YOUTH EXCHANGE STUDENT







The last 18 months has seen our Student Exchange Program well underway. Our first Outbound Student, Kellie Milner, returned in January of this year after a very successful 12 months exchange in Sweden. Kellie stayed with 3 host families while in the North of Sweden and found the culture and weather a stark contrast to Australia. Kellie has now settled back into school life at St. Mary's and is doing Year 11. She is already talking of going back "home" to Sweden as soon as she saves the plane fare.

In July of last year a young Swedish girl , Emma, was met at the airport by 3 Numurkahites. What a contrast this young girl had. She came from the South of Sweden , her school was huge, — about 2000 students — , and had just left Midsummer to come to our winter.

The O"Brien family hosted Emma through the first three months of her exchange and witnessed her settling into school life and many friendships. School was so different to what she had been used to. From the O'Brien's to the Milner's with a short stay with the O'Callaghan's, then onto the Brennan's for 4 months and then back to the Milner's. Town life and country life being experienced. Emma has seen more of our country than most Australian's, having been on the Rotary trip to Broken Hill, Port Macquarie, Gold Coast, right along the Victorian coast and then across the Mountains. She has experienced our snow fields and also our 40 plus heat in summer. I would say that she has had a great stay in Oz.

In January this year, our second Outbound student, Loretta Florence, left for Denmark. It is hard to imagine that Loretta is already half way through her exchange. Loretta experienced a few minor hiccups for the first few weeks, mainly language problems, but is totally enjoying her experience. She has just returned from the Euro-Tour which takes in several countries. Unfortunately Loretta had her hand luggage stolen, the ever trusting Aussie. By all reports everything is OK now.

Earlier this year we had word that a young 16 y.o. boy from Denmark would be arriving this August to spend 12 months with us. His name is Henrik Corfitsen and we have had contact with him over the last 3 months. He is looking forward to the obvious cultural differences, he has a passion for computers and hates guinea pigs! I am still after a Host Family for Henrik. If anyone can help out, it would be greatly appreciated.

We have completed interviews for a student to go on exchange January 2000. I must add that it was very disappointing that not one enquiry came from Numurkah Secondary College. The interview Panel was very impressed with the high standard of the 3 applicants. It was an extremely difficult job with the standards that these girls set themselves.

The successful candidate was a 17 y.o. girl , Christine Barton. Christine lives between Waaia and Nathalia and attends Nathalia Secondary College. The Next stage for Christine is at District level at Dookie in a couple of weeks. Congratulations Christine and thankyou Lou, Pat, and Lorraine for their time interviewing. So as you can see our exchange program in full swing, with either a student coming or going every 6 months. the foresight of Past President Terry Brennan must be commended for getting this program up and running after a very long absence. Everyone who has had contact with our Outbound or Inbound student's will agree that we have a fine bunch of young people in our midst.

I feel that our District prepares our students very well for their trip oversea's, it is hoped that in the near future other countries / districts follow suit.

We have taken 2 groups of oversea's students to a sheep station North of Broken Hill and have found numerous pluses for continuing such trips. The students and chaperones have all gained a lot out of this experience and enjoy a special bond between themselves. With the support of our Club, it is hoped that this kind of experience can continue in the future.

We held an enjoyable day at Yarrwonga with these students and their host families. Water skiing, B.B.Q, and lots of fun was had by all. Thanks to Alby and his Family for the use of their Ski-boat, windsufer etc.



The 19th Annual Art & Craft Exhibition by the Rotary Club of Numurkah was held from 5th to 8th March. And proved once again to be a very successful event.





Thanks must go to GAIL BIDDENBACH from the College for her organisation


TYPO Station
