

Let's Beat COVID-19!

Disease prevention is one of Rotary's areas of focus. To that end, I respectfully request every District 6600 Rotarian consider immunization.

As an incentive, a fellow Rotarian in District 6600 will donate funds to each Club based on their Club's vaccination rate as of September 30, 2021.

For example: The individual club will receive \$100 times the number of members vaccinated. That amount is multiplied by the percentage of vaccinated members in the Club's total membership.

If there are 50 Club members and 32 get vaccinated, the 32 vaccinated members represent 64% of the Club.

\$100 x vaccinated members x vaccination rate = \$100 x 32 x .64 = \$2,048

\$100 is the incentive offered and 32 is the number of members who got vaccinated.

The amount of \$2,048 will be donated to Club's Foundation or can be used by the Club for their Rotary grants. The 4-Way Test will apply.

Findlay



Findlay Rotary Delivers Mobile Health Clinic to Hancock Public Health

The Findlay Rotary Club provided primary support for the funding of Findlay's first mobile health clinic. The mobile health clinic will provide a broad range of preventative healthcare and mental health services to the underserved population of Hancock County as an extension of Hancock Public Health with support from ADAMHS, Welcome to a New Life, Blanchard Valley MOMS, Findlay City Schools, University of Findlay, and Hancock County Educational Service Center.

The concept of a mobile health clinic was spawned in 2018 by then Club President Carolyn Copus and Bill Ruse, former President/CEO of the Blanchard Valley Health System. The mobile health clinic's mission is to provide accessible health care services for vulnerable populations by reducing traditional barriers to access (e.g., transportation, time constraints, distrust of health care system, etc.).

The mobile health clinic has a registration/lab area, two private examination rooms with automated examination tables, a medical grade refrigerator/freezer unit, wellness check equipment (blood pressure, blood glucose, thermometers, statoscopes, blood cholesterol, etc.), is ADA accessible, climate controlled, includes a restroom and on-board storage cabinets for clinical supplies.

Hancock County Public Health Commissioner Karim Baroudi says "the Mobile Health Clinic is a non-traditional tool, in our toolbox, specifically designed to improve accessibility and serve as a gateway to the many health, mental health and other social services available to our citizens. Really, the sky is the limit of what we can do out of the Mobile clinic to better serve the population."

The certificate would serve to create legacy and a bond between the recipient and Rotary.

Foundation Giving for 2020-2021!

Keith Hodkinson, PDG, and Past Foundation Chair, Deb Cheney, PDG, report some great news!

As you may know, District 6600 was moved to Zone 30 two years ago during a redistricting process that takes place periodically. Foundation giving drives everything we do around the world that we do with grant projects. Donations to the PolioPlus fund support our fight against this dreaded disease that still exists.

There are 14 districts in Zone 30. As the books close on 2020-2021 "The Covid Year" I am happy to announce that District 6600 came in FIRST PLACE in the entire zone for a combined giving increase in both the Annual Fund and Polio Plus! contributions. You helped raise a total \$156,541 to build the Annual Fund and support the work of Polio Plus!

And a total of 361 District 6600 Rotarians gave at least \$100 to the Annual Fund and \$25 to Polio Plus in the 2020-2021 to become members of the District's 125 Club!

We Value Diversity

At Rotary, we understand that cultivating a diverse, equitable, and inclusive culture is essential to realizing our vision of a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change. We value diversity and celebrate the contributions of people of all backgrounds, across age, ethnicity, race, color, disability, learning style, religion, faith, socioeconomic status, culture, marital status, languages spoken, sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity as well as differences in ideas, thoughts, values, and beliefs.





Let's begin to talk with our boards and our members about potential projects that can be funded, with the help from District Designated Funds or Global Grants. Be a Changemaker do something new as we Serve to Change Lives!

District grants may be used to fund a variety of district and Club projects and activities that are congruent with

Rotary's 7 Areas of Focus.

Special priority will be given to those with focus on the following:

- **Empowering girls** Encourage or support gender equality and empower women and girls.
- **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion** Cultivate a diverse, equitable, and inclusive culture.
- **Environmental** Strengthen the conservation and protection of natural resources, advance ecological sustainability, and foster harmony between communities and the environment.

The district match for local grants is \$1 for every \$2. For example, a project that is \$9,000 can receive \$3,000 in district grant funds plus \$6,000 in other funds. The district match for International projects is \$1 for every \$1. A project that is \$9,000 can receive \$4,500 in district grant funds and \$4,500 in other funds.

Qualify Your Club: Clubs must be qualified by The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International to receive district grant funds. Becoming qualified is simple. During the month of August, the District's website and DACdb will be updated to begin to accept grants. At that time, Club Presidents, President-Elects, and/or Rotary Foundation chair should:

- Read through the district qualification "memorandum of understanding" (MOU), and
- Participate in the online Grant Management Webinar sponsored by the District.

At least two Club members must participate in the online training.

Once the grant site becomes available, Clubs will have about six weeks to complete the requirements and submit the grant through DACdb.

Peace Conference

Saturday, October 30

District Governor Mary Aufdenkampe has some courageous plans for the District 6600 Peace Conference on Saturday, October 30th, on the campus of Lorain County Community College in Elyria Ohio.

"Creating a Sustainable Peace" is the theme of this year's conference and the focus is on solutions. We have assembled a Rock Star line-up of speakers although some are Mick Jagger's vintage, each will energize and empower Interact, Rotaract and veteran Rotarians, to not just sing about peace but to act!

The line-up includes Xavier Ramey, Chicago Rotarian and the keynote speaker on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion at the Toronto RI Convention; Civil Rights icon, the Rev. Dr. Otis Moss, Jr. a real-live peace builder and close friend of Rev. Martin Luther King; Billy Joe White, Zanesville Ohio tattoo artist who uses his skills to remove or re-style hate speech tattoos. His work is the focus of a 2018 documentary entitled, *Beneath the Ink; Dr. Akram Boutros, President and CEO of Cleveland Metro Health and a passionate advocate for environmental health and the impact on children.*

DG Mary hopes that Rotary Clubs throughout the District will become Peace Builder Clubs and identify service projects to work on in their local community in collaboration with a community partner that is different in ethnicity, race and/or economic status from traditional Rotary partners. We are certain that our speakers will inspire us with ways in which to create and sustain peace in our communities.

Peace Conference Chair and CEO of the Elyria/Lorain YWCA Jeanine Donaldson has added a pre-Conference event for area Interact and Rotaract members called "Courageous Conversations," in conjunction with the YWCA Anti-hate Taskforce on Friday October 29th from 6pm-8pm at the Slow Train Café in Oberlin Ohio. Saturday's keynote speaker, Xavier Ramey, will facilitate. For those not able to attend there will be a recap on Saturday.
