Rochester Flood Relief

AFTERNOON MY CHICKENS. I'VE GOT A PICTURE BOOK STORY FOR YOU We are amazed with the generosity of people who want to donate furniture/clothes etc. BUT it is hard for those outside of Rochester to comprehend the scale of what has occurred.







This is a house in Rochy (photos obtained with permission because it is my house). I consider myself lucky in some ways, but this is the reason we cannot take items. **There is just NO STORAGE.**

No floor coverings - no kitchens - no wardrobes - no storage - no lounge room to put furniture in. For 90% of the Rochy residents this is their house - a shell. It is now a waiting game for insurance/money tree/trades, etc

So we VERY much appreciate the offers but as you can see, some things are a long way away.

Also, as you can see by the last photo of Mount Rochy that is the entire possessions of a lot of households and it is not just one or two houses that have had to do this.

Estimates are around 90% of Rochy was inundated so those remaining 10% are storing a bloody lot of goods for others too.

Thank you for understanding. The best you can do at a time like this is donate to the Rochester Community House fund which is 100% legit and all the money stays in Rochester, for Rochester.

A terrible situation for the residents to be living with. Rotary is not required to cook BBQs at this stage and the Goldfields cluster is still meeting via zoom on a regular basis, stay tuned to find out how we may be able to assist in the future.

Alison reported that we now have 13 people representing Eaglehawk at the Foundation dinner which is to be held in a fortnight. Thanks go to Alison for having a ring around as our numbers were very low prior.

John Jones reported that the Mountain Bike Club that we were to cater for, want to give us a donation, this will be greatly appreciated.

Eric reported that due to the weather this year, the fire season is expected to be later than usual. Eric suggested that the brigade could meet at the Mechanics for some training followed by a trial BBQ as discussed, some time ago. This was



accepted by the meeting; a suitable date is to be picked.

For the past 28 years my private practice has provided services to clients who need additional help to manage life at home. Many are receiving government owner, I often take calls from Home Care Packages, which enable them to access home modifications and a range of equipment. The value of occupational therapy is in providing a home assessment. The privilege of working with clients in their own home is invaluable. Their goals and aspirations are the key to our partnership.

Maintaining independence using appropriate or adapted equipment can encourage a person to feel confident and safer on a daily basis. Interventions to promote safe access both university days still. They inside and outdoors can help to prevent injuries from falls or accidents. There are a multitude of recommendations that can be the result of an occupational therapy home assessment. All are practical and focused on the client achieving their personal goals.

Occupational Therapy has provided me with 27 years of working with amazing people in many parts of the world. As a local practice people who "just need an OT to help".

Today's call was from a family member in need of OT support for a person living with Huntington's Disease in regional Victoria. Yesterday's call was from a 93-year-old Gold Card Veteran in Shepparton who needs an OT to assess her for a lift chair.

This year is a timely reminder to all, that "occupation" is what we do with our time, and across the lifespan this can mean many things.

I have OT friends from work in paediatrics, animal therapy and yoga. They are award winners, experts in their areas and they are mums, daughters, sisters and friends

Hopefully they will stop for a moment during OT week and reflect on what this career means to them.

In the past four years, I have gained a wealth of knowledge, professional capabilities and have been provided with many exciting opportunities to make the most of my tertiary education.




The Melbourne Convention – May 2023.
