RAISE FOR ROTARY

Dear Gary,

Because you're a leader in Rotary, we want you to be among the first to know that our peer-topeer fundraising platform, Raise for Rotary, is now accepting goals and donations in Australian dollars (AUD). This tool launched in July 2020 and allows people to easily create fundraisers that support The Rotary Foundation. Over the past year, individuals have used Raise for Rotary to create more than **800** fundraisers, which have collected a total of more than **\$400,000**.

Some benefits of the platform include:

Empowering Rotary members

Creative members have been using various external platforms to raise money for The Rotary Foundation, but those have limitations. Raise for Rotary is a custom-branded platform that's integrated with our existing online giving system. This makes it easier to create a fundraiser that supports specific Rotary causes, such as the areas of focus, fighting polio, or disaster response, and it expands our reach on social media.

Giving donors recognition credit

External platforms make it difficult for us to extend Rotary giving credit, which can lead to frustration and confusion for donors. People who give through Raise for Rotary using the email address they use for other Rotary functions, such as their My Rotary account, will receive Rotary giving credit and recognition.

Minimizing fees to do more good

External fundraising platforms all have their own fee structures, rules, and guidelines. By creating our own platform, we can process gifts more efficiently and accurately. And that means more of the funds donated go directly toward Doing Good in the World.

<u>Raise for Rotary</u> is being released in several phases. This second phase, in English, can accept fundraising goals and donations in Australian dollars, U.S. dollars, and Canadian dollars. More languages and currencies will be added in later updates.

KPMG & Rotary join forces creating Volunteering opportunities



KPMG, as part of its "Corporate Citizenship" pledge, is encouraging its staff in Australia to do voluntary work in furthering the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals. And with just two weeks' notice, volunteering opportunities have been created.

The opportunity for Rotary District 9800 and KPMG to work together was initiated by new Rotary Carlton member, RYLA graduate and management consultant at KPMG, **Danielle Schutte** and supported and promoted by President (and PDG) Keith Ryall and members Casey Tan and Melissa McIntosh.

With only two weeks' notice, members of the District Leadership Team and Rotarians from 20 clubs/joint projects have worked together to develop specific volunteer opportunities.

KPMG's Melbourne Office anticipates that around 1,000 of its 2,500 staff would volunteer a day in October 2021, in both skilled (strategic project advice) and unskilled services (warehouse and packing type volunteer opportunities). A few examples of unskilled and skilled volunteer opportunities promoted by clubs to the KPMG volunteering program include:



Rotary Inner Melbourne Emergency Relief Network (RIMERN)

- Unskilled hands-on volunteering opportunities at its warehouse receiving, sorting, cataloguing, repacking and dispatching of recycled goods received.
- Skilled Volunteering: assisting RIMERN create a business plan including identification of available grants to fund a manager, operational costs and advice on grant applications.

Rotary Castlemaine Truck Show

A major 33-year-old high profile project employing 100 plus volunteers representing a significant public image and fund raiser for the club.

Skilled Volunteering: during COVID undertake a strategic review of the Truck Show, how to improve operational
efficiencies for the benefit of patrons and volunteers.

Rotary Canterbury (and other clubs) FORaMEAL

- Unskilled volunteering: food packing to help feed 15,000 to 20,000 hungry and starving people in 2 and 3 hour volunteer sessions in a highly impactful FORaMEAL project http://forameal.org.
- Skilled Volunteering: strategic advice for the project in marketing, promotion and fund raising

Rotary Balwyn (and other clubs) Camberwell Sunday Market

Camberwell Sunday Market "CSM" has raised/granted almost \$20 Million over the past 45 years. It is becoming increasingly difficult to operate due to declining volunteers, limited branding, marketing, or membership strategies.

 Skilled Volunteering: brainstorm a Public Image Strategy Workshop with Executives of the Rotary Camberwell Sunday Market (CSM), Rotary Balwyn and District 9800 focused on a Public Image Campaign Strategy for the CSM that would attract potential members to Rotary Balwyn and other clubs in Boroondara.

Discussions are planned with KPMG to further develop the partnership, exploring mentoring, and strategic planning for other Rotary projects as well as the firm's pro bono services to the not-for-profit sector.

Taliban have children too



With the Taliban taking control of Afghanistan, many Rotarians are asking what implications this has for the End Polio campaign.

The situation in Afghanistan has escalated since the last Zoom meeting of Rotary International END POLIO NOW Coordinators held early in August, however several messages with great impact were delivered by our senior leaders during that meeting.

Many Rotarians have expressed concern about the future of our Polio Eradication Initiative – when ultimate success is so close.

However, RI Past President and 2021/22 Chair of The Rotary Foundation, John Germ, told the meeting Rotary's team has been working with the Taliban for some time and we need to remember 'the Taliban have children too – and want them protected against Polio'.

'We acknowledge the tragedy of the situation in Afghanistan, but there have always been obstacles in the way that have been overcome," he said.



'We have only one wild virus case in Afghanistan and Pakistan for the past eight months – and very little trace is being found in environmental samples. We need to work with all elements of leadership in that country and the anti government element has indicated a willingness to work with us,' he said.

'Historically, the Taliban have never been against Polio vaccination. They are wary of people involved in delivering the vaccines but they want to target the end of Polio and are very well organised.'



Further, following dramatic events this week, Mike McGovern updated last week's comments ...

In 2021, despite internal conflicts and a global pandemic, Afghanistan is seeing unprecedently low transmission of wild Polio, with just one case reported this year. Not only has the country seen a drastic reduction in cases of wild Polio, but Polio surveillance data also confirms this progress and significantly less virus is being detected in the environment.

'As conflict in Afghanistan quickly evolves, we must advocate for the children of Afghanistan. The Polio program must work and communicate with all stakeholders involved to ensure that Polio immunisation remains a priority to ensure the gains we have made against Polio do not diminish.

'We look forward to working with our Polio eradication partners and the Afghani people to completely eradicate Polio,' he concluded.
