Since I don't speak Korean, I placed great confidence that my experience would be similar to any travel that is Rotary related. The Rotarians would take care of me. Needless to say, it was an eighteen-year-old **Korean youth Exchange student** who was amazing in caring for us. Sponsored by the **North St. Paul/Maplewood/Oakdale Rotary club Solyun (Sue) Lee** spent one year in North St. Paul as an exchange student. She spent one week with us showing the best of her country because

She spoke during a pre-plenary session and told her story of Youth Exchange. As a first year college student she was given special permission to spend the time with us. I wondered how many 18 year olds could become a tour leader, taking responsibility for all aspects of our journey.

#### Rotary International Convention in Seoul Korea:



Here are a few highlights of the convention in Seoul Korea. Total attendance at the convention was over 43,000 Rotarians,

We started the event with a **3K Walk for Peace** held on Saturday morning. Over 6000 Rotarians dressed in their country attire and marched for Peace. It was a colorful event with drums and singing.

Korean Interact students to carry over 160 flags in a procession to honor each country. This ceremony always brings a tear to my eye and a lump in my throat as I realize the connection we have with each other and the beauty of Rotary bringing all of us together.



#### Opening remarks from President Ravi

When he took the job as the International President he approached it similar to running a business:



"And to those who said to me, "But Rotary is not a business," I said, "Yes, it is." But it is a business like no other. Our business is literacy, is health. Our business is livelihood, and it is hope. Our business is life itself — and to so many of those we help, our business is miracles.

The work that we do in Rotary is practical, it is considered, it is the work of our hands and our minds here on earth. And yet the gifts that we give, the fruits of that work — those gifts are indeed miracles.

For that is what you do, when you serve to the very best of your abilities, when you hold your Rotary work to your highest professional standards, when you never content yourself with saying, "I did the best I could," but always ask yourself, "How could I have done more?"

I thank you all for the gifts you have given me: I thank you for your trust, for your confidence, for the responsibility that you have placed into my hands.

And I thank you for the gifts you have given, and the gifts you have become, through the work you have done, the promises you have kept, the opportunities you have seized — to Be a Gift to the World."

A Briefing on Syria and the Global Refugee Crisis

**Anoka Rotary** will sponsor **Daniel Woodsworth,** president and CEO of the Minneapolis based American Refugee Center and Jamshed Merchant at a forum on the Refugee crisis.

The American Refugee Center is an International humanitarian aid agency that works with refugees around the world to help them take back control of their lives. The event will take place on June  $30^{\rm th}$  at the Anoka Rotary Club's Breakfast meeting.

During Mr. Woodsworth tenure the American Refugee Center has expanded programming into Somalia, the Democratic

Republic of Congo, Myanmar and Syria. He was awarded the Peter F Drucker award for Non-profit Innovation in recognition of its work with the Somali Diaspora globally.

The war in Syria has triggered a worldwide refugee crisis. We are yet to fully understand the implications of this crisis, but as Europe struggles to cope, people are waking up to the magnitude of the emergency. Right now, American Refugee Committee is working alongside truly heroic Syrians to provide critical aid inside Syria but we are also working hard to understand

how to respond to refugees in a new way.

Jamshed Merchant began serving as Canada's Consul General in Minneapolis in October 2012. He is Canada's senior representative in the Upper Midwest states of Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota. Jamshed leads a team of professionals building two-way trade and investment ties, engaging decision-makers and citizens on a range of issues important to both countries and helping Canadians living and travelling in the region.

Jamshed started his career as a faculty lecturer in Geography at McGill University in Montreal in 1979. In 1983, he joined the Alberta government's Ministry of the Environment as a soil scientist working on land reclamation. From 1985 to 2001, Jamshed worked with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada as a soil conservationist in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

## Northern Tier Robotics Grants



Matt Sieh of Northern Tier and Pres.-elect Cork Wicker

President-elect Cork Wicker convened our evening meeting at The Machine Shed (President Katie Dailey is in Korea attending the Rotary International Convention). He welcomed the approximately twenty students, parents, mentors and teachers from the Robotics teams at the four local high schools (Woodbury, East Ridge, Park and Math and Science Academy) who were in attendance. Cork told of a chance meeting at a SuperAmerica gas station with the CEO of Northern Tier (which owns Northern Tier Refinery, SuperAmerica gas stations and SuperMoms bakery and concessions). Cork took that opportunity to tell how the Woodbury Rotary Club is supporting the Woodbury HS Robotics Team and proposing that Northern Tier provide mentors and funding. The then-CEO put Cork in touch with the Donations Committee which considered the request favorably, in fact, very favorably. Rather than just support the Woodbury HS Robotics Team with a grant, they decided to make a \$5,000 grant to each of the four teams in the South Washington County School District, and a \$7,500 grant to the district organization that puts on the competition. Cork introduced Matt Sieh, chair of the Northern Tier Donations Committee and a Category Manager for SuperMoms, who confirmed the donations, told those assembled that Northern Tier intends this to be ongoing support, and announced that next year they will be awarding a scholarship at each school for a student interested in studying in a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) field. Sieh described the \$750,000 worth of charitable donations to non-profits that Northern Tier made in 2015, combined with 3350 volunteer hours by its employees. They made donations in the areas of education, health and safety, community and environment, human services, and military and veterans. Sieh had recently arranged a tour for the students of the robotics clubs at the Northern Tier Refinery, treating them to robot-shaped cookies. The response from the students and parents who had been part of the tour suggested it was very interesting to them. Sieh indicated a willingness to continue working with the Woodbury Rotary Club in the future.


