50
- 2. Monster Christmas Stocking Raffle raising \$17,121.00. Thank you to all involved in this year's fundraising efforts it has been greatly appreciated.

Finally I would like to congratulate President Ron on a great year of Rotary service and I would also like to wish incoming President Alison and her incoming Board all the very best for 2017-2018.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE

DIRECTOR: JOHN JONES

Vocation Service has proven to be a challenging portfolio in many respects. In essence it underpins all aspects of the Rotary organisation, especially through the four way test, and so it is difficult to attribute outcomes specifically to the portfolio as such. Almost all of the programs provided to members in the course of the year have had a strong vocational theme but were not a direct initiative as such.

Specific initiatives included a review of the Pride of Workmanship Awards, vocational awareness for young people and workplace visits. The Pride of Workmanship Award has been an outstanding initiative but it has failed to attract significant enthusiasm from the business community in Eaglehawk and so the intention was to broaden the focus to align with the Bendigo Business Excellence Awards. While we have a number of very successful businesses in Eaglehawk they are perceived to be, by the local and broader communities, to be Bendigo Businesses rather than Eaglehawk specific.

Representatives from the Bendigo Business Council addressed a dinner meeting to explain the process for integration into the Excellence Awards. The cost for sponsorship of an award was found to be prohibitive this year but it is an area that can be explored in the future.

A further vocational program was Passions and Pathways, a program in three primary schools designed to raise aspirations for children and their families. Dzintra Martin, former principal of Lightning Reef Primary School, explained the program in detail and it is being explored as a prototype that could be adopted across the state. A key feature of the

program is the partnership between education, local government and business (Bendigo Manufacturers Association) community.

A further anticipated initiative was the provision of a 'Straight Talk' program with Eaglehawk Secondary College but, as a consequence of circumstances beyond our control, this did not eventuate. Rather the focus was on a younger audience through Passions and Pathways and this was through awareness raising rather than through direct involvement by members. Members, however, are encouraged to consider involvement, where appropriate, with this innovative program.

A rich and varied program limited opportunities for work place visits as did the logistics of arranging a meaningful visit outside normal working hours. A tour of the Bendigo hospital has been arranged and will prove to be educational and informative.

As stated at the outset the Vocational Services portfolio has proved challenging in that it underpins our purpose in Rotary rather than generates specific outcomes in its own right. There is, by default, a strong alignment between the portfolio and the program presented to the members on a weekly basis, almost all of which have a strong vocational focus. The integration of these two elements has much to be commended.

I would like to thank President Ron for the opportunity to serve on the Board as Vocational Services Director and look forward to working with President Elect Alison in 2017/18.
