# ROTARY GLOBAL REWARDS: THE GOOD YOU DO COMES BACK TO YOU

Rotary Global Rewards is a new way to add even more value to Rotary membership, by ensuring that the good you do comes back to you. This innovative program allows Rotarians to receive discounts and concessions from businesses and service providers around the world. Many offers can be used for club projects, helping you get more work done at a lower cost. Since the program's launch on 1 July, over 10,000 people have accessed Rotary Global Rewards, and over 5,000 have claimed offers.



As of 1 September, Rotarians may submit their own business to be included along with those with which Rotary has already negotiated relationships. As

of this writing, there are 38 Rotarian- owned businesses offering deals to Rotary members. Businesses also have the option of returning a percentage of their profit on each transaction to The Rotary Foundation, so that the cycle of doing good may continue. # **POLIO HEADLINES:**

• Iraq has introduced the inactivated poliovirus vaccine (IPV) into its routine immunization system.

• Environmental surveillance is playing an increasingly important role in ensuring that the poliovirus is found, wherever it continues to circulate.

• There are nine weeks to go until the globally synchronized switch from the trivalent to bivalent oral polio vaccine, an important milestone in achieving a polio-free world.

**Afghanistan** One new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) case was reported in the past week, with onset of paralysis in Shahwalikot, Kandahar, on 20 December 2015. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015

is now 20, compared to 28 reported in the country in 2014

**Pakistan:** The first case of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) in 2016 was reported in the past week, with onset of paralysis in Karachi Gadap, Sindh on 17 January 2016. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2016 is now 1, compared to 7 reported for 2015 at this point last year.

**Lao People's Democratic Republic**: Two new cases of circulating vaccinederived poliovirus type 1 (cVDPV1) were reported in the past week, in Phonhong and Fueng, Vientiane, with onset of paralysis on 8 January and 11 January 2016 respectively. The total number of cVDPV1

## **RECRUIT A ROTARY PEACE SCHOLAR**

Rotary Peace Fellowships are awarded to scholars to pursue a master's degree in international studies and peace and conflict resolution. A second program, a three-month summer professional development certificate course, is available in Thailand. District 5960 has had many successful applicants over the years that are now working at the United Nations and other global organizations, in governments around the world, and in business and nongovernmental settings that advance peace.

Please inform qualified applicants about this program. Candidates must have earned an undergraduate degree and have 5 years of work or volunteer experience and a demonstrated commitment to peace and service. Proficiency in a second language is strongly recommended. Rotarians and their family members are not eligible. There is a three-step application process. Candidates submit online applications to their local Rotary Clubs by **April 1, 2016.** Endorsements by local clubs will then be sent to the District level by **April 22, 2016**. In-person interviews for District finalists will be invited on May 9-10 to be conducted on **May 14, 2016**.
