Our guest speaker this week was **Geoff Hocking.** Geoff grew up in Golden Square and is a renowned author, artist, sculptor, historian, and a legendary storyteller. (As we found out). He lectured in graphic design at La Trobe Bendigo and has retired. He also has an association with our club as he was very close to his cousin, PP Howard Osborne.


Geoff spoke about the naming of Bendigo and the man that Bendigo was named after. Born18 Oct 1811 in Nottingham, England. Died 23 Aug 1880 at Beeston, England. William Abednego Thompson, also known as Bendigo Thompson, was an English bare-knuckle boxer who won the heavyweight championship of England from James Burke on 12 February 1839. He was obviously an extremely popular person and was not afraid to show off his pugilistic skills to anyone that annoyed him, he also really enjoyed a drink. These two skills led him into plenty of trouble with the law. Geoff told us how he eventually "found Jesus", but still would belt up any troublemakers.

Geoff has travelled to Nottingham and was amazed at the memorabilia that is in the town recognising Bendigo Thompson. His grave is in the centre of town and there is even a Bendigo hotel. He was given a wealth of printed information when he enquired after Bendigo at the Nottingham tourist information centre. Geoff told us that there was almost a tribute to Bendigo Thompson in Bendigo however it was blocked by an individual on two occasions. He is hopeful that someday a tribute will eventually be displayed in the town that was named after him.

A very informative and enjoyable night.



END POLIO NOW WALK

Rotary International Convention, 26 May 2023



Melbourne is renowned for its beautiful parks, gardens and walking trails. Join us on the afternoon of Friday 26 May to enjoy an easy walk from Federation Square, in the centre of the city, along beautiful St Kilda Road, past many city landmarks, to the Rotary Peace Park.

The 2.5 km (1.5 mile) Walk will enable us to raise awareness of Rotary's number one humanitarian priority – the global eradication of poliomyelitis. Don't forget to bring your red End Polio Now shirt. Photo opportunities will abound.

In the Peace Park you will find trees dedicated to more than 50 distinguished Rotarians, including many world presidents. The first tree in the park was planted by Paul Harris in 1935. Four Peace Bells will be unveiled in the park during the 2023 Rotary International Convention, and they will serve as the convention's legacy to Melbourne. This initiative is supported by the City of Melbourne, Rotary International and the Royal Botanic Gardens.

At the end of the walk, you will be able to explore the Peace Park, wander through the beautiful Royal Botanical Gardens or relax in one of the adjacent cafes and bars.

The walk is open to non-Rotarians, as well as Rotarians, and to people not registered for the convention as well as well as those who are registered. It will be a great way to meet some of our overseas visitors. However, pre-registration for the walk is a requirement.

Put the right thing in the right bin!

Follow this handy guide and recycle hard and soft plastics the right way.

Hard plastics can go in your recycle bin at home.

Soft plastics can be taken to the Eaglehawk Recycle Shop (at the front of the landfill), or the Strathfieldsaye, Goornong or Heathcote transfer stations.

Examples of soft plastics Soft plastics collection point

Biscuit packets (outer wrapper only) Bread bags (without the tie) Bubble wrap (A3-size pieces)

Cellophane (A3-size pieces)

Cereal box liners

Chip and cracker packets (silver lined)

Chocolate and snack bar wrappers Ice cream wrappers

Confectionery bags

Document sleeves (remove white reinforcement strip hole side)

Dry pet food bags Fresh produce bags

Frozen food bags Cling film (Glad, Coles and Woolworths Essentials brand only)

Green bags (woven polypropylene)

Large plastic sheets of furniture wrap (A3-size pieces)

Plastic meat packaging (rinsed/ dried)

Netting produce bags (metal clips removed)

Newspaper and magazine wrap

Pet food bags - chaff, horse, chicken etc. (plastic and woven polypropylene, but not woven nylon, A3-size pieces, shake free of most product)

Plastic postage satchels

Plastic carrier bags from all stores

Plastic film wrap from grocery items,

such as nappies or toilet paper

Plastic sachets

Potting mix and compost bags (plastic and woven polypropylene, but not woven nylon, A3-size pieces, shake free of most product)

Rice bags (plastic and woven polypropylene, A3-size pieces)

Snap lock bags and zip lock bags

Wine/water bladders (clear plastic only)

Pasta bags

Examples of hard plastics

Home recycle bin



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Plastic containers and tubs (margarine, peanut butter, sauce bottles etc.)

Plastic shampoo and conditioner bottles and other cosmetic bottles (moisturiser, hair products etc.)

Plastic cleaning product bottles, including lids (spray bottles etc.)

Any rigid plastic such as meat trays, biscuit trays or strawberry punnets

Examples of non-recyclable plastics General waste bin



Adhesive tape

Balloons (of any kind)

Bathroom/shower loofahs

Disposable coffee cups

Blow up pool, pool toys or beds (plastic or PVC)

Christmas trees and tinsel

Drinking straws

Foam or polystyrene of any kind

Laminated materials and overhead projector transparent sheets

Disposable facemasks

Rubber gloves

Tarpaulins

VHS tapes

Disposable nappies

Plastic takeaway containers and lids

Cat and dog food pouches

Squeeze pouches with lid on (e.g. yogurt/baby food)
