Object of Rotary

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

DIRECTOR: JOHN JONES

Our limited capacity to fundraise in this Rotary year has again curtailed our opportunities to fund international projects.

With the support of Foundation Director, Ron Payne we have been able maintain our support for the End Polio program with an additional \$1000 being contributed through our annual disbursement program.

We did conduct a successful wine raffle – one dozen premium local wines – and so we were able to maintain our support for some programs.

We have made a contribution of \$2,000 to the father Ray Foundation in Pattaya, Thailand which we have renamed as the Howard Osborne scholarship. This supports children in an orphanage in Pattaya and is jointly administered by the Rotary Clubs of Eaglehawk and Pattaya. It is an ongoing commitment to celebrate Howard's work with the foundation and to young children in Pattaya facing challenging circumstances.

We also continued to support Bendigo Maubisse Friendship Inc with a contribution to their scholarship fund. We have four tertiary scholarships and our two earlier participants have now graduated and are contributing back to their community. In addition, we funded ten secondary school scholarships to support students in Maubisse to continue their education. We also continue to support the knitting project, now managed by Libby Hughes from RC Bendigo. This has evolved into a partnership with DIK and now sees the knitting goods being distributed to Maubisse and across the broader Timor Leste community. We also responded to request from Alola village in Papua New Guinea. The village is on the Kokoda track and their main source of cash income is to act as porters for the trekkers. With the Covid crisis this source of income has not been available. President Gary has a personal connection with the village and knows some of the porters personally and it was wonderful to be able to support them.

On a personal note we did have the tragic passing of PP Howard Osborne, PHF. Howard served as International Director for a number of years and initiated the ROSE program. His efforts have dramatically improved the life opportunities of numerous young people I Pattaya. He was always able to identify a need, recognise an opportunity and 'just do it!' Gone but not forgotten.

First Rotary Club

On the evening of February 23, 1905, Paul Harris and three friends, Sylvester Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, met in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago to discuss Paul's idea that businessmen should get together periodically for camaraderie and to enlarge their circle of business and professional acquaintances.

From their discussion came the idea for a men's club which would meet weekly and whose membership would be limited to one representative from each business and profession. After enlisting a fifth member, Harry Ruggles, the group was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Sylvester Schiele as president and Ruggles as treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become it's president until two years later.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

Although the membership of our club has declined over the past two years, we can be very proud of our achievements with respect to our support of The Rotary Foundation. As of the early part of 2022 RC Eaglehawk was recognised as the No. 1 club in District 9800 for per capita giving to the Rotary Foundation. This is an outstanding achievement.

Our Board continued its focus on Foundation with the significant contribution of \$5000.00 towards the Annual Fund. I commend the club on again achieving this goal. Our club fundraising efforts towards 'End Polio' also continued with a donation of \$1551. This figure was further added to by sponsorship in support of my 'Walk with Us" endeavour which raised a further \$1028.00.

Although we did not achieve our goal of having 100% club member involvement as either a Centurion (\$100 contribution within the year) or Every Rotarian Every Year (any level of contribution towards TRF within the year), we were still very active with fourteen of our nineteen members having contributed.

Our membership of the Paul Harris Society (\$US1000 within the year) presently sits at three and those members are acknowledged for their ongoing commitment.

There is wonderful, new energy in RC Eaglehawk, however the changing face of its membership means there is further work to be done in terms of new members becoming aware of how Foundation functions, and in understanding how they might support its fundraising efforts.

Current District Foundation Chair, PDG Murray Verso, has developed a range of informative presentations on Foundation and I encourage our incoming Foundation Director, Gary Frank, to access these in order to continue taking us forward. Incoming District Foundation Chair, PDG Grant Hocking, is also very knowledgeable and will be a good support in guiding our future Foundation efforts.

I wish incoming President Geoff Gallagher, Foundation Director Gary, and all members of our club well for a successful 2022-23 year and trust that we can maintain our commitment to the important work of The Rotary Foundation.

YOUTH SERVICES REPORT

Whilst the youth activities for our club have continued to be lower key, there has still been a range of events to acknowledge and celebrate all the same.

Lynne Cooper has continued to drive a lot of this Youth work. She has a real commitment to and passion for the youth programs run through Rotary. Lynne is to be thanked for her on-going work in this area.

The Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) did not go ahead in December 2021, but we are hopeful it will take place this year. Our Club may be able to sponsor or share sponsorship of a participant, as it's a wonderful programme.

The National Youth Science Forum. The Forum (NYSF) was held on- line in January 2021 over a two-week period. Despite the lack of face-to-face content, all 6 students reported it was an amazing experience. Thanks to Allison Bacon as Eaglehawk RC Treasurer for acting as the 'banker' for this event. One of our past ESC students, Jemma Pearce (now attending BSSC) spoke to our club about her NYSF experience and impressed the members with her enthusiasm and positive attitude.

Our Club contributed \$660.00 to the Bendigo Cluster, for this year's National Youth Science Forum.

The Rotary Exchange Program continues to be on hold due to COVID.

Teamwork with our Cluster Youth Directors. This programme continues to be highly successful as the five Bendigo Youth Directors plus those from Rochester, Echuca and Castlemaine

meet quarterly to share ideas, pool resources, and generally encourage us all to continue the Rotary Youth work. This is easy to organise and is often given as an example to other clubs to encourage teamwork and generate more positive outcomes for our future leaders.

As a club we were actively involved in the *Imagination Library* fundraising event, providing free breakfast for all attendees. Our club has since made a financial donation of \$3,000-00 toward providing resources, to then be distributed to the children (youth) in our community. Thanks also to John Jones for his communication and making the links between our club and this valuable programme.

We were again active with the *School Scholarship Program*, providing scholarships to the total value of \$300-00 to our local schools (California Gully Primary School, Eaglehawk Primary School, Eaglehawk North Primary School, Lightning Reef Primary School, St. Liborius School and Raywood Primary School). In addition, we provided \$1200.00 in Scholarships for Eaglehawk Secondary College.

Again, thanks to Alison Bacon for her co-ordination of the *'Prep Bags'* initiative, providing a bag containing educational items to encourage and support learning activities at home (i.e. book, dice, crayons, highlighters, cards, pencils, pencil case, writing pencil and Rotary Book shop voucher) for all Prep students at our local schools. This involved a financial commitment of \$1,500-00 from our Club.

I would like to thank our club members for their continued support for our club's activities and in particular, the support for our youth programmes.

The year got off to a flying start with a sausage sizzle at Bunnings.

In August it was decided to cancel a proposed Christmas raffle which was to be held in conjunction with the Bendigo South Rotary club. The cancellation was due to the rapidly expanding COVID 19 variety Omicron.

I had made an inquiry with "Keep Victoria beautiful" and their Adopt a highway program. Eaglehawk Rotary was accepted into the program and Mick Costello and I had received a safety induction. My initial contact a Keep Victoria Beautiful then retired, and no further contact was made or received, it was decided to wait until our club had more members available to conduct this work.

Alison Bacon and I attended the Rochester Rotary Club's community breakfast, which is held on a regular basis and has been attended by Alison frequently. The purpose of the breakfast is to bring representative members from all different parts of their community together, sharing their ideas about working to improve their local area. It was decided that Eaglehawk could run a similar project and it was proposed to run at least one community breakfast in the new year to gauge our community's appetite for such a meeting.

November saw the Rotary Club of Camberwell attend our meeting and give a report on ROMP which is Rotary Outreach Myeloma Program. This program has been adopted by our club however COVID has impacted us, as it has many other clubs' ability to support it. December saw us catering for the La Trobe University Christmas break-up as well as a BBQ for the Stroke Associations Christmas break-up.

Some members attended the Eaglehawk Dahlia and Arts meeting to determine the future of the festival, there was great enthusiasm from all members of the community at the meeting for the festival to continue in some form, more meetings were scheduled.

Many thanks to Trevor Lock for his restoration of the wonderful Nativity statues that have been a tradition within the Eaglehawk community for many years.

As it was last year, the Nativity scene was assembled in Rita O'Brien's Rotary bookshop, allowing members of the public to appreciate its beauty and significance up close. The Town Hall was decorated with Christmas trees and lighting for the Christmas period.

The new year saw the cancellation of our Australia Day breakfast yet again due to the ever-increasing numbers of COVID cases. It was decided that we could not guarantee the safety of ourselves, our guests and the public, another disappointing cancellation as much work had gone into its preparation. Not all bad news as secondary College teacher, John Pearce, was bestowed the honour of Eaglehawk Citizen of the Year for 2022 recognising a 50-year teaching career in and outside the classroom. It was decided to present John his award at a suitable time in the future.

In early February we cooked a BBQ for the CFA competitions which is held at Weeroona Oval over both days of the weekend, followed by another Bunnings sausage sizzle a fortnight later.

March saw a busy weekend with the bookshop opening for extended hours on Friday, Saturday and Sunday in association with the Dahlia and Arts weekend. We also held a book stall featuring gardening books at the Dahlia competition which was held at the Senior Citizens building in Darling St. On the Sunday we had a presence at the Sunday Family Day to distribute book vouchers to be redeemed at our book shop.

April saw our inaugural community breakfast which was held at our clubrooms on April 1st. The community representation was not quite as broad as we would have hoped but it was a very positive start. Our Mayor, Councillor Andrea Metcalf and councillor Julie Priest were in attendance and the presentation of the Eaglehawk Citizen of the Year to John Pearce was a highlight.

Several members attended another meeting to determine what happens next for the Dahlia and arts festival, this was also a very positive meeting.

One of our club meetings was devoted to packing kits for foundation (preps) at our local schools. Alison has done an amazing job in collecting a range of educational support materials for distribution to primary schools at Eaglehawk, Eaglehawk North, Raywood, St Liborius, Cal Gully and Lightning Reef. The packing went very smoothly and they were delivered to schools for distribution for the start of the next term.

A good number of our members teamed together to provide a breakfast for golfers at Belvoir Park to raise funds for the Imagination Library program. The decision was taken for our club to meet all costs of the breakfast, this resulted in a very healthy outcome for the project.

Our club was invited to participate in the Rotary Fair which is held in Rosalind Park on Good Friday. A book stall was set up in the park, which was a great success. It was gratifying to see collaboration between our local clubs.

May saw us helping with the O'Keefe Challenge. Handing out drinks. We enjoyed an interclub visit to Castlemaine RC with eleven members taking the trip down the Calder. A most welcoming Club and a fun night. On Federal Election Day we conducted a Sausage Sizzle at Lightning Reef Primary School selling "Democratic Sausages". The end of May saw the second Community breakfast held at the historic Eaglehawk Fire Station, this was well attended, and the next 2 meeting venues were enthusiastically booked. The aim of the breakfast was achieved with collaboration of different groups taking place. A trivia night was held jointly with us and RC Bendigo South, also a wonderful success.

June brought on carparking at the Great Stupa where a light spectacular was held. It was atrocious weather however our team did a spectacular job. And after publication a meeting conducted by Empowering Eaglehawk will take the place of our usual meeting and a BBQ on the long weekend for the Central Victorian Chrysler Club and Midstate Mopars Bendigo is planned.

As you can see it has been a very busy year, add to the above a couple of COVID lockdowns, we as a club can be proud of our achievements. A huge thank you to the many helpers throughout the year especially to Mick Costello for organizing the many BBQs and sausage sizzles. Many thanks Mick.
