Up Close and Personal with a Rotary International Global Grant Application

As many of you know I have been working on a Global Grant (GG) Application for the LEAP Science and Maths Schools since last year. I am delighted to report that this application is in the final stages of authorization and I feel quietly confident that it will be approved by Rotary International (RI) very soon.

I thought it might be a) of interest to all members, and b) hopefully of value to those who wish to complete a GG application for funding in the future, to clarify the workings of a GG application from my experience. I'd like to clarify the primary benefit of an RI GG Application, the process that one needs to follow, and the outcomes if your GG application is approved.

1. What's the big deal about a GG Application?

In three words: the multiplier effect!

This means that Club and District contributions will be either wholly or partially matched by RI, which results in a far greater sum of money being granted to your project by Rotary. Club donations are matched at a 50% level, whilst District donations are matched at 100%. Thus, if you really want Rotary support for your project to be maximized, the RI GG route is the way to go.

2. How does it work?

Even over the past year that I have been working on my Application, the process has been changed, so those of you who may have experience of RI GG applications in the past would be wise to take note:

a) You need to select your project. Although this sounds obvious, it is important to bear in mind that RI is extremely clear on what it will fund, and what it won't. Your project has to fit into one (or more) of RI's 6 Areas of Focus, and even if it does there is a long list of specific items that are excluded.

As an example, RI is prepared to accept and approve Applications that are intended to cover the costs of renovation and refurbishment of buildings, but will not consider any construction projects. This was made clear to me: as long as we are not paying for foundations, we'll look at it. If you want to use the RI funds for constructing a building from scratch, don't bother.

RI will also not pay for staff salaries, and a long list of other costs. These are clarified in the RI 6 Areas of Focus as well as on the RI website – which, by the way, has recently undergone a total re-work so it is well worth visiting.

b) Once you've chosen your project and ensured that your application will be eligible, you then need a local committee (minimum yourself and two others) and an international committee (same requirement). In my application I was working with three Rotary Clubs based in the Sonoma Valley in California, and my contact person there was Donald Johnson — he has been a patient and steadfast supporter/champion — priceless!

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Mike Walwyn, who has been an absolute pillar of support for well over a year now, and Geraldine Nicol, who has been a continual source of local and international wisdom, for not only being willing to serve on my Committee, but also for providing expertise, insights, and intelligence that enabled me to complete this journey.

Also, you need to engage with your Club President and District Governor in order to inform them about your project so that they are aware of your Application, as they will be required to authorize it before it goes to RI. I failed to do this last year, and am indebted to DG Ian and President Chris for their understanding and support in recent days.

c) You then need to complete the online Application Process. As I have found in all my "online" experience as a 61-year-old, whenever something is presented as a "newly streamlined, user friendly, straightforward process" (my words, but consistent with RI sentiments) it usually means "you're going to find this difficult, if not impossible – at the very least a nightmare!"

One is required to register an Application, which is indeed fairly simple. From then on you are guided (a nice way of saying "coerced/forced/obliged/you have not choice/we own you/who's your Daddy now?) through a 12-stage process, which has the delightful built-in quality-control feature that ensures that if anything, ANYTHING, is not completed accurately and correctly in that stage, you will not be allowed to proceed to the next stage. More on this later.

If you are really familiar with your project, however, this shouldn't present a problem. It just requires really close attention to detail, and the capacity to resist computer-destructing or even suicidal thoughts when instructed by THE SYSTEM to review the previous stage and figure out where you went wrong!

- d) After Stage 10 you have completed all the information required. If this is of any comfort, let me tell you that the Budget and Funding Stages almost caused me to commit Hari-Kiri. Fortunately there were two things that rescued me: i) I did not have a Katana to hand, and ii) I visited the Regional Grants Officer for District 9350 at RI HQ in Evanston, Chicago, in April, and he was hugely supportive and wonderfully helpful. His name is Daniel Weyl (pronounced "While") and for our sakes I truly hope that he stays in this position for decades to come!
 - Please be aware that the Budget and the Funding section have to balance. Exactly! If you are applying for US\$ 100 000 please don't fall into the trap of believing that US\$ 100 000.50 is "close enough", as this will cause you heartache and emotional upheavals that you have not experienced before. I invite, nay beseech, you to trust me on this. They have to be identical.
- e) Stage 11 is the "Review and Lock" Section. Do not think that because you have gone over your work diligently numerous times, that you will be permitted to proceed. I made this near-fatal error of judgement, and was only rescued by Daniel (again!) who informed me that the system will only allow me to proceed to the final stage: Authorizations, once I have revisited all of the other 10 sections, even though they all had been ticked as correctly completed. Big Brother is watching you!
- f) The Authorizations section requires the sign-off of the local and international "primary hosts", as well as DG and Club Presidents. Once this is complete, the Application will be automatically forwarded to your specific Regional Grants Officer and he will "walk" the Application through the Approvals process at RI HQ. Daniel claims that his record "turnaround-time" is a week, but I reckon that 2-4 weeks is a more reasonable expectation.
 - If your project does get approved, then the might of RI manages the transfer of funds from Clubs, Districts and RI GG's getting channelled into the bank account of your local club, and these will be disbursed to the project in line with the proposals, terms and conditions in the application.

3. Conclusion

I trust that this has been of interest and use to you, and please, if you need any help with a RI GG in future, don't hesitate to contact me.

Bear in mind that my Application has not yet been approved. Once I have had final confirmation on the success or otherwise of this, I will report back to the Club.

May we be bold and courageous in our GG Applications in future, and may they result in substantial benefits to the communities we serve.

Greater Cape Town has a population of 4.8 million people occupying 2500 square km. Our annual consumption is 3-400 million cubic metres a year. (About 1 million cubes a day). We need to focus on managing demand rather than availability. Cape Town water users need to focus on using less water. Our leak ration is 15-17% - good by world standards. Tierwaterskloof dam is the largest but has a huge surface area for evaporation so is being emptied first. We are now at 21.2% and even with fantastic rains it will take 3 years to fill our dams. Without rain -1 August our taps will be dry.

Climatic change is a reality and rainfall patterns are changing. The major users of water in Cape Town are agriculture 57%, residential 38% and industry 8%.
