Rotary On Stamps Fellowship

Rotary on Stamps is a group of stamp collectors and dealers with an interest in the philatelic material commemorating Rotary International, its districts, local clubs, and service projects around the world.

Stamp collecting is a popular hobby in many parts of the world and enjoyed by people of all ages. Stamps teach us a great deal about geography, history, culture, art, flora and fauna, design etc.

The difference between the terms 'stamp collecting' and 'philately' is that a stamp collector collects stamps in a random way, while a philatelist studies stamps and postal history, examines its design, looks for errors, flaws and variations in printing, the paper on which it is printed, its watermark and so on. It is possible for a philatelist not to collect any stamps, but rather study rare stamps housed in museums.

The history of Rotary is illustrated in stamps with its first stamp created in 1931 in honour of the Rotary International Convention in Vienna. Since that time there have been many stamps commemorating Rotary International Conventions and numerous others paying tribute to Rotary and its many domestic and worldwide humanitarian projects. In 1955, for Rotary's 50th Anniversary, 27 countries issued commemorative stamps. The American Topical Association was attracted by one of these stamps and formed a study unit, gathering Rotarians who shared an interest in stamps. From this exchange of ideas, the Rotary International Handbook on Stamps was published in 1957, filled with various stamps created by the group.

The Fellowship has a broad program of services available to Rotarians and all other interested collectors. Some of these include: The RoS Video Program, the Reference Library, Publications, the RoS Bulletin, which is published six times a year, the RoS Stamp Album and more.

Currently there are over 300 members worldwide of the Rotary on Stamps Fellowship and more than 2,000 specific Rotary stamps available to collect.

The Fellowship is always popular at the Rotary International Conventions, with numerous used stamps donated by RoS members available free so that others can add to their collections.

Like The Rotary on Pins Fellowship, the Rotary on Stamps Fellowship contributes greatly to the ongoing tangible history of Rotary.



Ted Ballieu on Being Flexible to Change

One of Rotary's challenges in increasing its membership is the remark: "I'm too busy to join Rotary!"

Ted Baillieu would disagree. He joined Rotary Glenferrie on the same day he was appointed Opposition Leader in Victoria in mid-2006. Perhaps he set the trend (now formalised) whereby clubs offer flexibility for busy people, being flexible around members visiting less frequently, but valuing their contributions on projects about which they are passionate.



While Ted's interest in Rotary started in the 1980s when he met a US exchange student who was giving tennis lessons on the side, it would be a few years before he eventually joined. And when he did, his responsibilities as a Member of Parliament (including becoming Premier of Victoria 2010-2013) did not hinder his Rotary involvement. He has been a guest speaker at many Victorian clubs in his capacity as Chair of the Victorian Government's ANZAC Centenary, as well as its Cladding Task Force, instigated following the 2014 Docklands fire. A regular contributor at Rotary Glenferrie's Farmers Market, Ted was also involved in drought relief for farmers. Ted laments the shortage of labourers for fruit and vegetable harvesting at the moment, and thinks Victoria could lose the stone fruit industry, which has been so important for the economy.

Does he have any membership tips?

"Rotary is powerful, but we need to be less shy," Ted says, thinking that Rotarians are often too self-deprecating. "Even though age is against us, it doesn't lessen the contribution Rotary makes."

"Prospective Rotary members are generally less interested in formalities such as stiff introductions, fine systems and things that were in good humour 30 years ago," he suggested. "We need to be more accepting of informality, as people have different working hours and different family arrangements."

Ted also feels that doing things collaboratively is more interesting. Events, such as the seven- club cooperation at Victoria Park in Kew on Australia Day are attractive. And, the Boroondara Cares Foundation is a wonderful example of club collaboration.

"We need to be creative and not do the same things all the time" he said. "We have an opportunity to be more pro-active in our communities, as well as work with local Government and State and Federal politicians."

"Ted says: "Rotary is an amazing organisation that has achieved great things. Don't take it for granted – be involved!"

Rotary International And The Gates Foundation - A Winning Partnership!

Rotary International and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation have a long-term fundraising partnership, which generates US\$150 million annually for polio eradication.

Club Protection/Risk Management – Like a good white wine during COVID, dry but essential!

A key responsibility of a Club Service Director is, in conjunction with the Club President, to protect the club from both strategic and operational risk.

Strategic risk is concerned with the survival of the club, and will involve developing defensive strategies by the President and Board of Directors. *Networker* published an article on strategic risk earlier this year.



Operational risk

Operational risk involves day-to-day club activities, including for example, working with children and vulnerable people, and perhaps dealing with abuse and bullying.

The key responsibility for operational risk is with the President and the Club Service Director. This article assumes that the club also has a Club Protection Officer, but if there is not one, the Club Service Director is responsible for compliance and protection tasks. Those clubs that do not have a Club Services Director will likely rely heavily on the Club Secretary in this area.

Working With Children and Vulnerable Adults

The Working with Children Act 2005 stipulates that it is an offence for a person to engage in child-related work without a Working with Children Check (WWCC).

Additionally, District 9800 has a policy that states Rotarians and others involved in Youth, District and Club Programs must hold a current Working With Children Check (which includes Vulnerable Adults) and complete an accompanying volunteer declaration form.

The Club Protection Officer must maintain a current list of all club members and partners' WWCCs (numbers and dates). New members should also be sent information on how to apply for a WWCC and be followed up to ensure this is actioned. The officer responsible also needs to follow up members whose WWCC status is unknown and those whose WWCC is due to expire / has expired to ensure it is renewed.

Education

It is important to educate club members about the Act and the reasons for strict compliance by providing an overview of compliance essentials at regular intervals (e.g. at changeover, club forums and/or the AGM) and annually in the club newsletter. Also, draw members' attention to the District Protection Policy regarding risk management relevant to club sponsored activities and ensure recommendations from the District policy are communicated to members, e.g. 5.3 "Transportation [of young people]".

Abuse and bullying

Abuse and bullying can include sexual and/or physical harassment and abuse, and emotional harassment. A recommended approach toward resolution is provided on the District website under the Governance tab.

Legislation and Policy Changes

The Club Protection Officer must keep up-to-date with any changes to Legislation or policies. If these changes impact on the members or require implementation, these need to be brought to the attention of the Board including a strategy for the required action.

Rotary insurance provides excellent free cover for all participants in Rotary events, whether they are Rotarians or not. Each club must prove to District annually that it has met compliance requirements and, if it has, will be issued with a Certificate of Currency, qualifying the club for insurance cover the ensuing year.

A District Legal Officer previously recommended preparing a register of individuals expected to participate in external club activities as a form of information in case of unexpected occurrences.

If your club needs advice in this important area, they should contact the District Secretary for assistance.

A refresher for planning for our meetings –

As a club we are fortunate to have the Mechanics facility for our meetings and club events. This also means that we need to plan and consider all those who help us to ensure our nights run smoothly and everyone is able to enjoy the experience. Additionally, we need to ensure we don't incur unnecessary costs. Some time ago the board decided



upon a process to ensure we maintained accurate numbers for catering purposes so here is a reminder for us all as to what we need to do –

- 1. If you are a member it is presumed that you will be attending the meeting and requiring a meal each week. This means that a meal will be ordered on your behalf and payment for such is required.
- 2. If you are NOT going to be able to attend the meeting then you will need to advise the President before 5.00pm on the Monday immediately prior to the meeting that you are an apology and will not be requiring a meal.
- 3. If you are bringing a guest then you need to advise the President as per 2. above.
- 4. A member is responsible to pay for any meal that has been ordered on your behalf.

It has been so long since we enjoyed the 'normal' meeting experience that we may be out of sorts for a while but if we all work together we can quickly get back into the groove.

New Check-In System For Businesses Across Victoria

Victorian business owners across the state can now access a free QR Code Service which will help make things easy as we continue our economic recovery.

The Victorian Government's QR Code Service can be used by businesses and venues to keep records of visitors to help us stay safe and stay open.

It's as simple as registering your business, downloading and printing a poster with the Victorian Government QR Code and displaying it prominently in your business. Businesses or venues with multiple outlets or spaces can register for multiple QR codes.

Visitors simply need to scan the QR code using their smartphone camera. For those with up-to-date smartphone software, a pop-up will appear asking for a first name and contact number.

For other users, they will be directed to download the Service Victoria mobile App from the Apple or Google Play app stores to complete the check-in. A unique six letter code entered on a web site will be on each QR code poster, for visitors to check-in also.

In Victoria, some businesses, workplaces and premises must request that each person who attends the premise for more than 15 minutes provide their first name and phone number.

For smaller hospitality venues with a density limit of one person for every two square metres – up to 50 customers – QR code record keeping is now mandatory. All businesses and venues are still required to have pen and paper record keeping on hand as an ultimate backup, if a visitor prefers to not use the QR code method.

All data collected through the Victorian Government QR code is securely stored, protecting customers from on selling of contact details. Data will be deleted after 28 days unless it is specifically requested by the Department of Health and Human Services for contact tracing purposes.

Have you downloaded the app yet?

'PRESIDENT-ELECT'S POWERFUL VISION TO GROW ROTARY'

Rotary's incoming President Shekhar Mehta has a powerful vision for Rotary membership - 1.3 million members by 1 July 2023. The President-Elect laid out his plans for membership growth to incoming District Governors at the recently held virtual International Assembly.



Members are Rotary's biggest asset according to President-Elect Shekhar. It is members who do the good, who raise funds for Rotary's Foundation and who have put Rotary 'this close' to eradicating polio. More members will mean that Rotary can serve more and change even more lives.

Underpinning his vision for growth is a straightforward strategy, 'Each One Bring One'. President-Elect Shekhar is asking Rotarians to recognise that growing Rotary is an individual responsibility - to share the gift of Rotary with one new person. He encourages members to focus on increasing diversity; to attract more women, more young people, more Rotaractors. He encourages clubs to make every new induction a celebration and to recognise the Rotarians who sponsor new members into the club.

Alongside his plan for 'Each One Bring One', President-Elect Shekhar is asking clubs to also focus on engaging and retaining members. He encourages clubs to hold tight to the innovations which have occurred during the pandemic and to adopt other new ideas to create strong and vibrant clubs. Engagement of new and existing members is just as important as attracting new members, according to President-Elect Shekhar.

The third plank in President-Elect Shekhar's membership plan is forming new and different types of clubs. Whilst there are still ample opportunities to create new conventional clubs — especially in underserved areas — there are even more opportunities to create new types of clubs, according to the President-Elect. These new club models, like virtual, hybrid, satellite, cause-based and passport clubs are an essential avenue for growth, making Rotary more accessible and inclusive. New types of clubs will also underpin the growth of Rotaract and the President-Elect urges Rotaractors to have similar plans.

Strong leadership is key to achieving the target of 1.3 million Rotarians according to President-Elect Shekhar. District Governors have a vital role to ensure that every Rotarian hears the call to share the gift of Rotary with one new member. District Membership Committees are also important. They should be led by a proven Membership champion and comprise three sub-committees: one each for attracting new members, retaining members and forming new and different club models.

President-Elect Shekhar is determined to Grow Rotary membership in the upcoming Rotary year. He is urging Rotarians and clubs to implement his vision for attracting new members, engaging new and existing members and forming new and different types of clubs. He is also confident of success. "Together we can and together we will" he says, "so that Rotarians can serve to change even more lives in future".
