President John's Report

Our meeting was prefaced this week with the announcement of the resignation of PP Howard Osborne PHF. I had a long conversation with Howard earlier in the week and thoroughly understand and appreciate the reasons for his resignation - a decision not taken lightly given the more than thirty-five years service to our Club and to Rotary International. He leaves a huge legacy, in particular the ROSE program, which has impacted dramatically on the lives of a number of young people from Pattaya Orphanage and the Father Ray Foundation in Thailand. These young people have returned to Thailand and have thrived, personally and professionally, as a consequence of their experience with the program. Howard was also the driving force behind the skate park for Eaglehawk and dedicated more than four years to the project, from inception through to completion. He has also been extremely generous in providing professional advice on a pro bono basis within and beyond the club such is the nature of the man. On a personal note it marks the demise of the current incarnation of 'dumb and dumber' but I am sure that the many personal relationships developed over that past decades will continue. The Seven Women Story


Stephanie Woollard began Seven Women at age 22 after meeting seven disabled women working in a tin shed in Kathmandu.

Since 2006, Steph has built up the Seven Women team and launched an Australian arm for fundraising and a sales channel for our ever growing operation in Nepal.

12 years after her meeting in a tin shed that started it all, over 5,000 women have been educated, trained and employed by Seven Women.
