Sharon had the opportunity to be part of the Australian/New Zealand Fire Fighter contingent that was deployed to Canada earlier this year, a privilege and an experience that you would not be likely to forget.

Sharon was deployed to Incident Management as opposed to being on the Fire Line.



The Victorian team (pictured above – Sharon on the left) departed Melbourne Tullamarine Airport on Saturday (20 July) along with representatives from Forest Fire Management Victoria.



They were briefed, along with other Australian crews in Sydney on the Saturday afternoon before travelling onto British Columbia and Alberta on the Sunday.

They formed part of the Australian and New Zealand support team who were being deployed to help tackle the significant bushfires that had been burning for the last few weeks in western Canada, with the fire prone country already experiencing more than 3200 this year.

On arrival Sharon had introductory briefing on an overview of the current fire situation. They were also warned about animals, essentially told "Furies are not friendly"



As part of her role Sharon was allocated a truck – pictured left, a Ford F350 – for her use. She commented that she didn't even reach the height of the rear vision wing mirror it was so big. A couple of issues she had to quickly overcome were driving on the wrong side of the road while sitting on the wrong side of the vehicle.

Leaving Edmonton, she had to drive over 700 km to Highlevel where she was to be stationed. Fortunately, she was in a convoy of vehicles which helped with her initial driving in Canada.

On arrival there was a lot of smoke from the 38 fires (13 out of control, 12 being held and 13 under control). The temperature was around 24° C – considered to be quite hot. Some of the fires were carry over fires from last year, continuing to burn in peat over winter even though buried under snow.

Sharon stayed in a facility not unlike a caravan park (her husband joked he was now married to trailer trash). She was assigned to a logistics team with 3 people, two of whom left on sick leave the very next day. They had been on continuous duty since March and were exhausted. Initially she felt she struggled with the method of operation and felt uncomfortable in her role, but she soon came to grips with her required duties. She remains in contact and friends with her Canadian leader.

In the Semo complex fire she worked with many different organisations, including Mexican, Costa Rican and South African teams as well as various provincial teams. A big thing amongst the firefighters is the trading of patches with other firefighters from various jurisdictions.

The equipment used to fight and control the fires includes helicopters, bulldozers, hagglands, arial tankers and excavators. However no typically Australian fire tankers are used in the fight. Fire hoses here might be 80-90 metres long before being coupled together, while in this region the
