# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present this report to the Rotary Club of Numurkah as President for the year 2000-2001. I believe the year has proved to be challenging and exciting, and the success has been due to the cooperation of the Board of Directors, and the generous assistance of the club members.

During 2000-2001, membership of the Rotary Club was extended by the induction of the first lady Rotarians, June Hewson and Janene Taylor, as well as the induction of Chris Curtis. We were, however, saddened by the passing of PP Harold Lukies, the resignations of both Geoff Durham and Chris Curtis due to business commitments, and the (temporary) absence of Frank Thomas. (My sincere thanks and appreciation to Phil Meagher and Allen Canobie for taking up the reins as Secretary and Treasurer following the unavailability of Geoff and Frank.) Through the diligent efforts of Peter Dealy and Steve O'Callaghan, the Club was given the opportunity to welcome a range of guest speakers and club activities, as well as the contributions by members to the club bulletin. Thanks in particular to Andrew Seiter for the continued high standard and interest level of the bulletin – and to Don and Ernest on the occasions when the editor was overseas/snowed under with work.

The Rotary Club has maintained a busy profile in the local community with both new initiatives and continuing activities. Major projects have included:

- The "Signature Bricks and Fragrance Garden" is now a prominent attraction in the town and an enduring legacy for future generations, thanks to the extensive work of Sieg Seiter in particular with over \$50,000 of sales to his credit, with the cooperation of Sono, Norm and Steve Grandell, and the assistance of club members to ensure the approval, construction and completion of the work. Well done to all concerned.
- The playground in the Apex Park has been completed with the cooperation of a number of groups and organisations, and is an extremely popular facility for families and visitors. Work has included the relocation of vintage tractors and playground equipment, the assembly of the "activities jigsaw" and the provision of softfill and shade cloth. Again, thanks to the Rotary members involved for their generous efforts and persistance, and in particular to Phil Meagher and Steve O'Callaghan for steering the project.
- In December 2000 the time capsule buried by the Rotary Club in 1975 was raised with all contents in excellent condition and many memories were renewed. Thanks to the faith of the club led by Lindsay Thornton in 1975, and the opportunity for the club of 2000-2001 to carry on the tradition. Due to the increased contributions (and the excellent work of June and Janene), two capsules are now buried in the same site, to be raised in 2025.

Other events within the community deserve mention and appreciation, and include:

- The continuation and success of the Art and Craft Show, with a dedicated and hard working committee
- The Rotary Debutante Ball, led by Geoff Holmes and Janene Taylor
- Continuation of the MS Raffle, thanks particularly to the energy of Kel Sidebottom
- Upgrading of the Rotary Walking Track, coordinated by Alby Barton as one of many service projects

- Provision of the Rotary BBQ at community events, including Pioneer Lodge Fete, Australia Day celebrations, Scouts, Safety Awareness
- Maintenance of the Rotary Park BBQ, thanks to Bill and June Hewson
- Safety Awareness, in cooperation with the Victoria Police and the assistance of Terry Brennan and Buzzy Davis
- The sponsorship of new Probus Clubs at Nathalia and Finley. Well done, Keith.

The Rotary Club has continued to encourage the development of youth, and to provide opportunities and support. This includes the funding of scholarships and awards, transport to the Careers Expo, assistance to attend the Portsea camp, participation at Summer Schools and at leadership training, and the continuation of the "Work 2001" program initiated by Steve O'Callaghan in 2000. We are particularly pleased with the success of Amy Richardson in her selection to attend training in Canada as part of the Siemens program. Thank you to the members who have facilitated these programs.

Special mention must be made of the Rotary Youth Exchange program, and of the work by Phil Seager and Chris and Lorraine Milner. The success of the visit by Colin Murphy from Whidbey, Washington has been due largely to their efforts and the cooperation of hosting families, and the club extends sincere thanks. We have appreciated Colin during his time with us, and wish him every success. Thanks to Chris and Lorraine for their chaperoning of the "Rock to Reef" group, and their commitment to the youth exchange program.

The "Moira Kelly" project has been a major focus at District and Club level, and attracted enormous interest and support. Thanks to the ladies for a most successful funding raising film night which, together with the clearing sale at Milners, has raised over \$1200. Thanks also to Chris for the many hours freely given at the Moira Kelly Farm, and the members able to participate in the working bees.

A highlight of this year as President has been the opportunity to associate with other service clubs, and to join in the fellowship as part of the community service. I look forward to the continuation of the opportunity in the future.

If I have been successful as President, it is because I have had the support of my wife Barbara, the cooperation and collective experience of the Board, and the tolerance and understanding of the members and their wives/partners. There have been times when problems and distractions have occurred, and I have appreciated the thoughtful advice and assistance of others in keeping the bigger picture in focus. I have appreciated the willingness of the Board to take on the challenges and to resolve issues according to the ideals of Rotary. My sincere thanks to all concerned. In particular, I have lent heavily on the work of Secretary Phil Meagher who, like Allen Canobie, stepped into the breach at short notice, and has carried out his role capably and objectively. Phil has been a major player in many of the projects and activities, and has always provided his personal support to me as President. Thanks Phil, it has been greatly appreciated.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the club for the opportunity to serve as president. It has been an honour and a privilege, and I have learnt a great deal from the experience. I wish President Elect Steve O'Callaghan and his team every success for the year 2001-2002.

## YOUTH SERVICE

Some youth projects were included in the portfolio responsibilities of other service directors and consequently will be recorded in their reports.

The following activities were directed to the youth of Numurkah and district:

### A. NATIONAL YOUTH SCIENCE FORUM

Amie Richardson, a Year 11 student (2000) at Numurkah Secondary College was one of fourteen selected from Rotary District 9790. The forum was held over 2 weeks in Canberra during January 2001. Subsequent to the forum, Amie was selected to attend an international science conference in Canada and was also invited to be a counsellor at next year's science forum. She delighted the club with her polished address at a dinner meeting immediately after her Canberra experience.

Rotarians Steve O'Callaghan and Ernest Jones attended the orientation night for Amie at Latrobe University and enjoyed the presentation of information relating to the forum.

The club has received 4 applications from secondary students for the 2001 forum with the club selection process to be completed mid June.

### B. THE SIEMENS SCIENCE EXPERIENCE

Three students were involved in this program. Luke Hansen and Stephanie Simkin attended Monash University, and Lauren Wilson was involved at Australian National University.

### C. PORTSEA CAMP

Our exchange student, Colin Murphy attended as a counsellor together with thirteen students from Numurkah coordinated by our club (12-19 January). The cost of \$180 per student covered transport and camp accommodation.

### D. SCHOLARSHIPS

Two scholarships (\$125) recognising academic excellence were awarded to Year 11 students at Numurkah S C. The recipients were Fiona Kayess and Blake Orr.

### E. CAREERS EXPO - DOOKIE COLLEGE

The club gave financial support towards transport costs for students of Numurkah Secondary College to attend the career's day at Dookie College.

#### F. YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM - TAFE

Three students were funded (\$75 each) to attend the Youth Leadership Training Program at TAFE

### G. CITY/COUNTRY PARTNERSHIP EXCHANGE PROGRAM

The proposal was for a city club to host some year 10 students to allow country students the opportunity for work experience with businesses and organisations not normally available in country areas. Despite a favourable response from Numurkah S C and a promising initial response from the designated club, unfortunately the scheme did not proceed as the specific placements could not be negotiated by the host club.

### H. PRIMARY STUDENT AWARDS

The club donated \$60 awards in the form of a book/school requisite voucher to a senior student in each of ten primary schools in Numurkah and district. The type of award was chosen by the school and it could cover one of the following - citizenship, sporting achievement, academic achievement or special effort.

### I. OTHER PROJECTS

The response to a number of Rotary projects that were advertised or promoted to public and /or schools was disappointing eg.

Ian Murphy Memorial Debating Competition - no team entered (and no team for 2001/2)

Rotary Murray Darling Schools of Freshwater Research - no student candidate Rotary Youth Leadership Award Seminar - no applicant 2001 RYPEN Seminar (Lake Nillahcootie Camp)- no student applicants

The club recognised the needs of youth in various ways throughout the year and considerable club energy continues to be directed to issues and matters relevant to young people. Dinner meeting speakers addressed youth issues, and other club directors were responsible for special youth oriented programs.

One particular innovative program was WORK 2000 (currently WORK 2001). Congratulations to Rotarian Steve O'Callaghan on the success of this project in which 5 secondary students completed a work experience program over a thirty week period (2000). A feature of the program was that each student could trial 3-4 work experience options in Numurkah. The presentation of certificates to the successful students at a dinner meeting was a fitting culmination to the project.
