PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 2007-2008 ROTARY YEAR

This year has been very challenging due to Rotary International asking Rotary Clubs to "Take your Club to the next level - Implement The Club Leadership Plan." This is a plan aimed at strengthening Clubs, simplifying the committee structure, developing long range plans which should involve ALL club members. The Club Leadership Plan is, I believe, compulsory from the year 2008-2009. I endeavoured to lead us into this new concept, which has not been readily accepted by some members in a lot of clubs including our own, people do not like change, but change is inevitable and is part of each and everyone's daily life. I freely admit change is not always better, but whether we like it or not, in most instances it does turn out to be an improvement. So I would like to thank one and all for your patience and sufferance in this matter, and I know we will succeed and our Club will be better for it.

Due to the serious drought conditions in our area another unusual happening has taken place in the last nine months which involves our Rotary Club, it is called Boroondara Cares – Moira Cares. Our club has been given the interactive task of "Church to Church" in this venture. Details of all of the Churches in our area have been forwarded to our counterpart club in Boroondara our Sister Club being Kew on Yarra. A detailed Annual Report can be found at the end of my report.



INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

Through our International Director who chooses at random, a rotary club from somewhere in the world and enlightens us as to club numbers, location, weather patterns and other interesting snippets of information re same, we continue to toast these clubs. One of our members then sends information about our club via post to the club we toasted. Some very informative replies have been received by us and they in turn usually toast our club.

Unfortunately due to unforeseen circumstances beyond our control the Fiji Urban Water Supply project has had to be cancelled.

We are assisting a young 20 year old man named Michael from a remote village in Irian Jaya (West Papua/Indonesia) who is training as a nurse with the intention of working in his isolated home area in the Eastern Highlands of Irian Jaya. At this stage we have paid for twelve months of his nursing education.



VOCATIONAL SERVICE

Overseas Medical students from Melbourne University as part of their rural work training at our local hospital visited the club telling us of their progress so far, and their intentions when they finish their course.

A most enjoyable evening meal was held at the 9 Mile Café at Wunghu where we found out how much the McGorlick Family have been able to diversify their lives through the beginnings of their Locheilan Cheeses business.

Boroondara Cares -- Moira Cares.

'Boroondara Cares – Moira Cares' is possibly one of the most innovative, exciting and beneficial programs undertaken by all four Rotary Clubs within the Moira Shire.

'Boroondara Cares—Moira Cares' is a Rotary-led community partnership between the City of Boroondara and the Shire of Moira working together.

In September 2007 the Mayor of Boroondara, Cr Phillip Healy, contacted Cr Frank Malcolm, Mayor of Moira Shire, and together they agreed, "something must be done to support our drought challenged shire".

Led by the Rotary Club of Camberwell, the Rotary Clubs of Boroondara and Moira combined very quickly to create this unique partnership between two municipalities and twelve Rotary Clubs.

Since the first community event held at Katunga in early October last year and the recent community trotting fun day held at the Cobram Harness Club, the following are some of the projects funded and delivered by 'Boroondara Cares' with strong support from the Rotary Clubs of Nathalia, Yarrawonga, Numurkah and Cobram (Moira Cares): -

- Two tonnes of rice per month to Moira Foodshare (due to the world shortage of rice other staple foods are being substituted)
- 2000 Christmas cakes and puddings delivered to farming families in Moira in December 2007
- 1000 Christmas presents for children in Moira-- Christmas 2007
- Tickets for children to Kooyong Tennis Classic –December 2007
- Financing children's bus trip to visit Melbourne Zoo January 2008
- Return visit to Moira and farm tours --- February 2008
- Sponsorship of the Burramine Gift—March 2008
- Invite Moira Shire local producers to attend the Glenferrie Farmers' Market March, May and June. The Cobram Secondary College Band has been invited to play at the June market.
- Supply equipment for a teenager who qualified as a Football Goal umpire.
- Invite and home host students to the recent address by Nobel Prize winner Professor Peter Doherty.
- Fund over 40 girls' netball registration fees.
- One hundred tickets to the Hawthorn-North Melbourne AFL match at the MCG on June 21 for a fathers' and sons' day with VIP treatment and transport.
- Donation to the Strathmerton Skate Park Funding Appeal

Projects being developed include: -

- Community trotting event to be held annually
- 40 children to attend Portsea Holiday Camp in September
- Youth mentoring program supported by Victoria University
- Combined Rotary meeting including Boroondara Rotary Clubs in August.
- Golf lessons by leading professionals with associated events.
- Expand the School-to-School, and Church-to-Church links.

As chairman of 'Moira Cares' I would like to thank all Club Presidents for the excellent work they have done in developing this project so quickly despite the additional workload on club members.

Congratulations to all club members who have participated where possible, and to the staff of Moira Shire, particularly Treena Henderson and Sally Rice who have given us all magnificent support and energy in driving many of the projects.

While 'Boroondara Cares – Moira Cares' has been a product of this prolonged drought, it has delivered great benefits to our communities, and has engendered the spirit and ideals of Rotary within the twelve participating clubs and the officers of the two municipalities.

The programs that have been delivered and those that are evolving, together with the great fellowship and friendships that have been developed, will ensure this project will continue well after the drought has passed.

It has been a privilege to be part of this wonderful project as a Rotarian and a Moira Shire Councillor.

Community Service 2007-2008

During the Rotary Year 2007-2008, the Community Service Committee focused on a series of projects as well as continuing to use the mobile public relations unit cleverly disguised as a splendid (and much envied) barbeque trailer.

Some projects were short term such as the offer to install house numbers for members of the local community – which in fact had no requests despite the publicity; and to provide club members with hands-on experience in the use of fire extinguishers – many thanks to the Numurkah CFA for their cooperation.

The mobile barbeque again proved indispensable as a service to the community and a source of revenue where this was applicable. Functions and events included the Numurkah Primary School Twilight Fete, "A Night with the Stars" (Katunga), Seniors Expo, Australia Day Breakfast, Pancake Day for the Uniting Church, 4WD trip, Show Us Your Wheels Community Day, Dedication of the new SES shed, Les Lawrence Shield competition against Nathalia Rotary Club (and another win), the combined BBQ with Numurkah Lions International, and launching of the new canopy (held at Rotary Park). The assistance of Rotarians and their partners – often at short notice – has been greatly appreciated, with particular thanks to Terry Brennan and Pat Fitzpatrick for their skills in getting the job done.

The club project to set up a Men's Shed in Numurkah originated from the success of similar sheds in providing men with activities, information and fellowship, and proven benefits in mental and physical health and well-being. The board endorsed the project and the initial meeting of key community stakeholders indicated very high support – which was further evidenced in a comprehensive community survey. The project has been remarkably successful to date, with donations of over \$1500 and a strong level of interest by individuals, community groups, the Moira Healthcare Alliance, the Community Health Centre, and the Moira Shire. Contracts are now in preparation for the purchase of a Knox Street site – with shed – by the Moira Healthcare Alliance, and the next phase of refurbishment, equipping and landscaping will commence in the near future. My thanks to the club for their support, and to Alby Barton and Geoff Holmes for their advice and participation.

The Rotary Club of Numurkah continued to play a major role in the community, with the successful Annual Art and Craft Exhibition, and the Combined Services Club's Dinner, both of which provided the opportunity to highlight the community service focus of the club and to extend the interaction between the club and community members and organisations.

During Easter, President June and Bill again distributed Easter eggs to the occupants at Pioneer Lodge and Karinya, and President June laid a wreath at the Anzac day service on behalf of the Rotary Club. The 4WD trip was again successful, and provided the chance for Rotarians and non-Rotarians to enjoy fellowship, excitement and adventure.

Thank you to all my fellow club members for their support and assistance during the past Rotary Year.

The past years International Service Committee has come to a conclusion on a very positive outcome.

Early in the past year we received a request for assistance to help a 20 year old Papuan man from a remote village in Iran Jaya. Alfons Nus Turukna (Maikel pronounced Michael) is training to become a nurse and needs financial assistance to continue his training.

Upon completion of his training it is Maikel's intention to return to his isolated home, a village called Bime, in the Eastern Highlands of Iran Jaya. At present there are no trained nurses or any equipment in the Clinic the Indonesians have built in the area.

Maikels has already completed 1 ½ years of the 4 years nursing course at the University of Chenderwasi an is desperately in need of financial assistance to complete. Institution Costs, Books, Practical Uniform, Transport, Accommodation, Food and Clothing for a year totals \$1,200.00 AUD.

At the completion of his training it is Maikels intention to gain experience working at Wamena (a large highlands town) to round out his education with exposure to 1st world medical techniques and procedures before returning to his village to provide the much needed medical assistance desperately required.

When you are thinking about Rotary activities the idea of Vocational Service does not always come to mind, but if we think about it, work or vocation is such a dominant part of our existence that it is seldom far away.

Treena Henderson was the administration officer for 'Booroondara Cares', an organisation of two municipalities and eight Rotary Clubs (including Numurkah) raising money in the city and using it to support drought-affected people in our own shire. Vocational? Think about it!

A meal at Nine Mile House in Wunghu, and learning about their cheesemaking venture;

John Corboy from the GV Food Alliance Group;

Wendy Scott and her business, 'The Flying Muffin';

Gary Gray of the 'Shepparton Men's Shed', supporting the work of Pat O'Brien and our own club, who, with others, are organising a 'Men's Shed' here. A venture that has strong vocational links; many of the 'men' have been tradespeople or people whose hobbies have been in those same fields, and the 'sheds' are strong influences for their wellbeing.

Vocational Service Committee Chairman Ivan Routley travelled overseas (again!) to the World Deciduous Fruits Conference in California.

Libby Vasey's talk about people whose vocation is in medicine, healing people in Bangladesh through 'Interplast".

And there have been others.

So our club is much more oriented towards Vocational service than you may have realised.


