President John's Report

Although we had no dinner meeting this week there has still been a lot of Rotary activity. On Wednesday evening we had seven members travel to the Moama Bowling Club to support the cluster Foundation Dinner. It was a great venue and the dinner was most enjoyable.

District Foundation Chair, PDG Murray Verso, set the scene with an update of Foundation activities locally and internationally. While we have been winning with the End Polio campaign there has been something of a resurgence, especially in Afghanistan and Pakistan, largely as a consequence of political tensions. From twenty two last year the cases reported this year are now in excess of one hundred and so there is still much to be done. The amazing contribution of the Gates Foundation was well and deservedly acknowledged.





Guest Speaker, Brian Martin, from the Rotary Club of Box Hill Central gave an inspiring address. His club was heavily involved in operation Cleft in Bangladesh, and the results achieved have been remarkable. It was gratifying to learn of the clubs in our cluster that have made significant contributions to that program. He then

explained the Toilet Warrior program in India being championed by his colleague, Mark

Balla. The lack of toilet facilities in schools, especially secondary schools, impacts directly on access to educational opportunities, especially for girls, and his Club has embarked on an ambitious program to address that challenge. One complaint from boys is that it was now more difficult to access drinking fountains as the girls were now accessing them. This was not the case when they had no access to toilet facilities.



On the local front the Christmas Raffle is well underway and the roster is almost full but there are still some vacancies, especially on Saturdays. Leon McGlashan (and Barb) are doing a wonderful job in making it a very significant fundraiser for our Club. We are now at Long Gully IGA and have a barbecue from 11:00 am on Saturday and extra help is always appreciated. We have another one in two weeks at Eaglehawk IGA.

On Sunday we are erecting the Nativity Scene at the Eaglehawk Town Hall from 9:00 am and extra help is always appreciated. Trevor Lock has been in and made sure that it should be a relatively seamless process. On Monday there is an information session being hosted by the Bendigo Maubisse Friendship Committee in the Reception Room at the CoGB at 5:30. Rotary has a strong association with the Committee and interested people are most welcome to attend.

Next Wednesday we have the draw for the Great Grange Raffle. Sales are down on last year (which means that winning chances are better) and I will have syndicate sheets available for those who would like to be involved. Thank you to all who have already had a go. The end of November is also the cut off for early bird registrations for the District Conference in Bendigo. RLI—What's in a name?

Over the last 3 Sundays, Past District Governor Julie Mason assisted by District Governor Nominee Dale Hoy and PP Lesley McCarthy have presented the RLI program to over 40 participants.

Julie and Lesley have often commented that RLI should really be called the Rotary Learning program rather than Rotary Leadership Institute, as it is not just about leadership and preparing Rotarians to lead their clubs, but for anyone and everyone to learn more about Rotary.

This month, for the first time we welcomed Rotaractors from both Melbourne City and Gateway Rotaract as well as Rotarians from District 9810 to the Metro sessions. The diversity and mixture of not only age and gender but of cultural backgrounds, experiences and years in Rotary made for intense and valuable conversations during the 2 days.

This focus on learning was reinforced last Sunday when the program was presented in Bendigo to rural participants from the Bendigo clubs, Echuca and Rochester; and comments were made that the program had previously been seen as only for newer members.

The program of RLI which consists of 4 separate sections covers material

relevant to new members, experienced members, was so much more relevant and valuable than previously experienced. It covers:

 Growing and strengthening clubs: the history of Rotary; forward thinking, healthy, vibrant and innovative clubs and reviewing your club.

Members, teams and leaders: the structure of Rotary, leaders, leadership and succession planning; teams, and you as a leader.

 Focussing and increasing humanitarian service: the Rotary Foundation, applying for grants, planning and implementing successful projects.

 Enhancing Public Image and awareness focusses on sharing, celebrating and promoting what we do; Image and Brand, telling our stories.

Participants come away with workbooks containing a wealth of information, resources and weblinks for further research and information as well as a network of Rotarians to continue working with.

PP George Waters from the Rotary Club of Bendigo Sandhurst has communicated to us that he feels the program has matured to one of respecting our intellect and encompassing quite sophisticated notions from the world's experts.

Kaye Lehmann from Bendigo so impressed the attendees with her response to why Rotary? That a video was taken of her articulating this belief and has been shared on the District Facebook page.
