Our guest speaker last night was Tracey Moss, manager of Eaglehawk Community House and now also manager of Kangaroo Flat Community House. shared lots information of achievements and works in progress. A major consideration has been Covid. At one stage they were instructed to lock the gates and the 5 km rule impacted directly as she lives in Epsom. These challenges, however, were overcome. During the past two years there have been major renovations, including the redevelopment of the kitchen and the potential to expand meeting areas and these redevelopments are onaoina.

Thousands of meals have been distributed and hundreds of people are involved on a weekly basis. In the near future a community café will be opened which will invite more people and provide more training opportunities.

Tracey has been particularly successful in obtaining grants with \$200,000 being awarded recently. She was also proud of the nomination of ECH as a finalist in the Bendigo Business Excellence Awards as well as her personal nomination for the Regional Women's Business Awards. A further achievement is that ECH has recently employed their fourth welfare recipient – an acknowledgement of their previous voluntary contributions and now a pathway to ongoing employment.

Tracey was a very enthusiastic presenter and a wonderful asset in the broader Eaglehawk Community.


