From John Hannes, Senior Coordinator for the Americas

"We have learned that a few Rotary clubs are sponsoring or hosting gun and knife shows, shooting tournaments and hunts and are using Rotary's trademarks on materials for these events. As you may know, the RI Board has set forth guidelines for use of the Rotary Marks by Rotary clubs for sponsorship and cooperative relationship purposes, and this policy prohibits clubs from accepting relationships that support the use of harmful products, including weapons and other armaments; see the relevant Rotary Code of Policies Section below.

We believe the RI Board would not take kindly upon knowing that Rotary clubs are sponsoring or hosting gun and knife shows or that the clubs are hosting or sponsoring shooting tournaments and hunts. We would appreciate your assistance in passing on this information to the clubs in your areas and, if you would, ask any clubs that may already be sponsoring or hosting gun/knife shows, shooting tournaments and/or hunts to cease such activity.

Per 11.020.6. <u>Guidelines for Use of Rotary Marks by Rotary Clubs, Rotary Districts and</u> Other Rotary Entities for Sponsorship and Cooperative Relationship Purposes

- 20. No Rotary club(s), Rotary district(s) or other Rotary Entity shall accept a sponsorship or a cooperative relationship that
- a. Conflicts with Rotary's ethical and humanitarian values
- b. Undermines internationally recognized standards for human rights
- c. Supports the use of addictive or harmful products and activities including but not limited to alcohol (when inappropriate in a specific cultural context), tobacco, gambling, and weapons or other armaments
- d. Promotes a particular political or religious viewpoint
- e. Involves abortion
- f. Unfairly discriminates based on race, ethnicity, gender, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, or birth or other status
- g. Weakens the autonomy, independence, reputation, or financial integrity of Rotary International, The Rotary Foundation, or the specific Rotary club, district or other Rotary entity
- h. Involves any subject matter which is not in accord with the Object of Rotary

We would, also, appreciate if you would let your Rotary clubs know that the U.S. Rotary club an

Twin Cities Rotaract Spotlight:

Rotaract means Rotary in Action and the Rotaract program in Rotary International was founded in 1968 as a means to foster the energy of young people and get them ready to be Rotarians. Rotaract develops professional and leadership skills, emphasizes respect for others and promotes ethical standards. Rotaract provides opportunities for young people to address the needs and concerns of their community and the world at large. Though they enjoy most of the privileges of being a Rotarian, Rotaract clubs are not fully fledged Rotary clubs. Rotaract

clubs can either be community based or university based. Rotaract is for young adults under 30, though our district allows up to 35. There are 180,964 Rotaractors and 7868 Rotaract Clubs active in the world today.

TC Rotaract was chartered in 1996 as a community based club and sponsored by Roseville Rotary club. This club currently has 12 active members and meets at 7pm on every second and fourth Wednesdays at Whole Foods Hennepin in Minneapolis from October to March and at Mai Village in St. Paul from April to September. They occasionally have site visits with presenting companies so be sure to check their website (www.tcrotaract.org) for meeting location if you plan on attending. They have at least one monthly volunteer event.

The club currently has a mentoring program called Take a Rotarian to lunch where they ask volunteer Rotarian mentors out for coffee or lunch and get to know them or seek advice. Please contact them at tcrotaract@gmail.com if your some of your club's members would be interested in serving as mentors. The club also does an annual fundraiser to raise money and awareness for a local or international organization. This year's benefactor is Northside Achievement Zone (NAZ). Minnesota has the worst achievement gap in the US and NAZ is working to eliminate this achievement gap in North Minneapolis. NAZ uses a collaborative method to create a support ecosystem for low-income families as they put their children on a path to higher education. 'Sew' much goodwill creating hygiene kits

Dozens of District 5950 and 5960 volunteers are already participating in sew-

a-thons - - cutting, sewing and ironing components for the 450 feminine hygiene kits that Rotarians will assemble at the District Conference on May 13. The purpose of these kits is to provide protection to girls so they can attend school and have a more dignified life. These kits can last three years with proper cleaning. Giving a girl three more years of schooling will



help break the poverty cycle and be instrumental for positive social change in families and in the world

- Sponsor a sew-a-thon in your area.
- Donate fabric, washcloths, hotel-size soap, or girls' panties sizes 8-16.
- Sign up for the February 18 sew-a-thon at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Eden Prairie. (Family members, friends and Interactors are welcome!)

Sew-a-thon tasks include: Sewing flannel liners and the waterproof shields and bags, turning fabric and ironing, tracing patterns on fabric, cutting fabric, stringing bags, and putting snaps on the shields. Food and beverages are provided. Bring a sewing machine, if possible.

Join us on Thursday, February 18 from 5:00 - 8:00 pm. at <u>Immanuel Lutheran Church</u>, 16515 <u>Luther Way</u>, <u>Eden Prairie</u>. Use the main entrance on the north side of the building, then look for a large room to the right. If you can attend, please RSVP to <u>Judy Johnson</u> or <u>Todd Bollig</u>.

Will you host a sew-a-thon? Contact Judy Johnson to schedule a date. Then get a location, invite people and bring snacks. Judy brings four sewing machines, fabric, and directions for both sewers and non-sewers. She also gives a presentation on *Days For Girls*, showing the impact this project can have.

Rotary Friendship Team in India:

Our **Rotary Friendship** team left on January 9th to visit the heart of India's orange country.



They are in Nagpur, located way off the main tourist routes. Apart from being at its festive best during Dussehra, the city – as such – is hopelessly devoid of sites. Nonetheless, it makes a good base for venturing out to the far eastern corner of Maharashtra. First up, it's close to the temples of Ramtek and the ashrams of Sevagram. Besides, Nagpur is also a convenient stop for those looking for tigers in the isolated Tadoba-Andhari Tiger Reserve, 150km south of Nagpur, as well as Pench National Park, just across the border in Madyha Pradesh.

In cooperation with District 3030, Napgur, India this is an amazing opportunity. District 3030 is large with almost 90 clubs and 4500 Rotarians. Nagpur is also known as the "tiger capital" due to many national parks in the vicinity.
